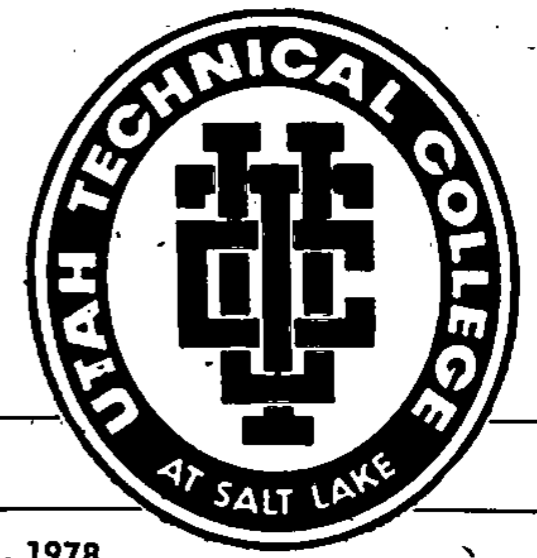

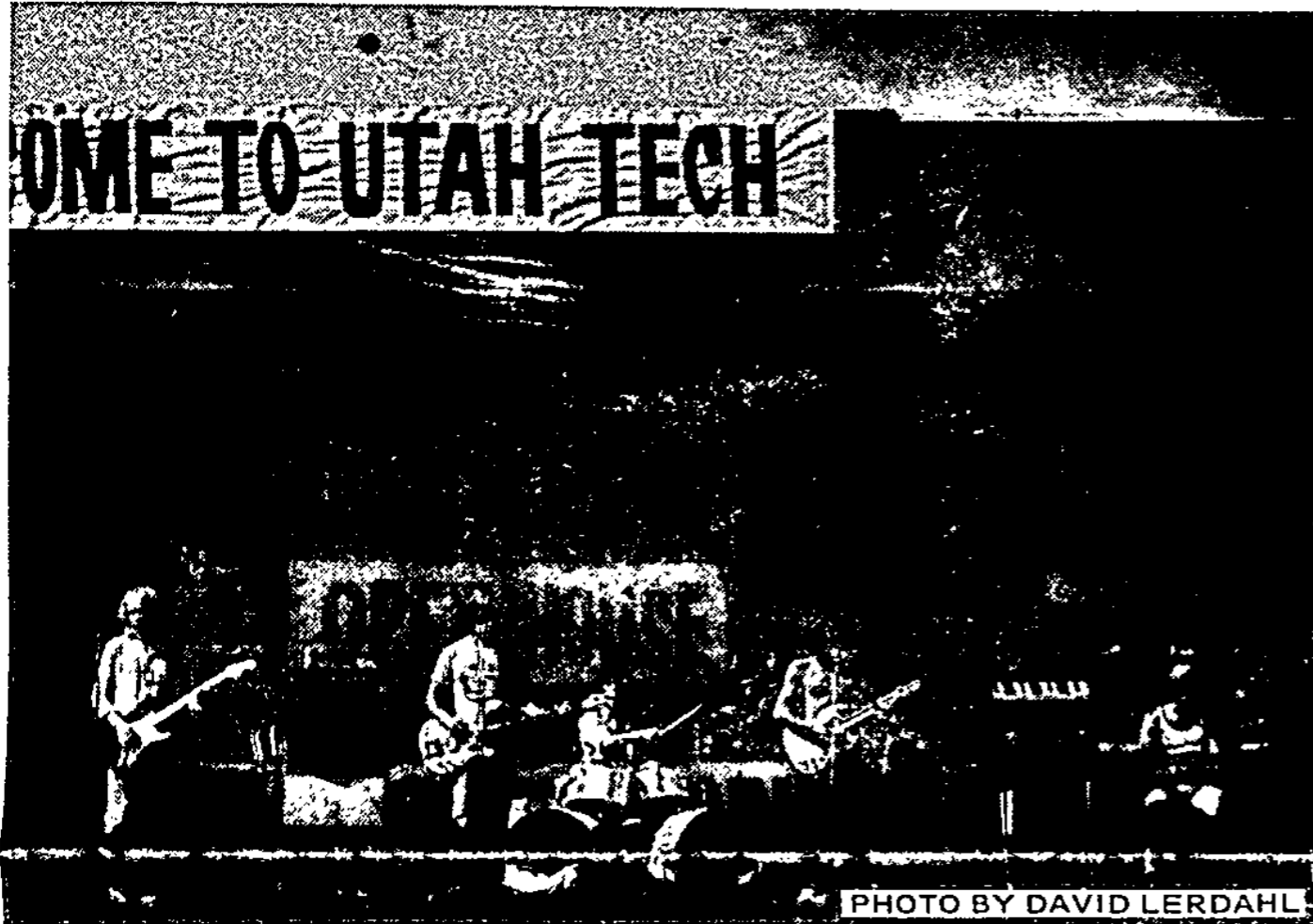

ANY STUDENT attending either junior or senior college is eligible to submit his verse. There is no limitation as to form or theme. Shorter works are preferred because of space limitations.

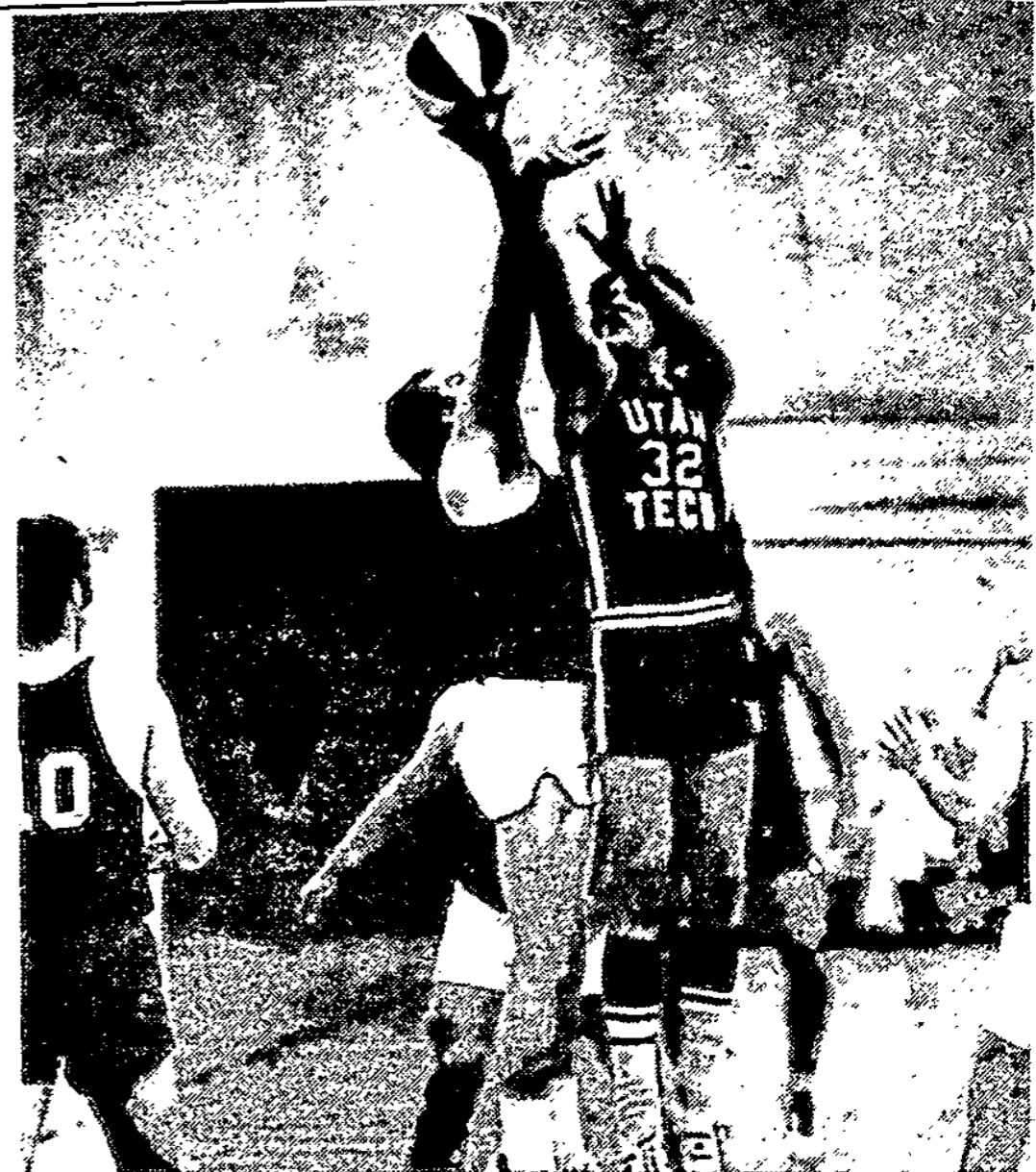

- ▲ To provide guidance to those seeking a career in design and drafting.
- ▲ To foster a pride in the profession.

THE MEANS by which the Institute shall attain its purpose is by:

- ▲ Conducting meetings and Conventions for presentation and discussion of subjects relating to the management, administration, performance and instruction of design and drafting.
- ▲ Publication of articles relating to design-drafting for management and professional use.
- ▲ Conducting surveys to report data pertinent to the profession.
- ▲ Classifying designers and draftsmen.
- ▲ Conducting drafting contests.
- ▲ Sponsoring council and student chapter activities.

AIDD PROVIDES MEMBERS OPPORTUNITIES TO —

- ▲ Work with others to bring recognition to and promote a better understanding of the profession of design and drafting.
- ▲ Participate in local and national programs concerning methods for improving job performance and reducing drafting costs.
- ▲ Keep abreast of changing technologies of vital interest to design-drafting management.
- ▲ Present papers at conventions and write articles for publication on subjects relating to design-drafting.
- ▲ Assist educational institutes to develop adequate curriculum to meet local needs.
- ▲ Develop leadership ability in the profession.
- ▲ Serve on AIDD committees and programs.

5. The judges' decision will be final. No info by phone!
6. Entrants should keep a copy of all entries as they cannot be returned. Prize winners and all authors awarded free publication will be notified immediately after deadline. I.P. will retain first publication rights for accepted poems. Foreign language poems welcome.
7. There is an initial one dollar registration fee for the first entry and a fee of fifty cents for each additional poem. It is requested to submit no more than ten poems per entrant.
