## College Center Bookstore Gets A New Look

A newly remodeled and completely refurbished bookstore is projected to open November second in SLCC's College Center. Among the new changes will be the addition of a new wing on the south-east side of the present bookstore, and a larger inventory of books and supplies.

The biggest and most recognizable change to enhance the bookstore will be the new colors and decor.

"We're changing from a 70's look to a look more suitable for the 80's and 90's," said Steven Ferré, assistant manager for the bookstore. The old orange-colored carpets are out.

To replace those colors are new

shades of pastel mauve and gray. Along with the changes in colors come new decorations including new Levelor blinds instead of drapes, and completely refinished shelves.

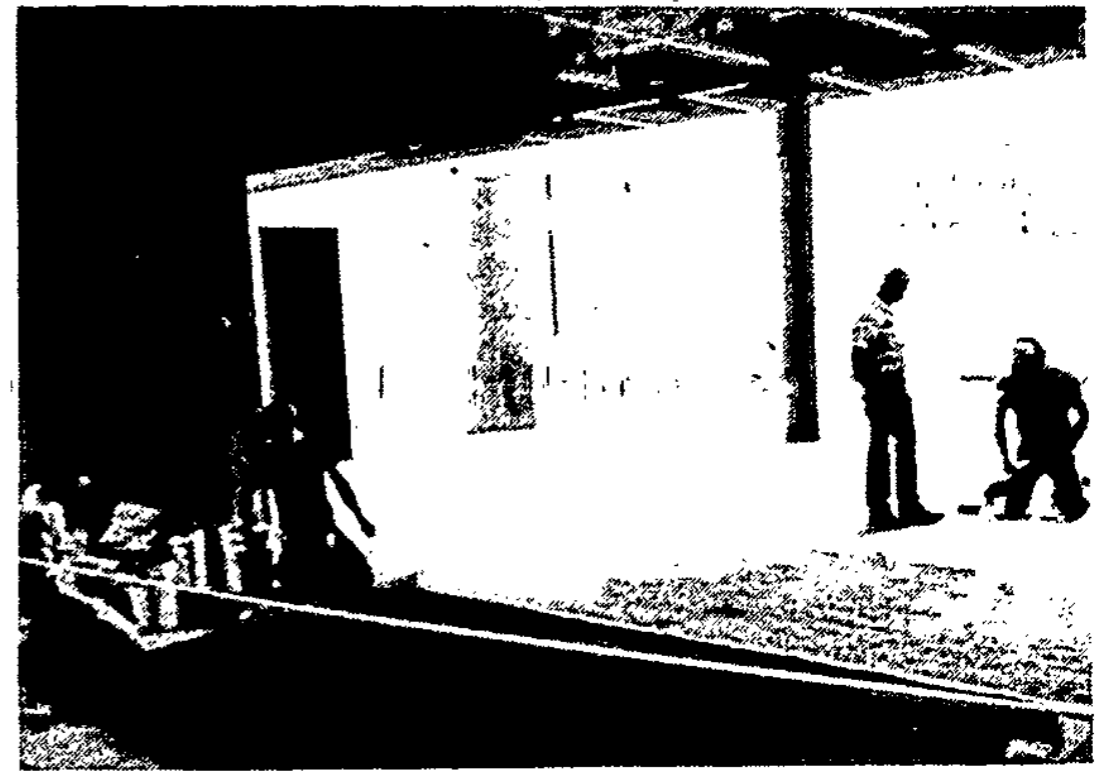
Another quite noticeable change will be the availability of more space in the store. In knocking out the south portion of the east wall in the store, the old room used for registration and other activities will become part of the new store adding 60 new feet of shelving space. There will also be an increase in space for sponsored students, and there will be two more additional registers.

The new store will also have a larger inventory to better suit the

needs of SLCC's growing number of students. With the increase in size, there will be an increase in the number of different items to be sold at the bookstore. There will be a whole new line of booster-oriented clothing including T-shirts, sweatshirts, jogging shirts, and hats with the new SLCC logo on them. Mr. Ferré also indicated that there will possibly be a magazine section in the future to go along with the public interest book sections.

The company most responsible for all the massive changes in the bookstore is Kremer & Associates, a Los Angeles firm that has redecorated bookstores in other institutions such as Stanford and

## Tax Cuts Equal Funds Of Four Utah Colleges

If taxes are rolled back as proposed by tax protesters, the \$24 million cut to higher education would be equal to the tax funds for four Utah colleges — Southern Utah State College, Snow College, Dixie College and College of Eastern Utah.

That's the word from Dale Hatch, State Budget Officer, who spoke at a recent meeting of the Liaison Committee, Utah State Board of Regents/Utah State Board of Education.

"One scenario for making the \$24 million cut is to close all four colleges south of Utah County," Mr. Hatch said. "Another scenario is to eliminate both Salt Lake and Utah Valley community colleges."

Mr. Hatch said he presented those examples not to propose closures, but to illustrate the potential impact of a \$24 million cut. Furthermore, the cut to higher education could be nearly twice as large if a property tax limitation is also approved by voters, he said.

Such cuts in education don't make sense when set against the need for a well-educated labor force," Mr. Hatch said.

"We have a great potential asset in Utah because of our population growth," he said. "Utah is projected to have a 10.2 percent increase in the labor force from 1990 to 1995, compared with a 2.6 percent increase nationwide. If Utah's workforce is well educated it can be a great potential asset in economic development. We must invest in public and higher education to prepare for this."

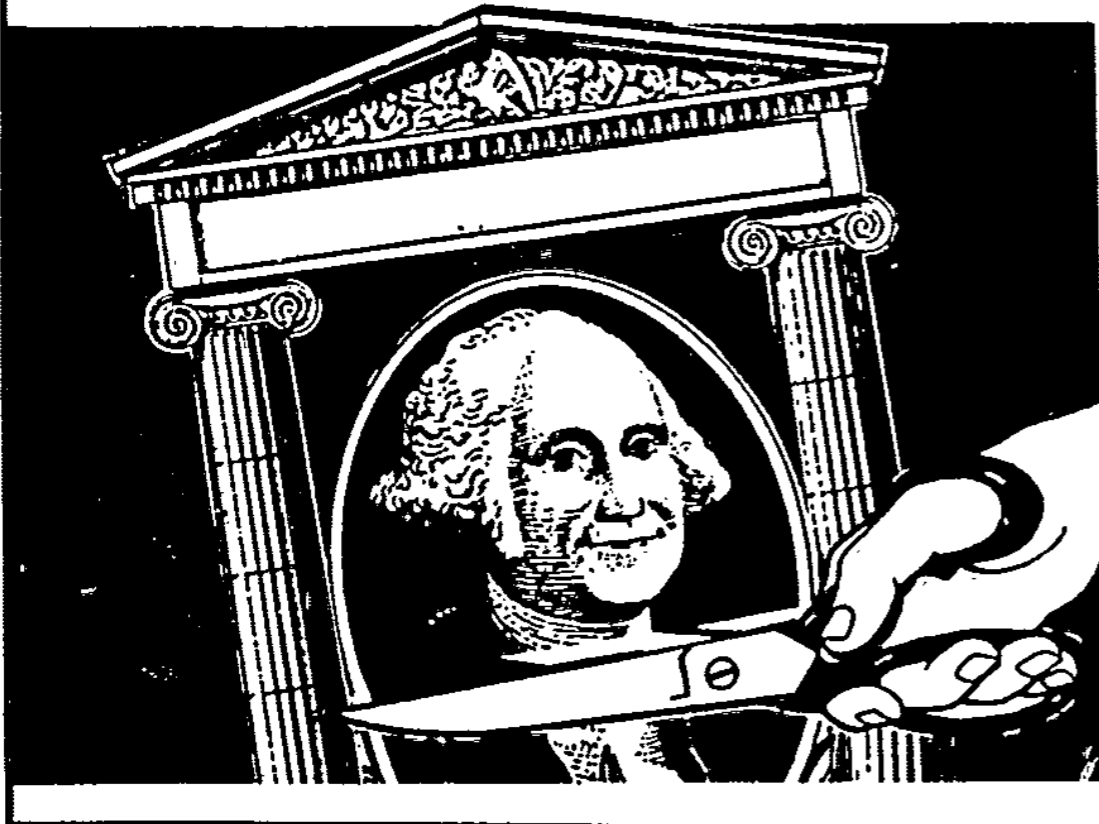
Mr. Hatch also said:

—Utah has 47 children per 100 working adults — more than any other state. The average for western states is 33 and the national average is 31.

—Utah is first in the nation in the number of children under age 17, but last in the nation in the percentage of the population that is working age — 18 to 64.

—37,000 babies are born in Utah every year, compared to the early 1970s, when the average was 28,000 births per year.

## County Employees To Enjoy Spa At Taxpayers Expense

At the same time Utah residents are facing higher taxes, and budget cuts, a spa for Salt Lake County employees is being built in the newly remodeled Salt Lake County government center.

A room has already been set aside for aerobics and body building in the new county government center. The spa, if completed, would be limited to county employees and their "significant other." County commissioner Bart Barker said the spa will be self-sufficient, or it won't be finished at all. The term "significant other" was not defined.

County employees want the

taxpayers to subsidize the \$15,270 yearly rent for the room and equipment.

According to a proposal submitted by an employee committee, all employees would be charged a fee of \$10 per month for use of the facilities. The fees would offset the salaries of the full-time coordinator, and part-time fitness leaders. Yearly salaries and benefits for the facilities would total \$39,059. If the proposal is accepted, commissioners say that taxpayers may subsidize the project until the facilities become self-supporting.

## Apprenticeship On The Rise

The SLCC's apprenticeship program is on the rise again, after several flat years as a result of economic doldrums in the state. SLCC has always been a leading institution in the West in helping to train apprentices, both union backed as well as independent.

Unions, associations and organizations that cooperate in apprenticeship include chefs, carpenters, electricians, glaziers, ironworkers, machinist, painters, pipefitters, plumbers, roofers, tilesetters, and a variety of Kennecott programs. "We have a new program with the boiler-makers union for which we hope many of their young people will sign up for," notes the apprenticeship coordinator, Bob Burns.

## Tax Groups Call For Firing Of UVCC President

Salt Lake City, October 10 — Greg Beesley, Chairman of the Utah Tax Limitation Coalition, has called for Governor Norm Bangerter to fire J. Marvin Higbee, President of the Utah Valley Community College for possible violation of Utah law and abuse of his authority as a college president.

Higbee, who has in the last week been accused of using taxpayer money to pay for a family country

club membership and personal long distance phone calls and of spending 60,000 dollars to remodel a conference room, held a faculty and staff convocation in late September to attack the ongoing tax limitation petitions.

In his letter to Gov. Bangerter calling for Higbee's firing Beesley said, "Higbee's comments (at the convocation) were aggressively

Brigham Young University. According to Mr. Ferre, "A college bookstore is not a department store, and Kremer & Associates is the best at redecorating college stores." Curtis Smout, College Center director, also adds that the \$50,000 bid given by Kremer & Associates is "very reasonable".

This is not the first time that the college bookstore has been remodeled. Since opening in 1971, the bookstore has been remodeled or refurbished three times and will most definitely undergo more

changes in the future which is to be expected as enrollment increases more and more.

There is still much work to be done in the bookstore and in the next few weeks. There will be much movement, which will make it more difficult than usual to move about in the bookstore. Though there will be a little confusion, Mr. Ferre says that the store will remain open on a limited basis and that the bookstore employees will "do their best" to accommodate students and faculty who need assistance.

## Weekly News Briefs

It looks like **Kirk Buckner** didn't kill his parents, brothers, and aunt after all. It seems his uncle, James Schnick, has confessed that he was the one who murdered seven family members in Elkland, MO. two weeks ago. Police were speculating that the leg and abdominal wounds he received "while struggling with his nephew, Kirk" may have been self-inflicted. According to the police, Kirk was left-handed; however, the murder weapon was found in his right hand. The motive for the killings still has not been disclosed.

Fourteen year old Kirk was found stabbed to death in his uncle's house after he was alleged to have murdered his family before traveling five miles to his uncle's home to murder his aunt.

**Ted Bundy** has convinced the Supreme Court that he should be allowed an appeal on the grounds of insanity and is claiming he was denied competent legal counsel (although he chose to defend

himself) at the time of his trial for the murder of Kimberly Leach and two Florida university co-eds. Although he claimed he was competent and in full possession of his faculties at the time of his trial, he now claims that his erratic behavior during the trial should have indicated that he was not. Bundy was originally given the death sentence for the murders.

Is the **Loch Ness Monster**, Nessie, really real? Old legends die hard and for the residents of Drumnadrochit, Scotland, she (or he) is very real. For three days a scientific probe made up of 25 cabin cruisers using sonar made sweeps of the 720-foot-deep lake in an effort to bounce echoes off "any objects or creatures lurking in the dark waters". According to project director, Adrian Shine, "There are some strong sonar contacts on Loch Ness, but I do not think they add up to your media monster." However, other participants said sonar contacts did show the existence of "something" and local residents still

insist the monster is there. There were three unexplained sonar contacts that experts said could mean there is something alive and moving in the lake.

It doesn't look like **Robert Bork** is going to win his appointment to the Supreme Court Bench. However, he has no intention of going down without a fight. With 53 senators publicly opposing his nomination for the position, he still intends to continue his fight for the appointment. In the past, Bork has spoken out against the ERA and has expressed racist viewpoints, both of which have turned many senators against him. Because of the long battle over Bork, the picking of a new justice could fall to the next president. According to Senator Alan Cranston, "I don't think anybody should share the illusion . . . that the next nominee will sail through like a greased pig no matter what that nominee may be like. We'll take a hard look at the nominee."

## VW Rabbit Donated To SLCC

Executives of Volkswagen Intermountain Inc. were on hand recently to donate a VW Rabbit to SLCC, courtesy of Volkswagen United States Inc. The vehicle will be used for technical training at the college.

Division Chair John Udy was joined by automotive professors Larry Barlage and Ray Southwick at the presentation in which Volkswagen Intermountain executives Ray Stout, president, and Hans Brandelmayer, general service manager, gave the keys of the car to the SLCC representatives.



Two hundred thousand **gay rights activists**, many of whom are dying of AIDS, marched on Washington, D.C. in an effort to persuade law makers to appropriate more federal monies for the development of a cure for the deadly virus. Activists unfurled a massive quilt with more than 2,000 names of persons who have died after contracting AIDS. Actor Robert Blake, actress Whoopi Goldberg, and former NOW president Eleanor Smeal were present at a rally at the Capitol. Civil rights leader Jesse Jackson, recruiting votes, spoke to the crowd as well.

"In 1963, there was a great march in front of the Lincoln Memorial. I was there because I cared. I'm here tonight because I care," he said.

Locally, **Mountain Fuel's** natural gas prices have declined 3.7 percent, about \$20 for the average residential customer, since last winter. In November 1984, the

average customer's annual bill was \$607. This year the average annual bill will be \$545. Since July 1984, Mountain Fuel has cut natural gas prices seven times.

Natural gas prices account for approximately half of a residential customer's bill. The balance consists of the cost of operating and maintaining Mountain Fuel's distribution system.

Did Governor Bangerter blow a bunch of money for nothing? The three pumps he had installed in the desert west of the Great Salt Lake for lake drainage have presently lowered the level of the lake about two feet. Now the Air Force is forbidding the governor to drain any more water off the lake because they say it will flood their bombing ranges. Evidently, Gov. Bangerter agreed now to flood those ranges in an effort to get the Air Force to allow him to install the pumps out there. The Air Force now wants to enforce that agreement.

political, were intended to encourage specific political action from state employees under his supervision and were a personal and intellectual affront to many who were forced to sit through it."

Beesley pointed out that the Utah Code prohibited state employees from engaging in any political activities during hours of employment. The convocation included staff and faculty of the college and was a mandatory meeting. Approximately 400 people were involved in the one hour presentation.

Beesley also pointed out that similar political activities using tax payers money and employee time were apparently being held in other institutions in the state.

In addition to calling for the immediate firing of Higbee, the letter asked the governor to stop using state employees in his office to make political presentations to other state employees and to begin vigorously enforcing the state law concerning political activity during hours of employment.

Beesley whose tax groups have gathered almost 50,000 signatures on four petitions designed to reduce taxes, said that "The use of taxpayer money and government time to engage in political activity designed to perpetuate waste and inefficiency is a classic example of why the people of the state are fed up with the way things are being done."
