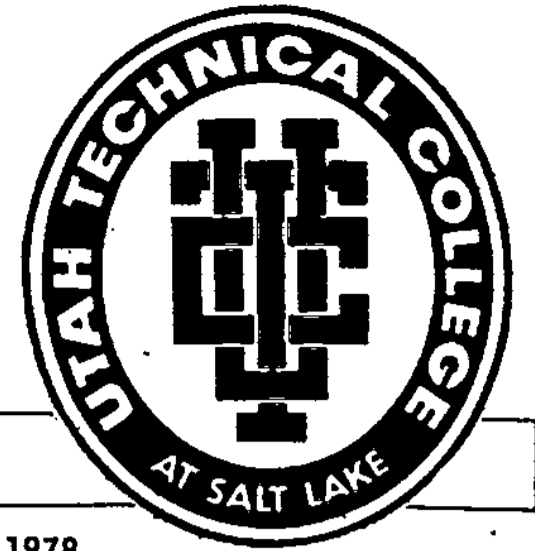

## Construction Will Continue On Campus

New facilities are being added mainly for the students' benefits according to Joe Johnson, Buildings and Grounds Superintendent, who talked about construction presently taking place on campus.

The main bulk of the work pertains to the cafeteria and kitchen interior in the college center. Carpeting is being put down and booths are being installed for the students' use. The new "circle serve" is the main attraction in the remodeling plans. The cooks will prepare the food which will be placed on the server that rotates in a circle. Any customer wishing to be served can walk up to any part of the "circle serve" and select his food item. The efficiency of the server will speed up the whole cafeteria process, Mr. Johnson said.

Arrangements for the game room to be enlarged and moved downstairs will complete that construction. A kitchen will be built to aid those who are downstairs. Meeting rooms will be installed in the location of the present game room.

The student funds are paying for the remodeling which will cost \$547,000. Completion for the kitchen area is expected to be near the end of the deer hunt. The availability of the material is the main holdup on the construction activity, according to Mr. Johnson.

The administration building is nearing the end of the remodeling project. Six new offices are being built inside the old second floor lounge. Personnel and public relations will be housed in that more convenient location, ending the overcrowding of the staff. Bids are also being made for the metal trades building for new metal stations.

In the future there will be a request for a new business building at an estimated cost of \$7,000,000. Plans are to place the building in the north sector of the campus if it is approved by the Utah Building Board.

Mr. Johnson is pleased with the remodeling and hopes the staff and students will be satisfied with the new facilities.

Five student body leaders from Utah Technical College spent Oct. 12-14 at Weber State college for the Association of College Unions International assembly. UTA was represented by Gema Seppi, A.S.U.T.C. Executive Vice-President; Cindy King, A.S.U.T.C. Vice-President of Social Activities; Susan Zimmerman, Vice-President of Publications; Mary Ann Hatton, Executive Secretary; and Roxann Ferguson, Intramural Assistant and Sports Editor of Points West. The conference was held to give students a chance to talk and exchange ideas with students from other colleges

and to hold workshops for student leadership.

Some of the other colleges represented included schools from Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, and Hawaii. These were colleges that represent region 13 of the ACUI. Many were four year colleges but there were quite a few two year colleges like ours.

UTC officers attended many workshops in situational leadership, assertiveness training, publicity, and building group relations. The ACUI also provided many bands and acts such as a hypnotist, a mime, and a magician. These groups, usually performing for half-an-

hour, demonstrated their services for the student officers so they could get an idea of who and what is available to perform at schools.

Many activities at night that were provided for officers by Weber State College, a Western barbeque, an Hawaiian luau and the Captain and Tenille Concert.

This conference is held every year at a different school. Next year it will be held in Laramie, Wyoming. "We all had a good time and I think we'll be able to put the things we learned and saw to good use for the students at UTC," Susan Zimmerman said.

## Dr. Dale Cowgill Named President

The Board of Regents appointed Dr. Dale S. Cowgill to replace President Nelson who is retiring. Dr. Cowgill was unanimously named by the Board on Monday, Octo-

ber 2nd. He is currently the dean of Weber State College's School of Technology. He will be taking over as soon as he can leave his duties at Weber State.

Dr. Cowgill is originally from Washington, D.C. although he grew up in Pennsylvania. He holds an associate degree in pre-engineering from Weber State, a bachelors degree in metallurgical engineering from University of Utah, and a doctorate in metallurgy from Iowa State University. He joined the faculty of Weber State College in 1969. He was the director of the School of Technology and an associate dean before becoming dean of the School of Technology at Weber State.

## UTC Dart Club Awards Trophies

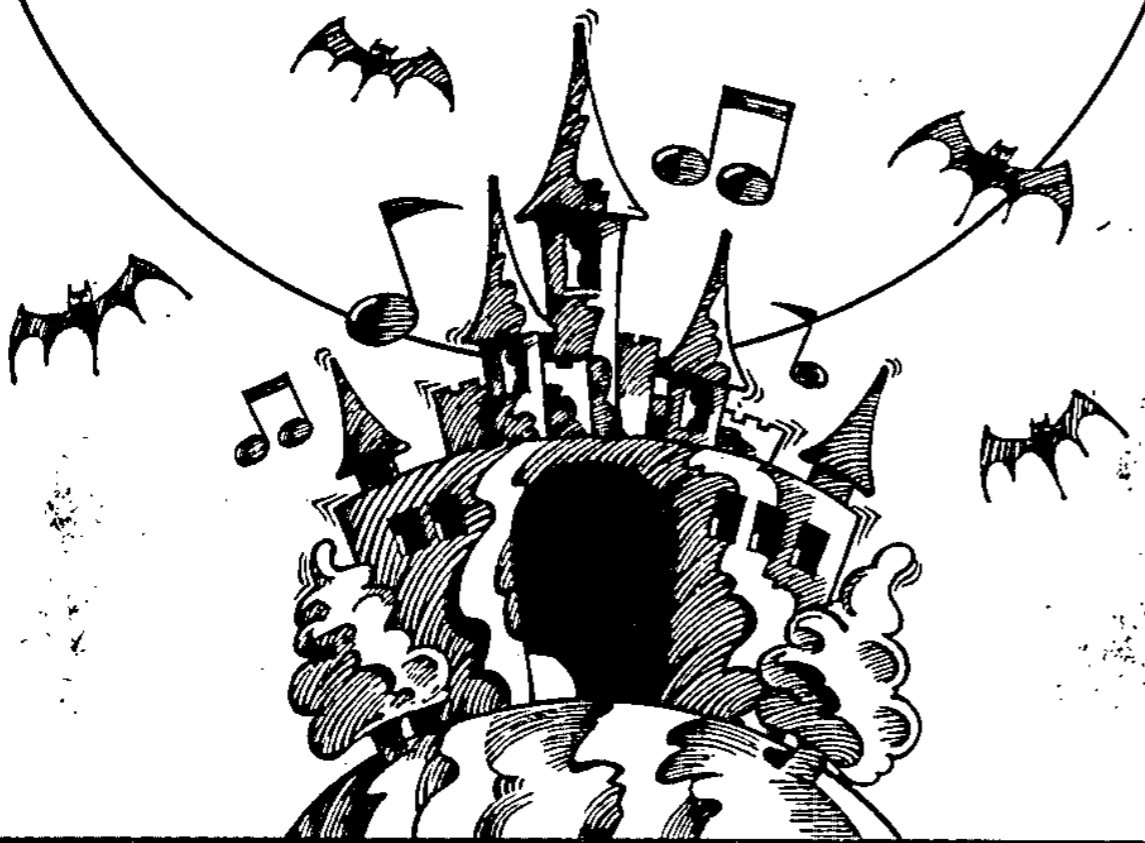

There will be a wall to hide the loading dock, new patios, and new wheelchair ramps. David Racker and associates, landscape architects, have been commissioned to design the fountain and patios. Student funds and the college operational fund will pay for the patios and wall. The whole project will be designed this winter, bids for construction will be taken in the spring and construction will begin next summer.

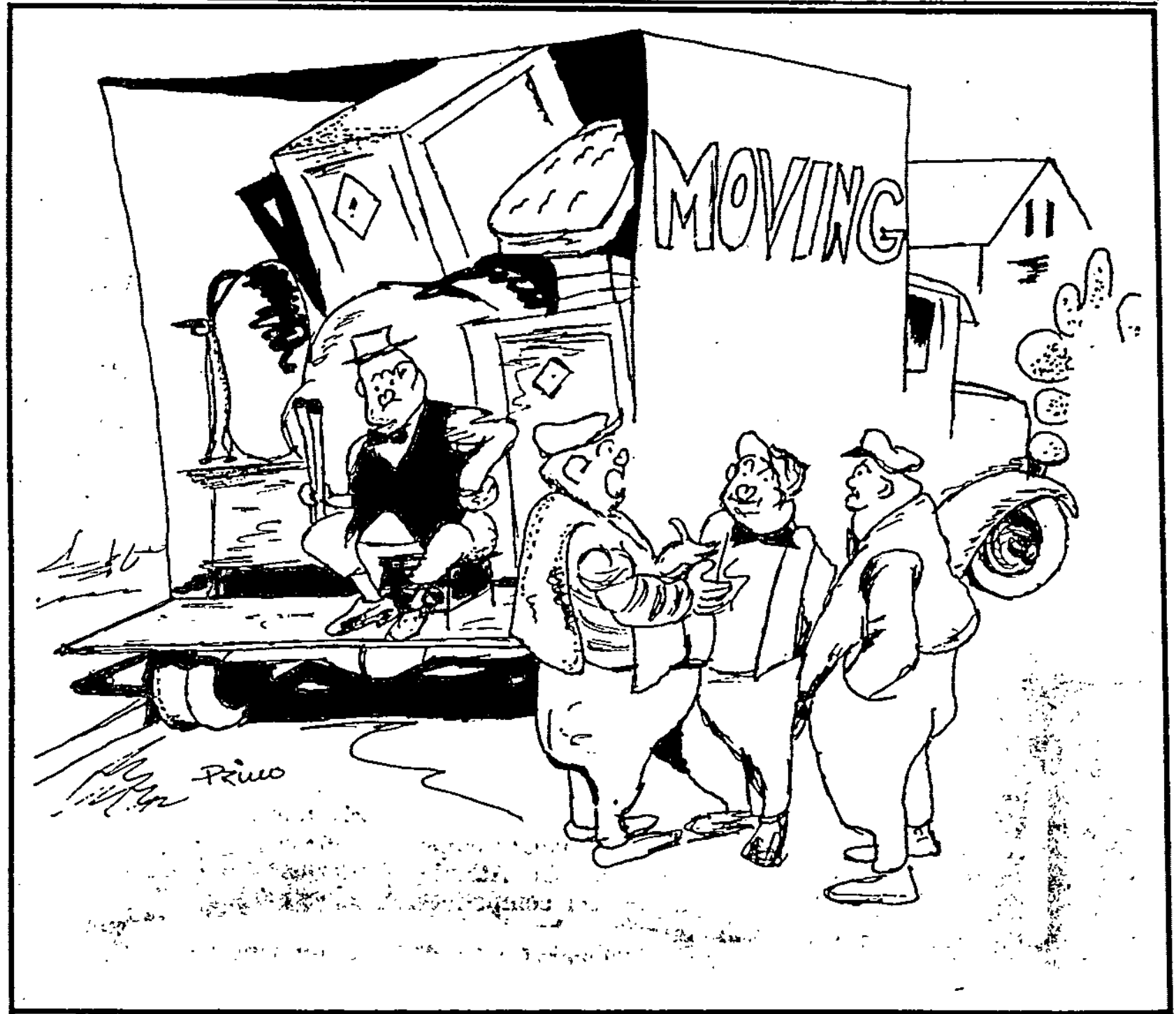
