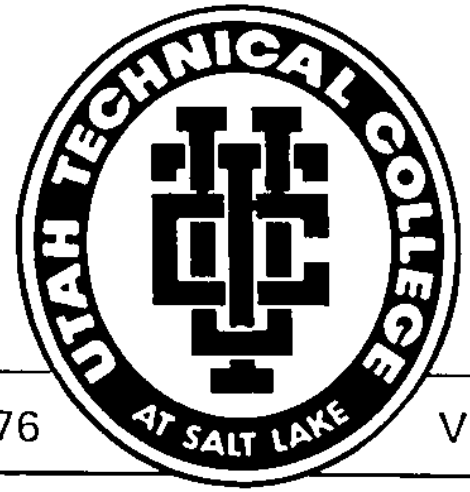

Flags and Bicentennial Spirit fly at UTC

Circle K Club heralded the new bicentennial year by hosting Gov. Calvin L. Rampton and Sen. Frank E. Moss at the flag presentation ceremony to the UTC. Though there were no military bands or exploding fireworks, the applause of the audience celebrated the presentation of the flags and rang in the nation's second hundred year.

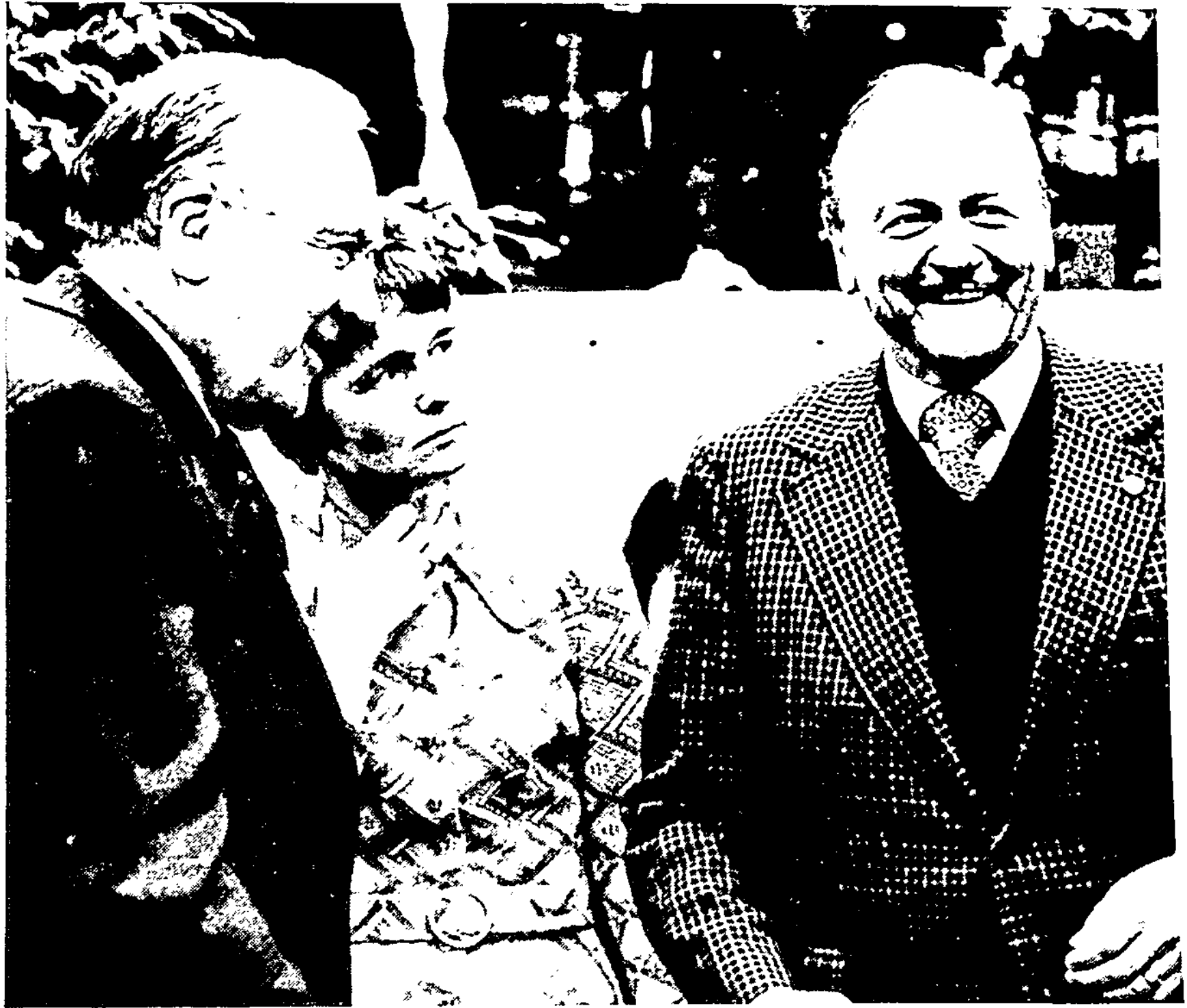
Martha McDonald, president of Circle K, welcomed the Governor and the Senator to the campus. She introduced Wm I. Spere, president of Kiwanis International in Salt Lake City. Utah Technical College President, Jay L. Nelson, presided over the ceremony.

Gov. Rampton gave the State Flag of Utah to Ms. McDonald. The flag is identical to the flags that fly over the Governor's mansion and the State Capitol. Ms. McDonald hailed the Governor as a long-time supporter of UTC. Gov. Rampton was instrumental to securing funds for construction of the Calvin L. Rampton Technology building here on campus.

Senator Moss donated the flag of the United States to Ms. McDonald. The flag the Senator gave to the Circle K Club was brought from Washington DC and has flown over the United States Capitol. The flag symbolized the absolute stability of our government and serves to remind us that Utah is one of the fifty sovereign states of the federal union.

Senator Moss said, "Technical education has been neglected for a long time. It is an area of education we need throughout our state and country. The United States has achieved greatness through our technological progress. With your training as technology students, we need your talent and skills. We will have to look to you more and more to maintain the technological lead we have achieved."

College president, Jay L. Nelson was asked to accept the flags presented to Circle K for UTC. President Nelson led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance and dedicated the flag to the campus. He thanked Circle K for the donation and said the flags will fly proudly at the College Center.

Each college was asked to write up bills they feel would benefit the college students in Utah as well as the public in general. These bills expressed the point of view of the students in Utah to our State Legislators.

UTC/SL had two bills presented. One concerning our government, authored by KD and one on the transference of college credits, authored by Craig Merrell and Kim Lawrence.

The assembly had various respected speakers, one of which was Governor Rampton. It was a great learning experience for all involved not only in the workings of the government but in Parliamentary Procedures.

If there is any doubt that we accomplished anything, Alan Moll stated on television that we got more done in one day than the State Legislature does in 60 days

The majority of our funding comes from federal sources. Our federal funds are based on our veteran enrollment. Our intention is to aid the veteran in the many facets of his student life.

of the students who are sponsored by agencies, such as WIN (Work Incentive Program), Vocational Rehabilitation, CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act), and Educational Talent Search are referred to Alice.

The Financial Aids Office is a student service oriented area. Our goal is to assist students to use what funds are available to cover their educational costs. Educational costs cover tuition, fees, books, supplies, room, board, clothing, transportation and personal expenses.

There are set amounts for each of these items so the budgets are not based on what a student spends but rather on what he could get by with.

Funds come from the Federal Government, the State of Utah and scholarships from private donors. All of them are based on financial need except for scholarships and tuition waivers which are based on grades.

The Financial Aids Office also handles the Work/Study program where students can work on a part-time basis to assist themselves financially.

We are located in the center of the student services in the Nelson Administration Building, Room 144C.

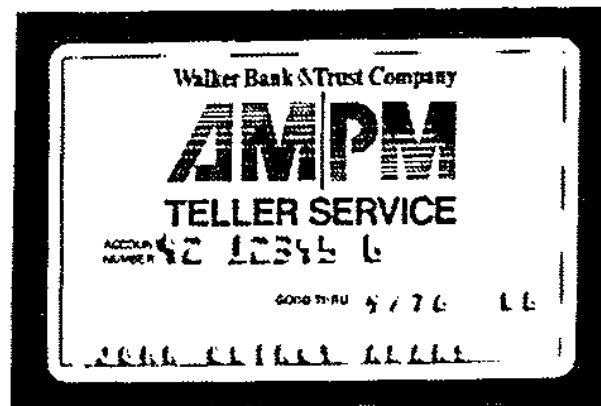

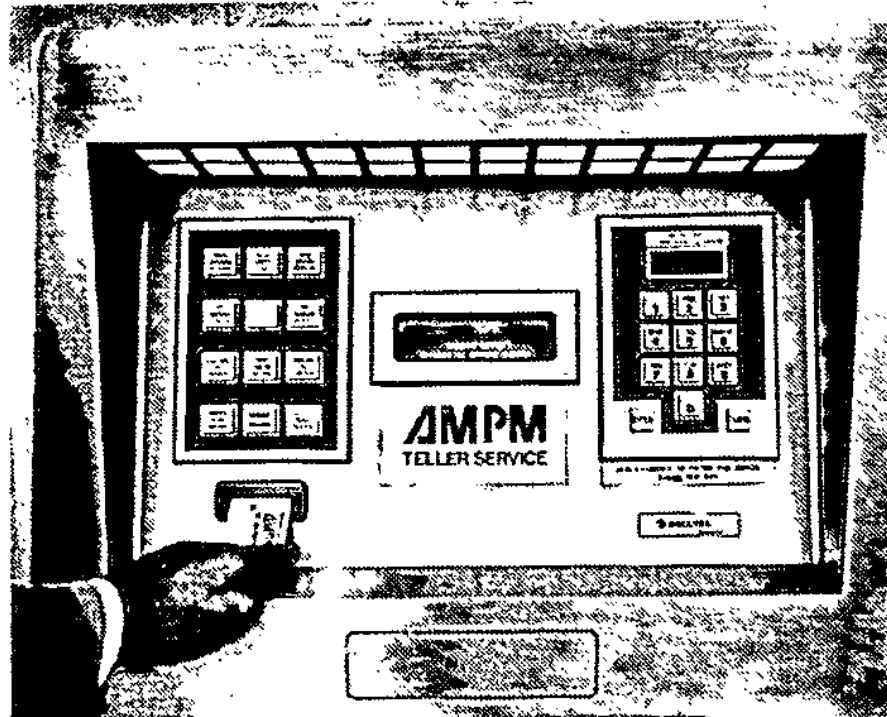

Your Studentbody Officers

Many of the students here at UTC are curious about the duties of the various student officers. There is a detailed description of their duties in the constitution. But for now, a brief description of their responsibilities:

STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT: He is chairman of the Executive Council and is ultimately responsible for the actions of any and all other officers and committees appointed by them. He must approve of any funds spent by the Student Government.

THE EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT: He is responsible for all of the President's duties in the President's absence. He is chairman of the student Senate. He is responsible for calling Senate meetings and seeing to the execution of their policies.

VICE-PRESIDENT of PUBLICATIONS and PUBLIC RELATIONS: She is chairman of Student orientation, and Student Community Relations. In the absence of the Vice-President she is to chair The Senate. And, of course, she is responsible for our newspaper, Points West.

THE VICE-PRESIDENT of SOCIAL and STUDENT ACTIVITIES: He is responsible for coordination all cultural and Social Activities of the Student Body. He is chairman of the Activities Council and as such responsible for all club activities.

STUDENT BODY SECRETARY: This poor soul is responsible for taking any dictation, doing any filing, putting memos out on campus and any communications off campus for the other officers. She is responsible for taking minutes at any meeting which so requires.

STUDENT BODY TREASURER: She is responsible for all of our expenditures and accounting for them. A short but heavy load.

SOPHOMORE CLASS PRESIDENT: He is a member of the Executive Council, Chairman of the Student Affairs Committee and Chairman of the Service United Awards and Certificates Committee.

FRESHMAN CLASS PRESIDENT: He is a member of the Executive Council and is Chairman of the Spring Activities Committee.

These descriptions are brief and only cover the high spots. Any activities that can help your officers better serve you, such as our Leadership Conference at Mill Hollow or the ACUI Conference at Tempe, Arizona are well worth the small investment of Student funds. Things learned and skills collected at such activities pay for themselves in improved efficient execution of their duties by your officers.

Daycare at UTC

There are many students at UTC who have one problem in common, that is daycare for their children. This article will try to cover the idea of a daycare center at UTC and the problems involved.

The idea of a daycare center for student use has been kicking around for several years. Several people working with the Women's Resource Center have been doing research on the idea. Alice Smith, a counselor who has done a considerable amount of research on the project, feels that a daycare center is a necessity, because it would allow parents to attend school without the usual hassle of finding a sitter or dropping the kids off at an out of the way center. The idea behind a center here is to eliminate such problems for some parents attending Utah Tech.

There's a lot involved in the process of opening and maintaining a daycare center. The main problem facing us is lack of funds. We need funds to purchase the land and the building. There are federal funds available for this but the problem is what funds and are we eligible to receive them? The next main problem would be meeting State Board of Health requirements. The State Board Health requirements are watched carefully and in order to have a building suitable to their regulations, we would need to build one to their specifications or do a considerable amount of remodeling. Either way, it's going to



cost a large sum of money.

In an interview with President Nelson on the subject, he feels that the two basic reasons it doesn't seem feasible to operate a daycare center for UTC are that we simply do not have enough revenue and space available to do so. Another reason is he feels it would be duplicating the purpose of agencies such as Welfare and Rehab., where in many cases, they provide daycare funds or facilities for parents going to school. He said, "In order to justify the expenditure, we have to justify the need of a daycare center." If that could be

done, then it would get the ball moving towards processing the papers to present to the State Congress, asking for additional funds.

It seems like the odds are against us in obtaining a daycare center. Possibly, with some additional evidence of the need for a daycare center, the day may come when construction can begin. Students attending UTC presently may not be able to make use of the facility but future students will be able to enjoy good, accessible daycare for their children.
