# SALT LAKE COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENT TRENDS

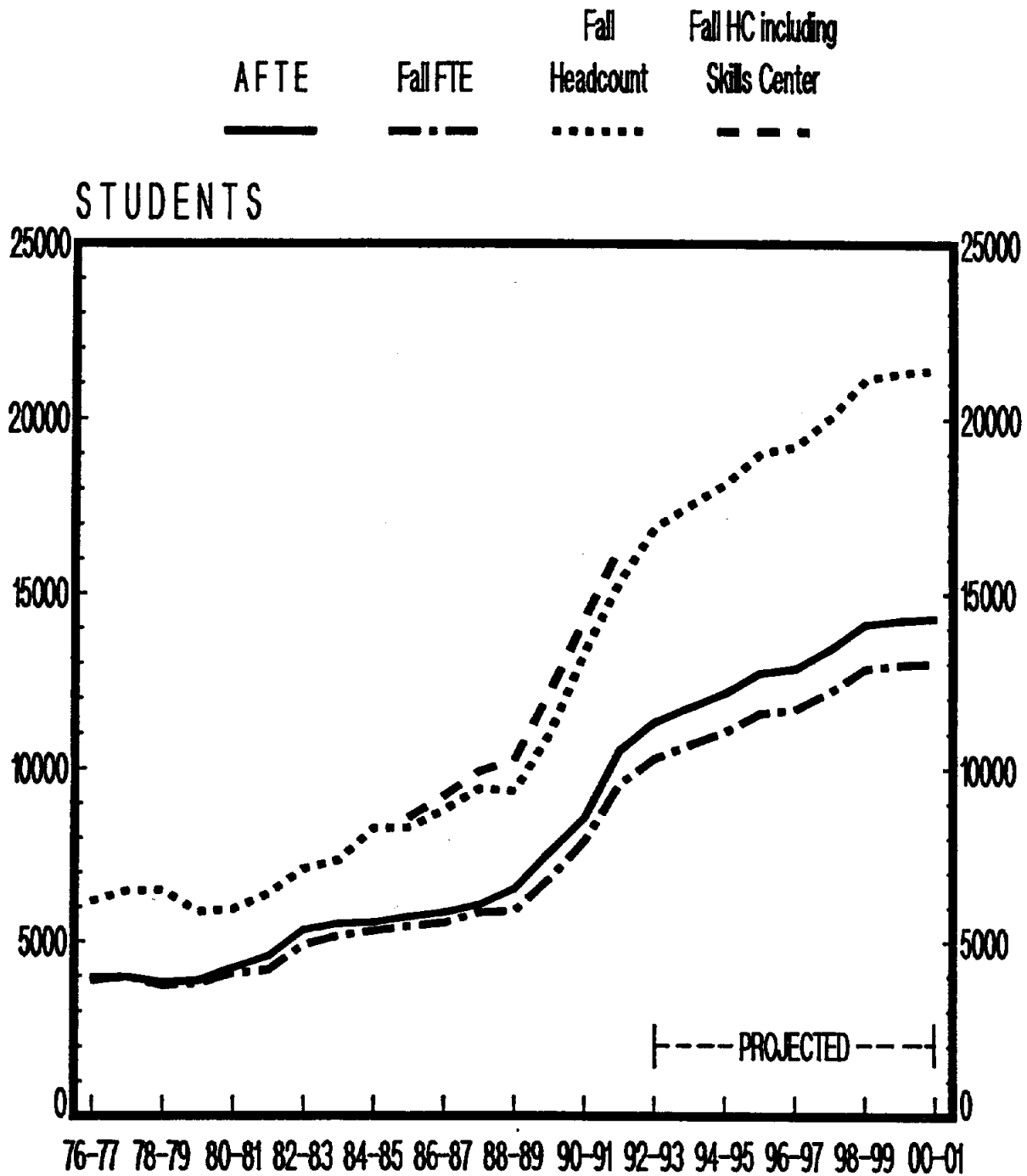

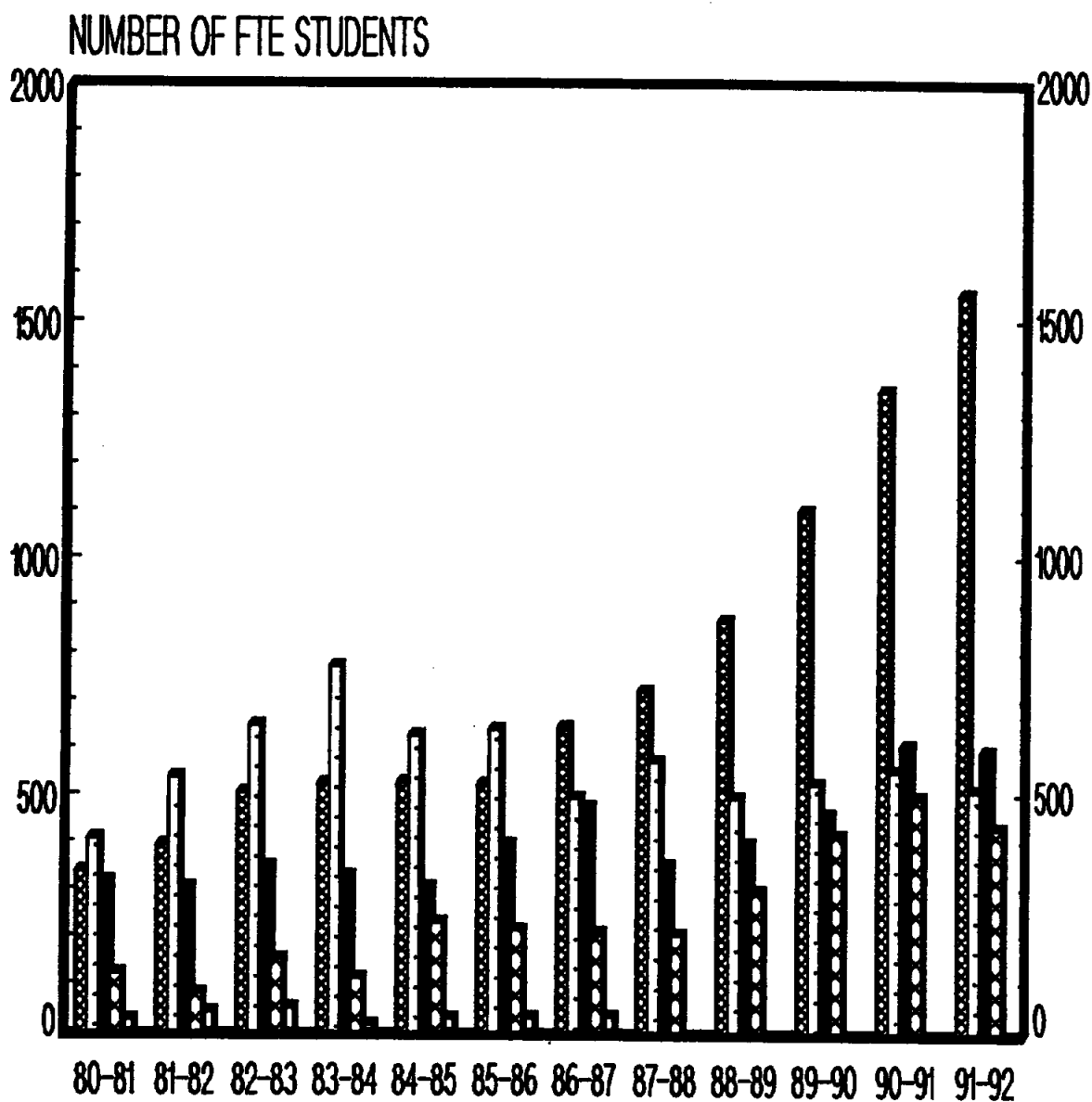

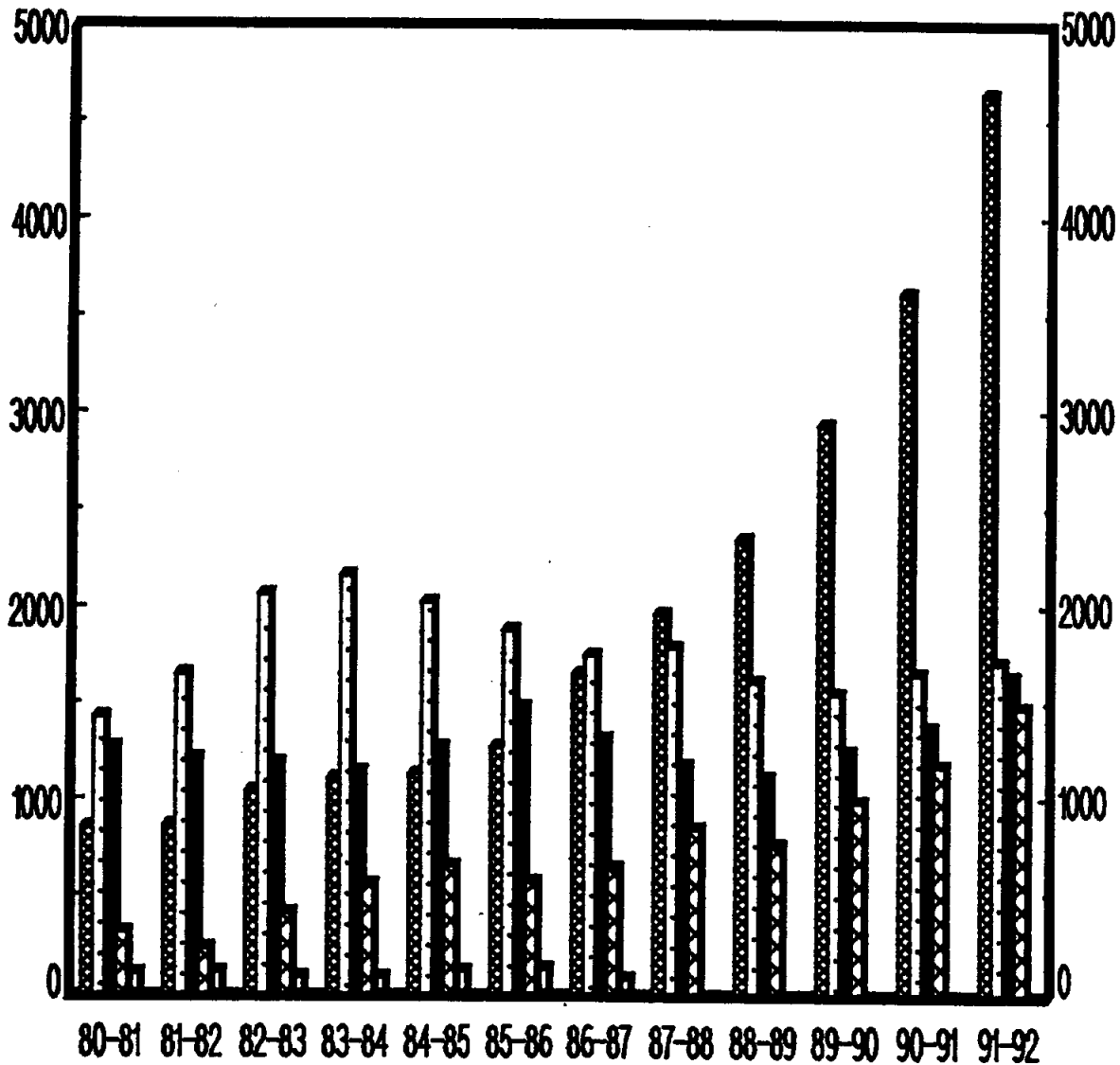

HUMANITIES & SCI ED    BUSINESS & TECH    OCCUPATIONAL ED    CONTINUING & COMM ED    OTHER

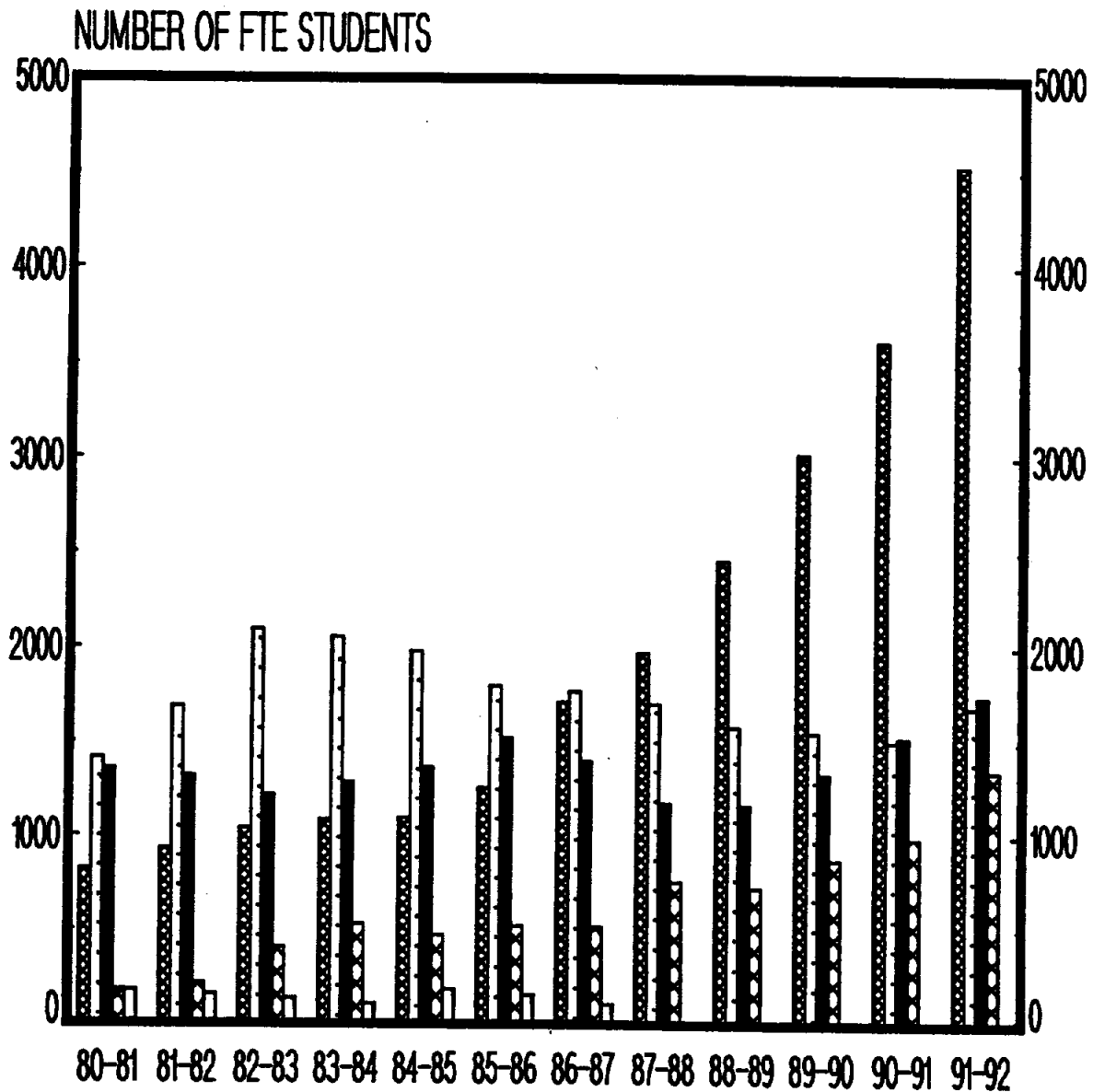

# FTE ENROLLMENT BY DEPARTMENT SPRING QUARTER

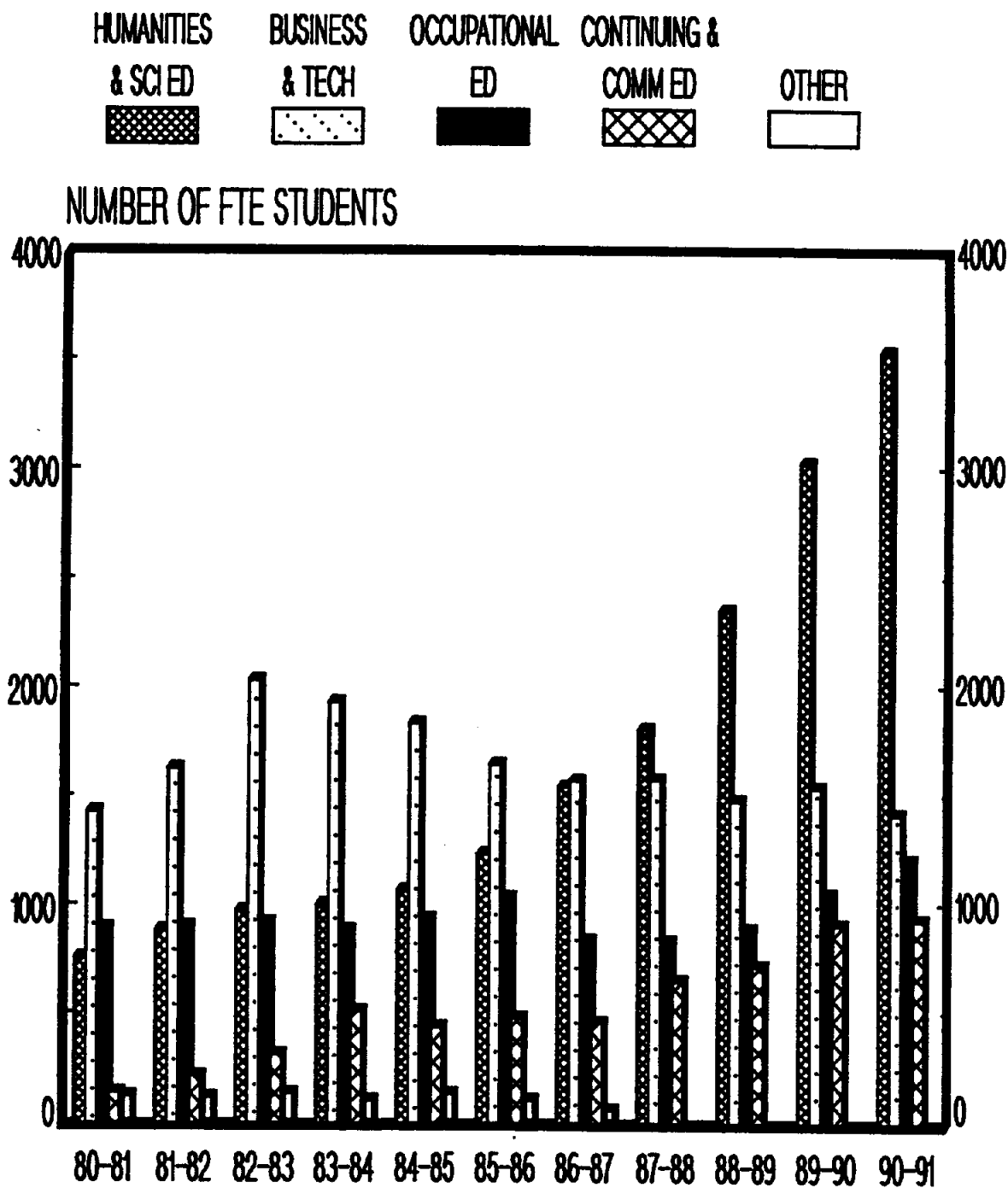

## ANNUALIZED FTE

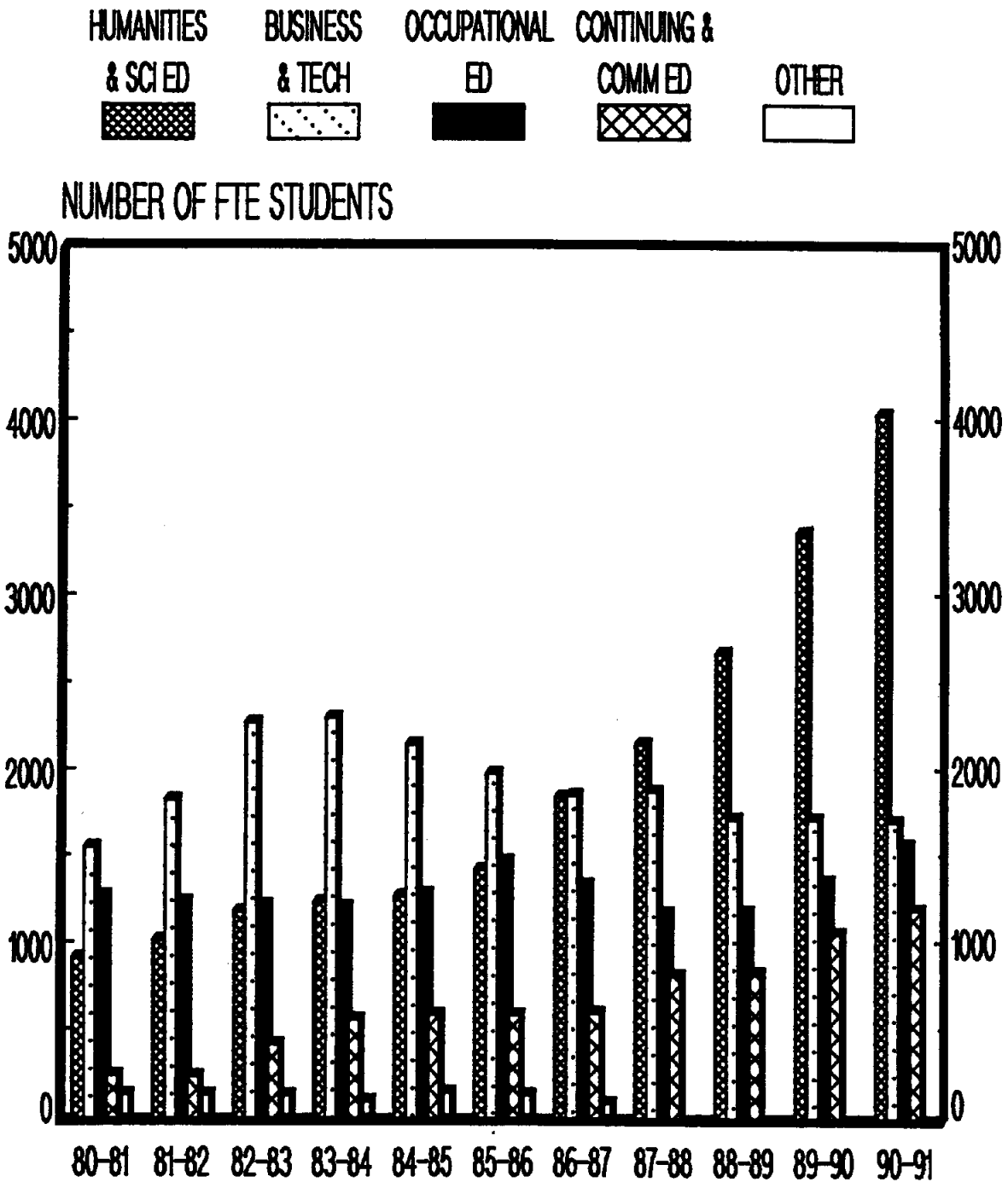

# STUDENT HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT PER CREDIT HOUR FALL QUARTER

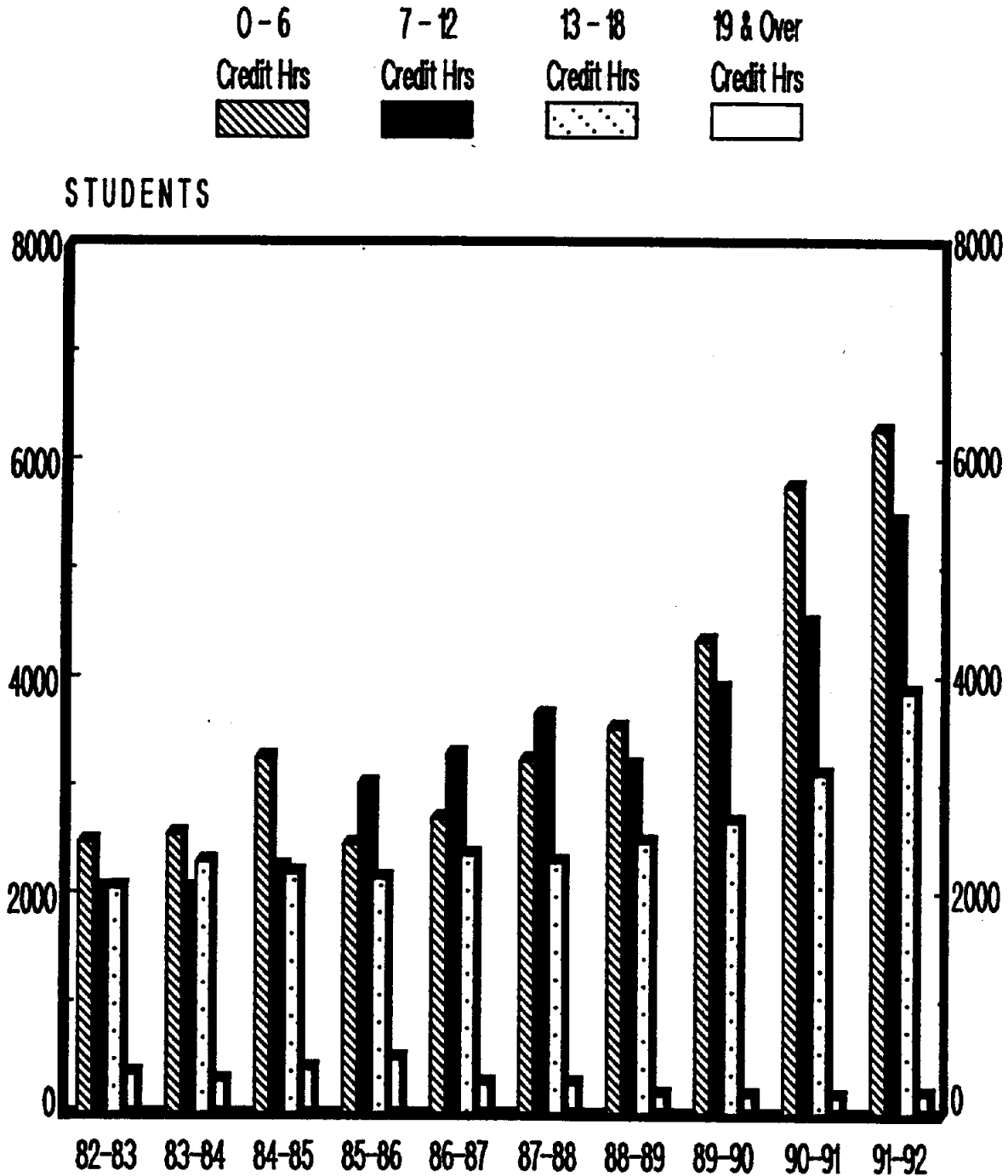

## FALL HEADCOUNT

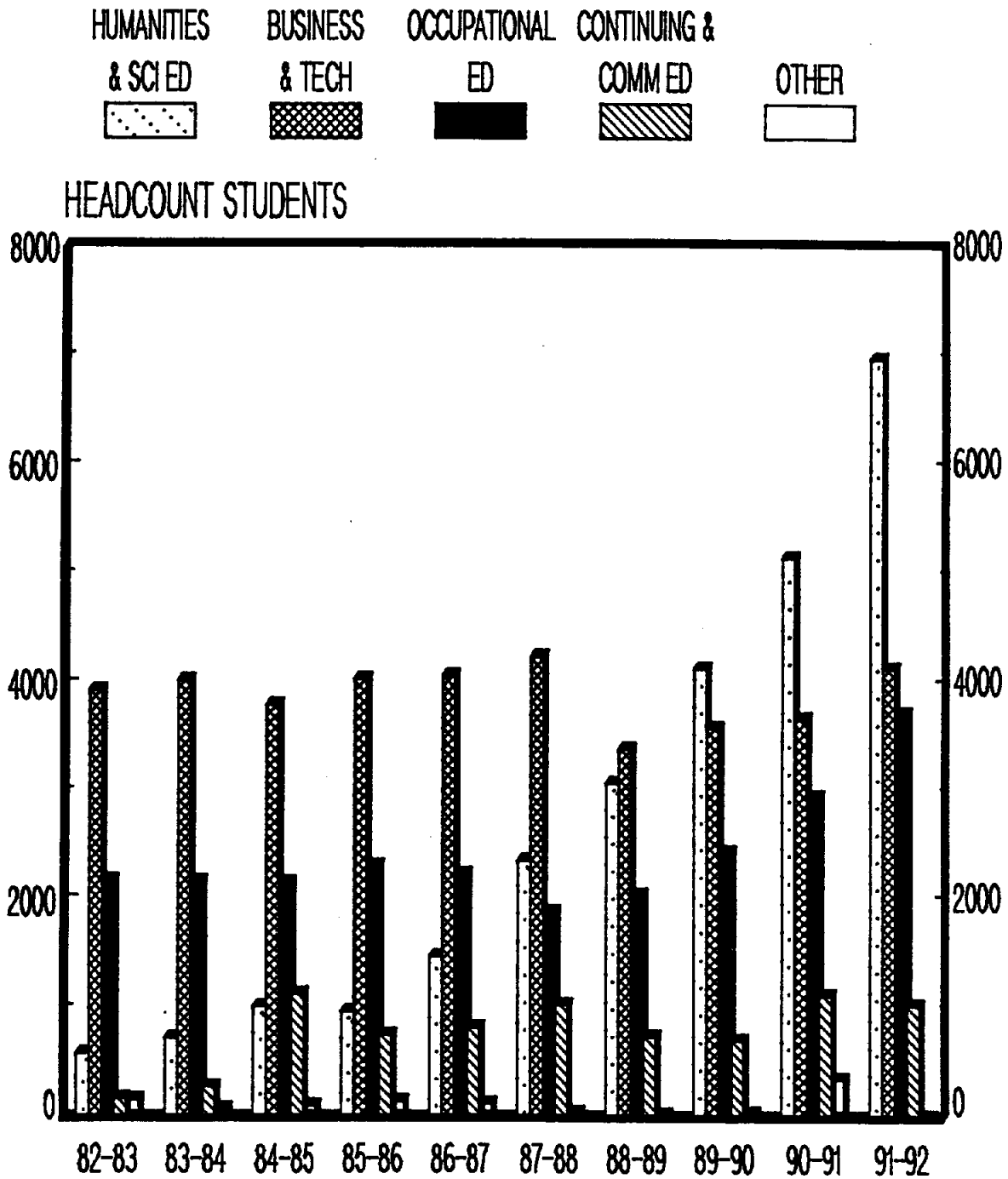

ZIP CODES WITH 50 OR MORE STUDENTS

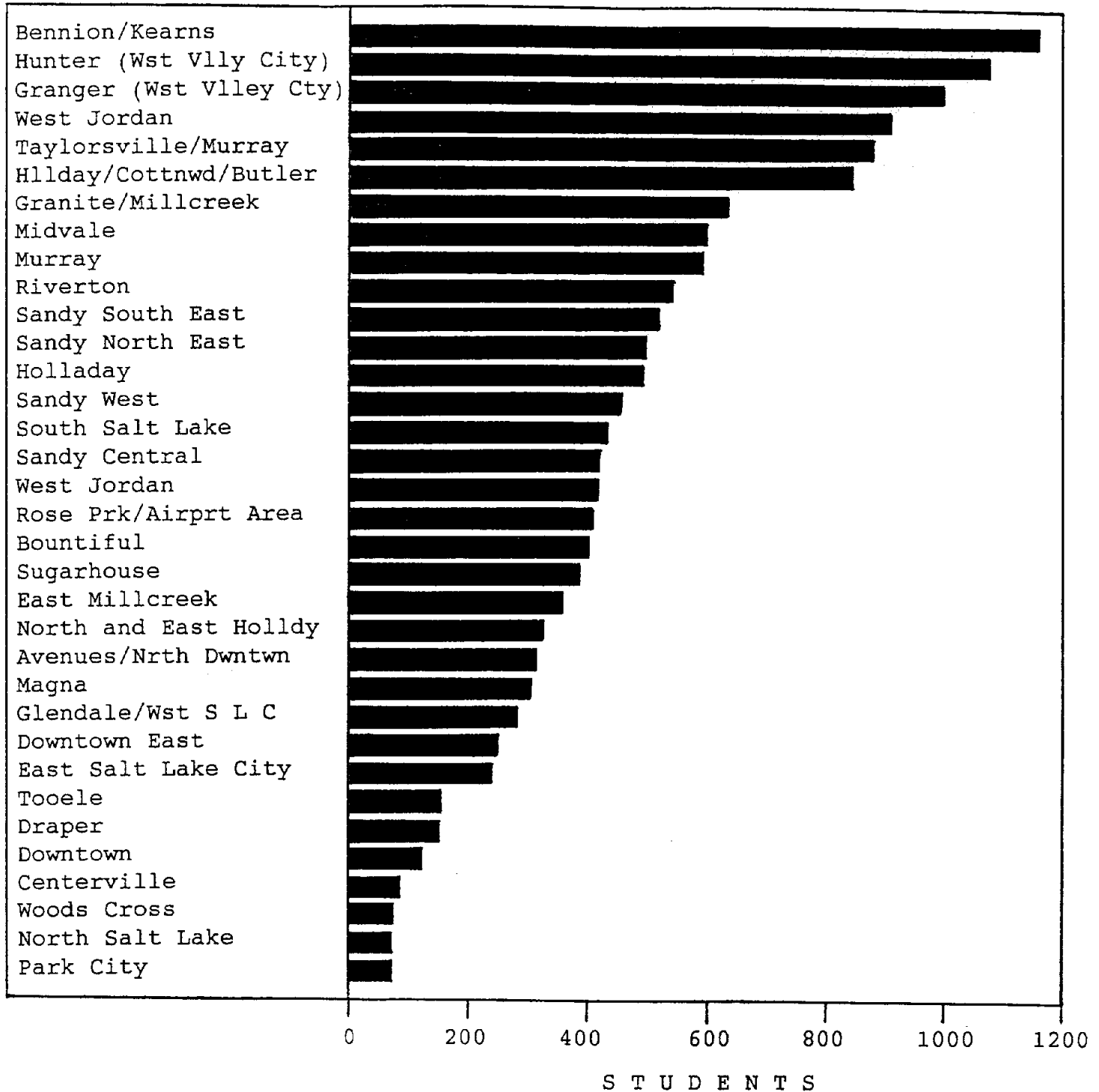

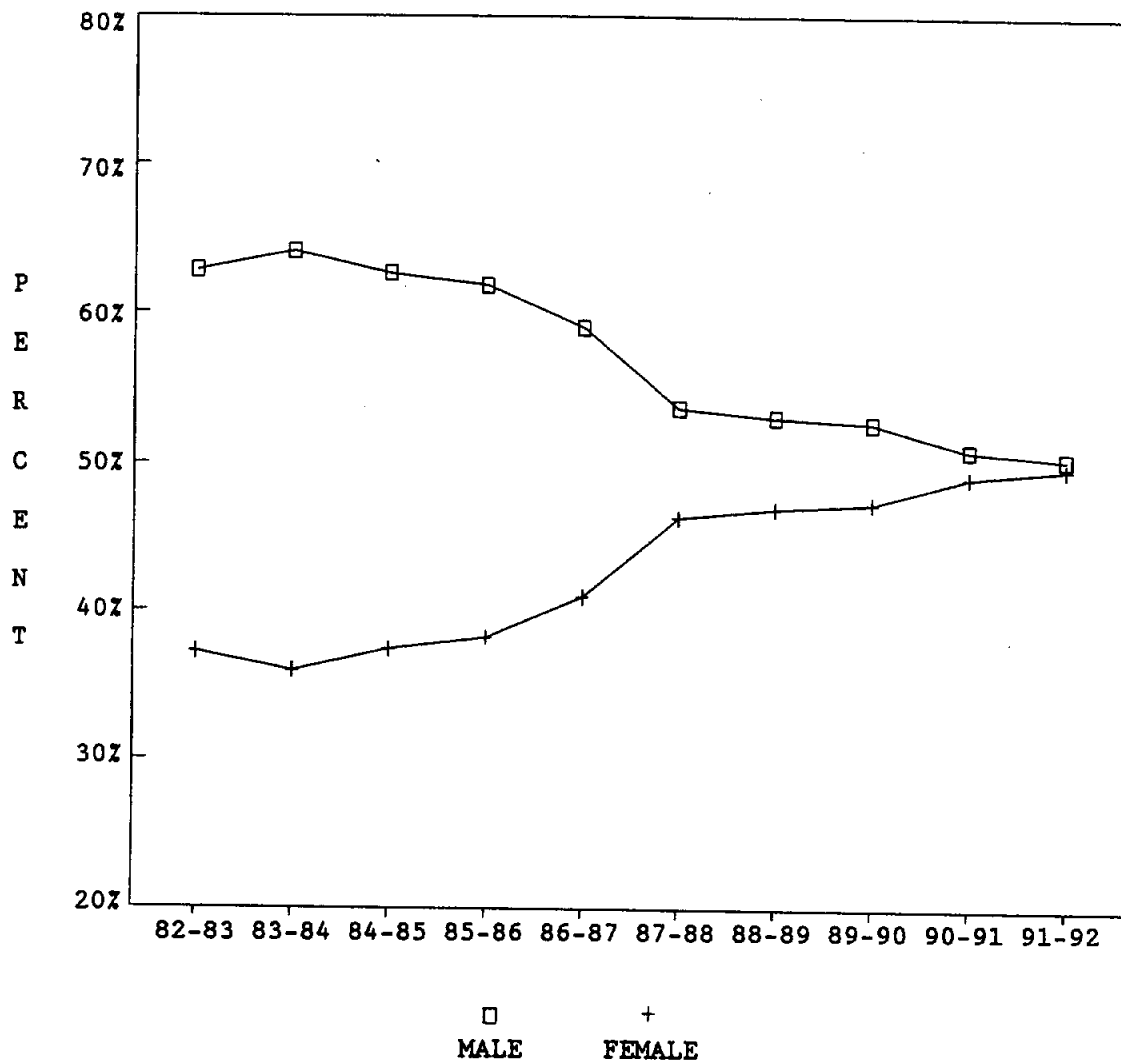

Fall Headcount

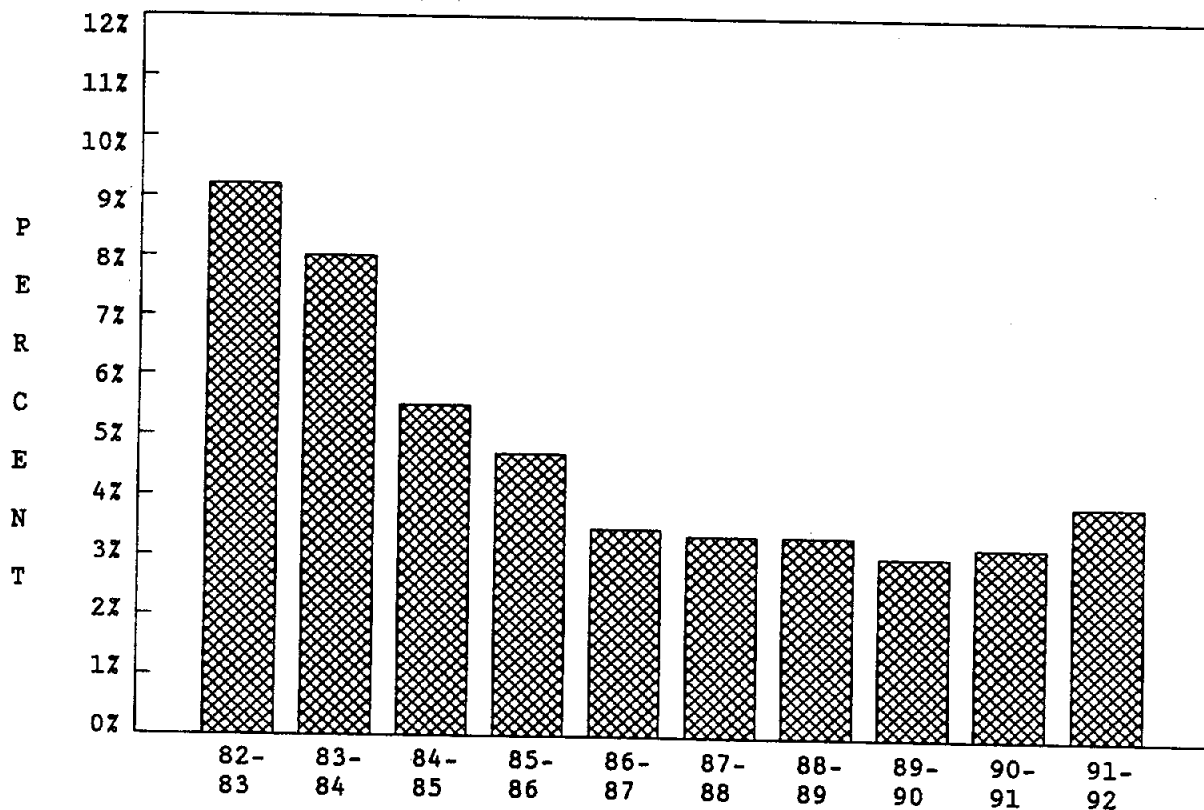

STAFF RATIOS

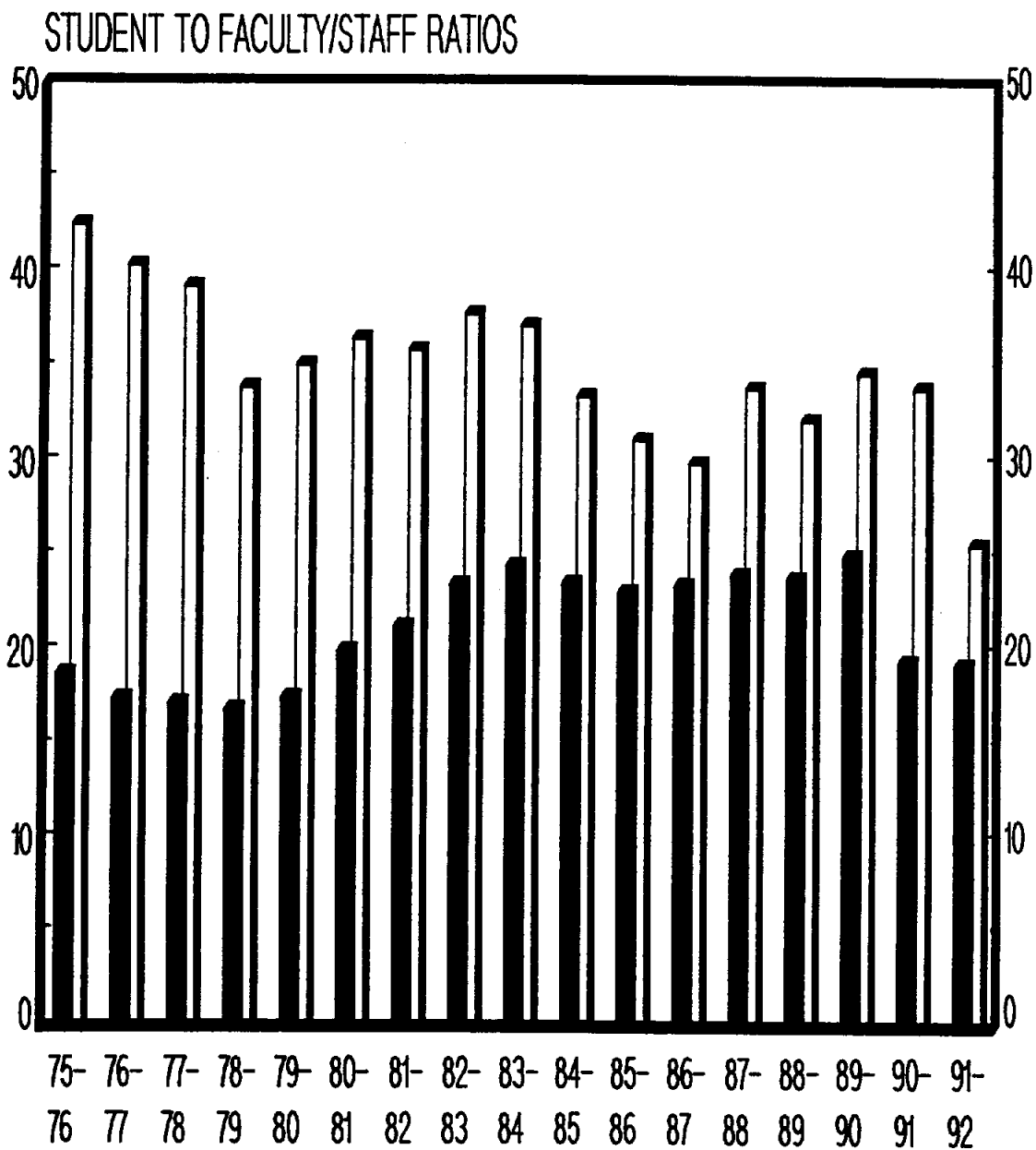

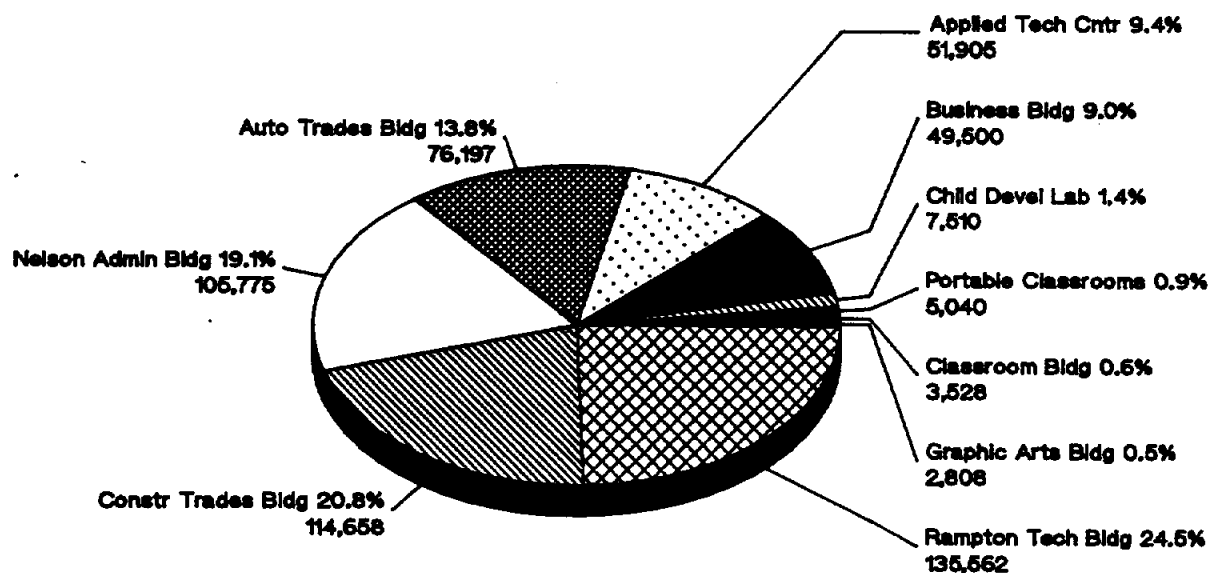

INSTRUCTIONAL BLDGS (GROSS SQUARE FEET)



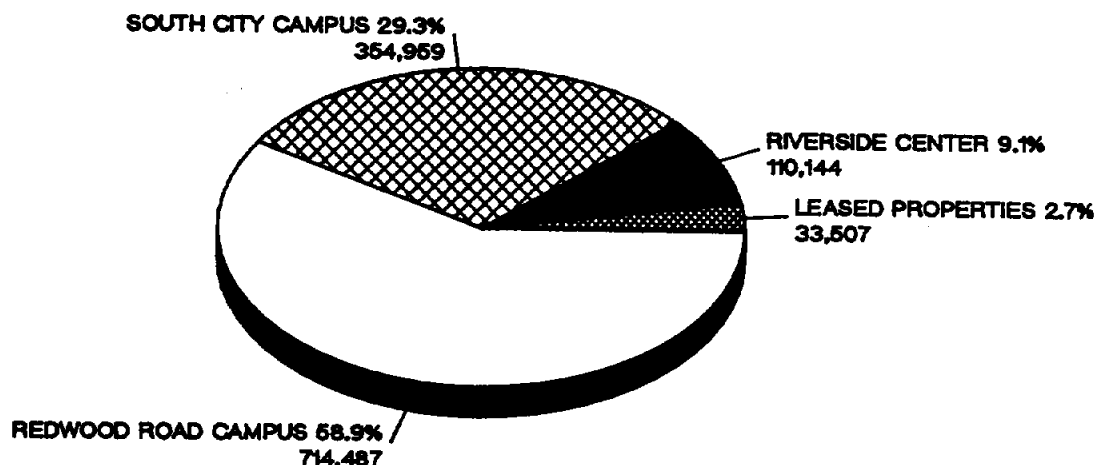

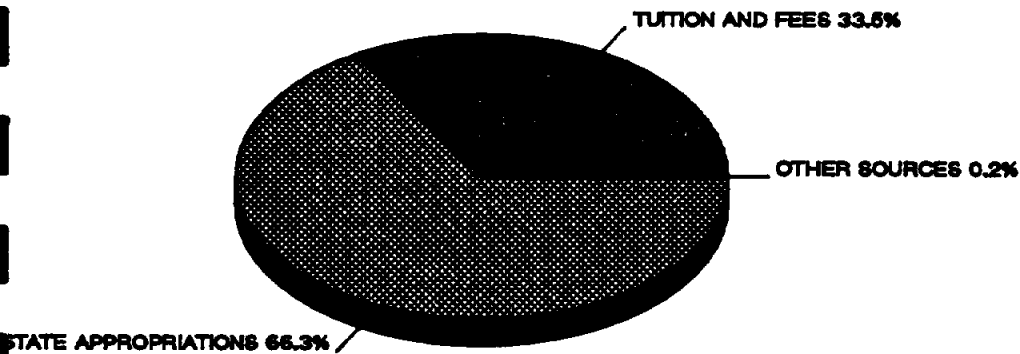

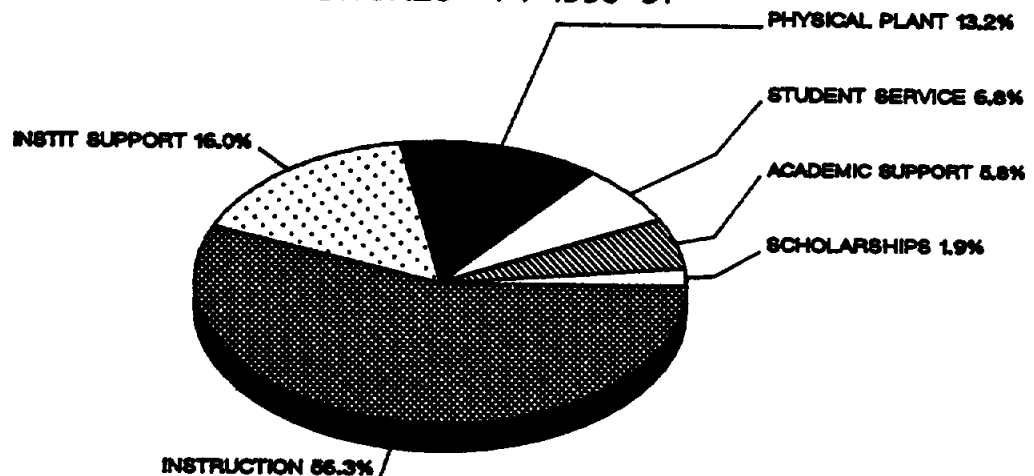

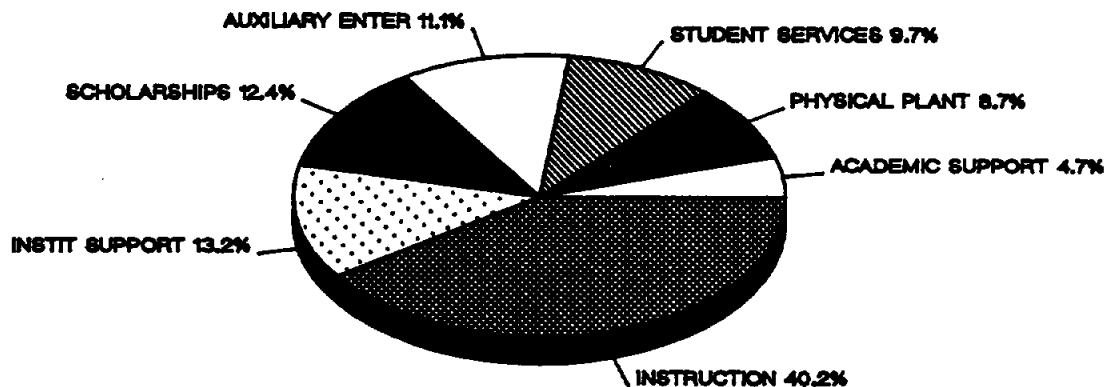
