 ENROLLMENT TRENDS

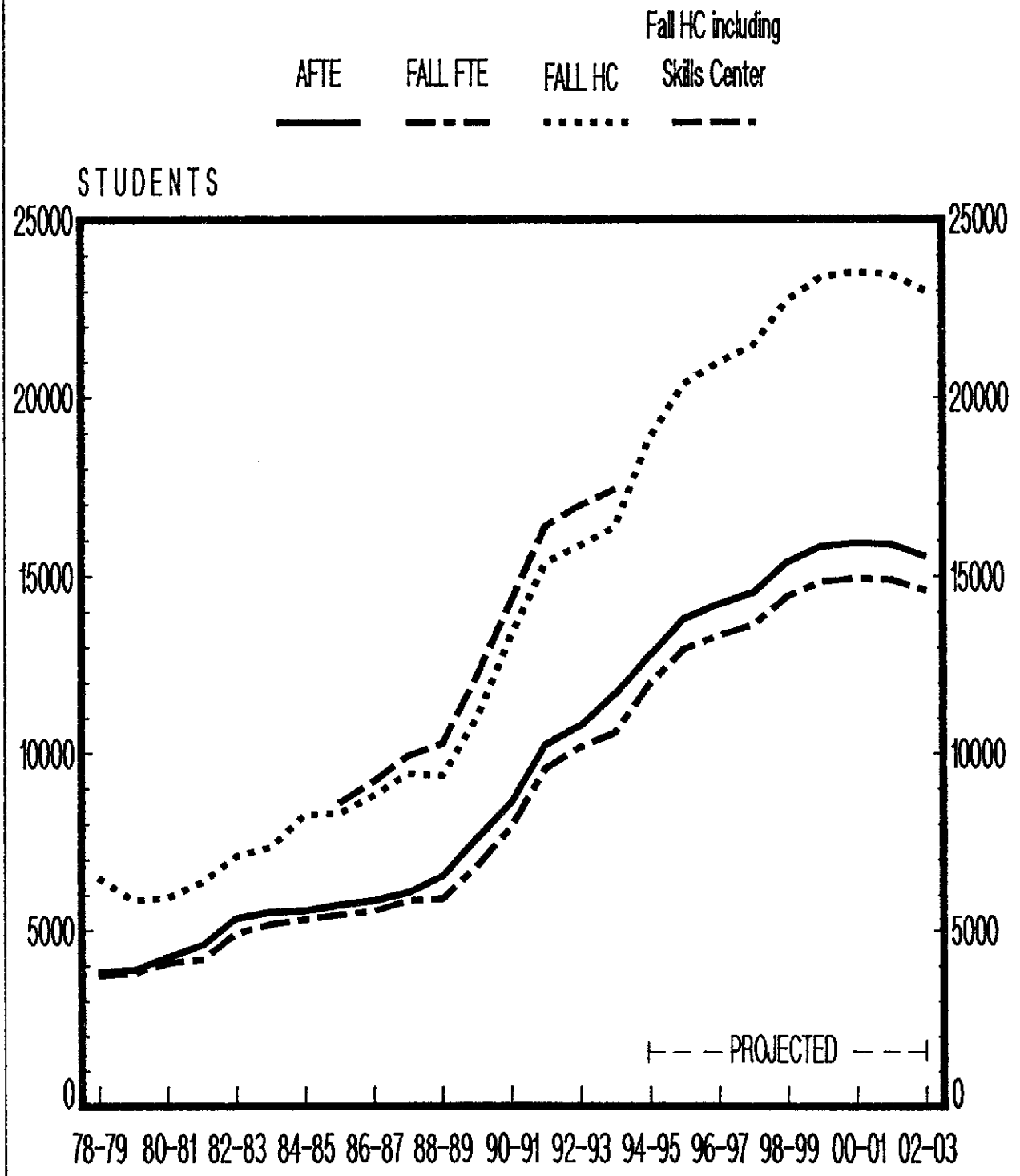

HUMANITIES & SCIENCES BUSINESS & INDUSTRY TECHNOLOGY CONTINUING & COMM ED OTHER

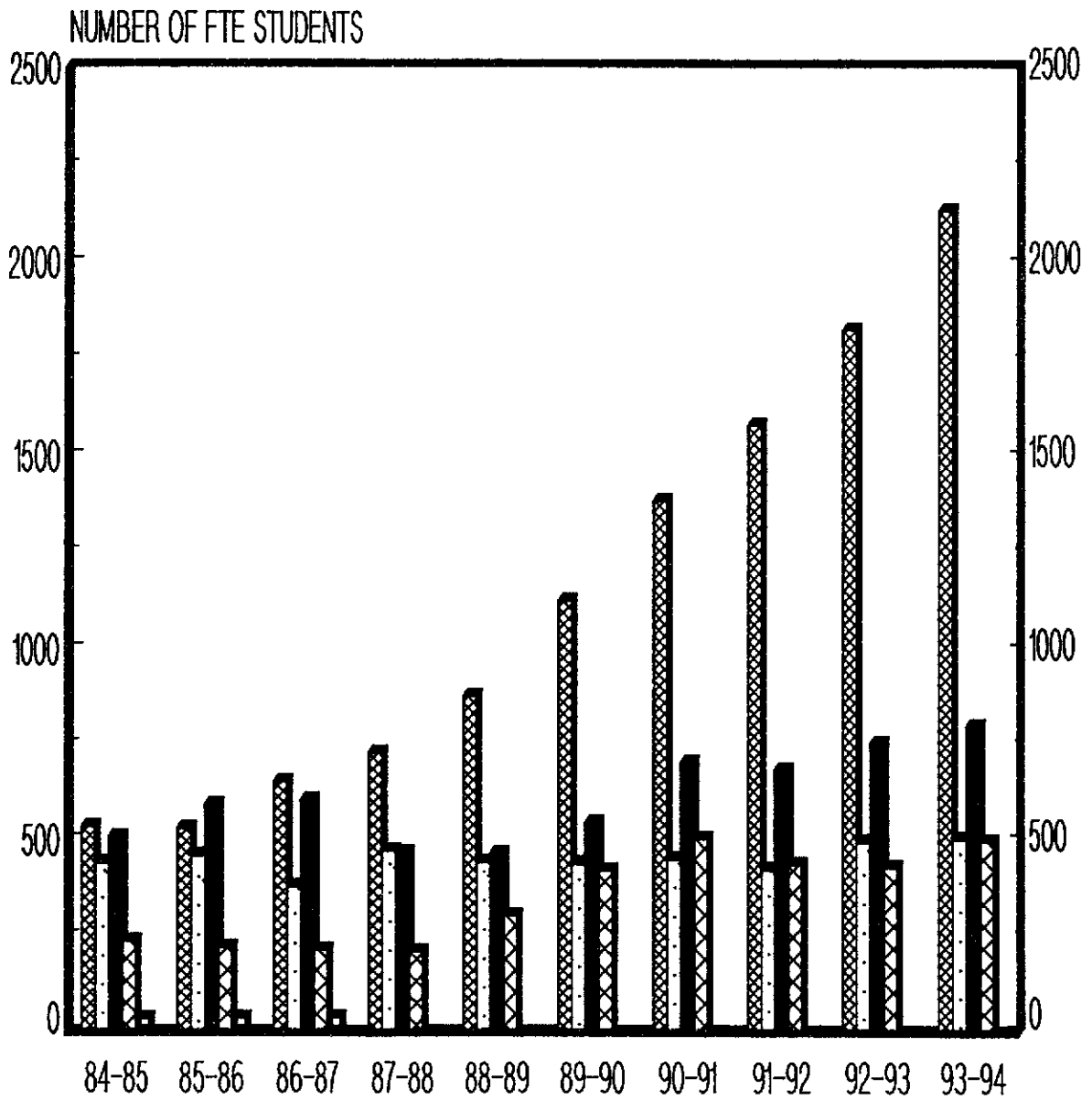

HUMANITIES & SCIENCES BUSINESS & INDUSTRY TECHNOLOGY CONTINUING & COMM ED OTHER

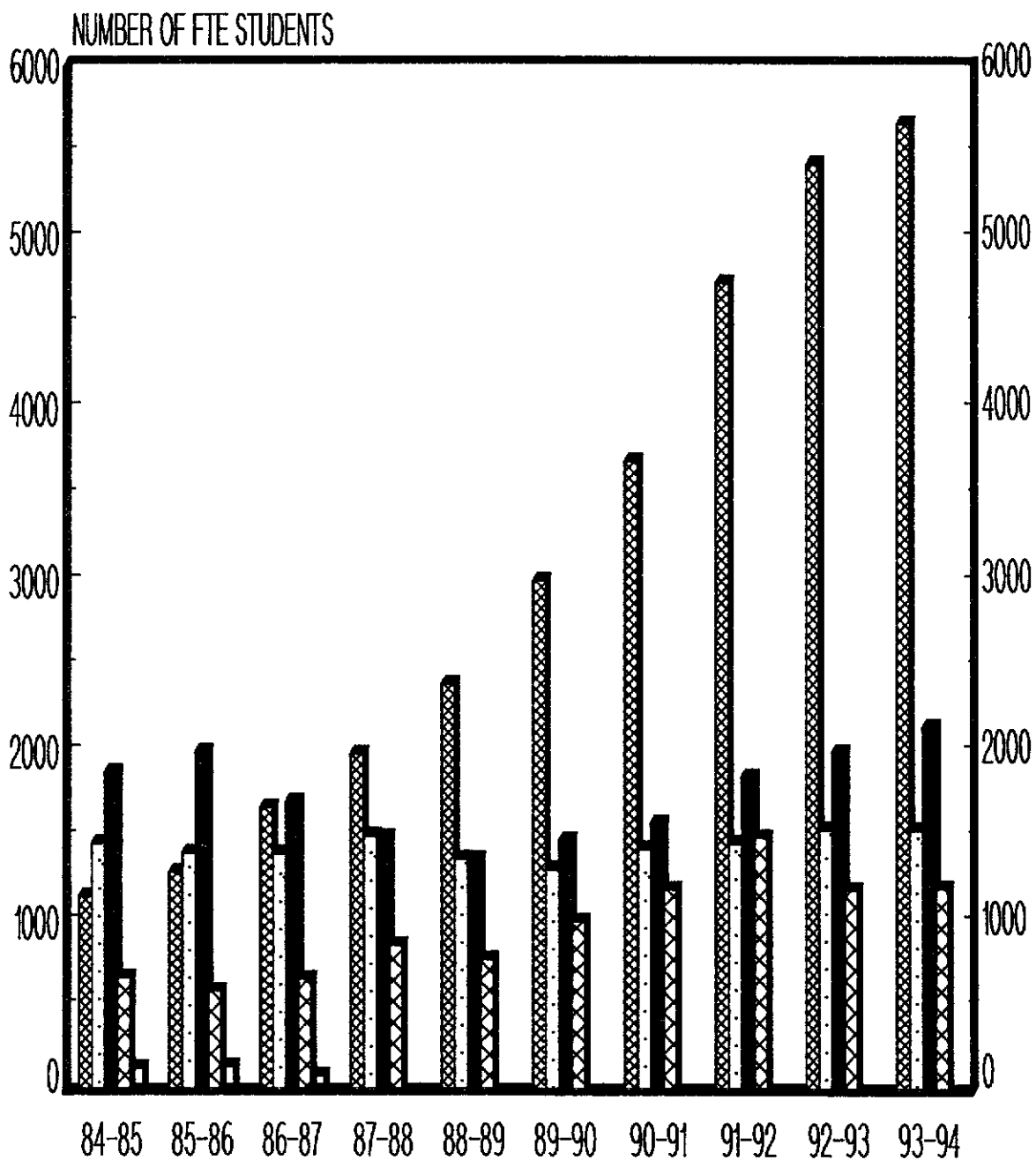

HUMANITIES & SCIENCES BUSINESS & INDUSTRY TECHNOLOGY CONTINUING & COMM ED OTHER

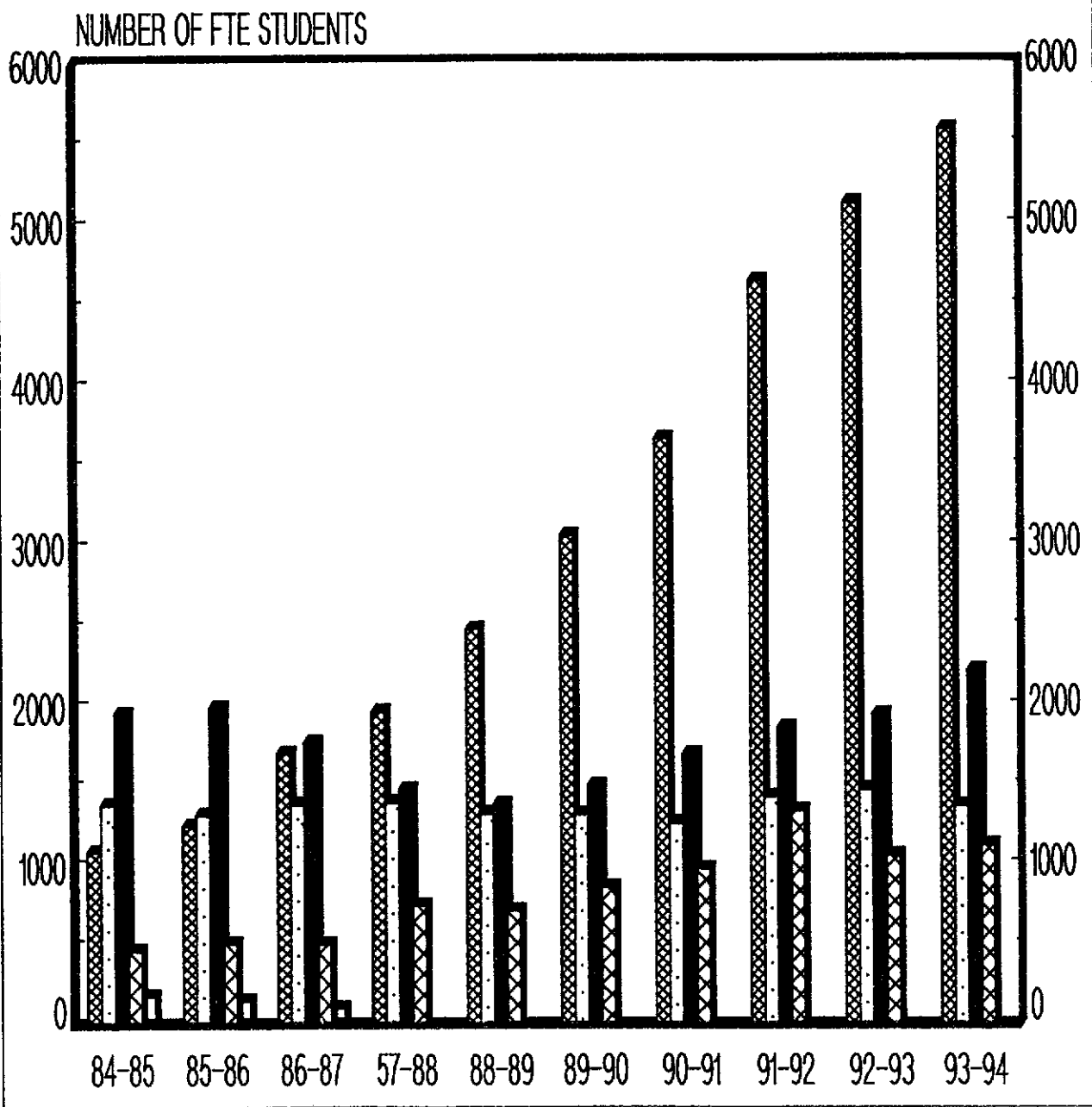

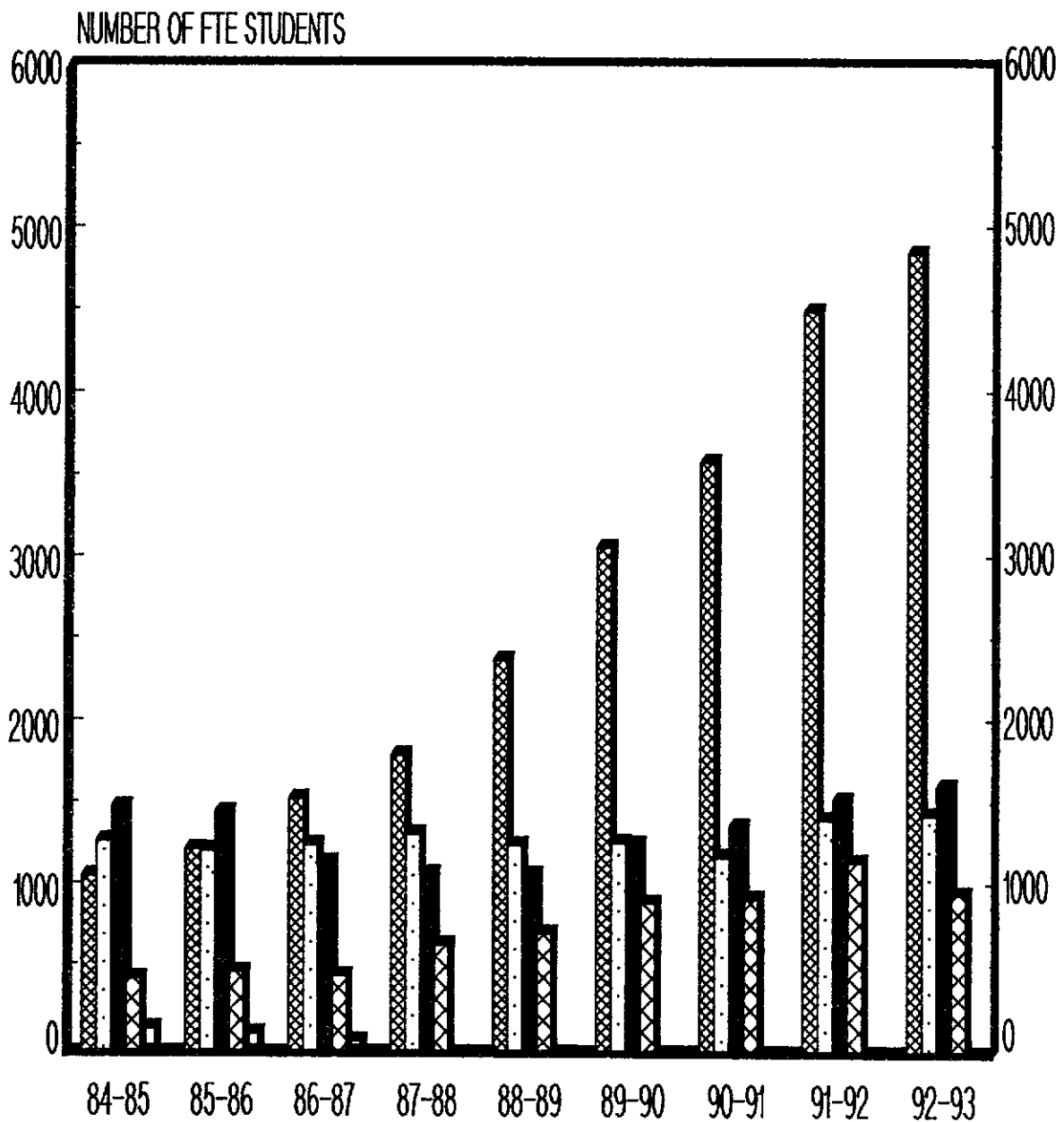

NUMBER OF FTE STUDENTS

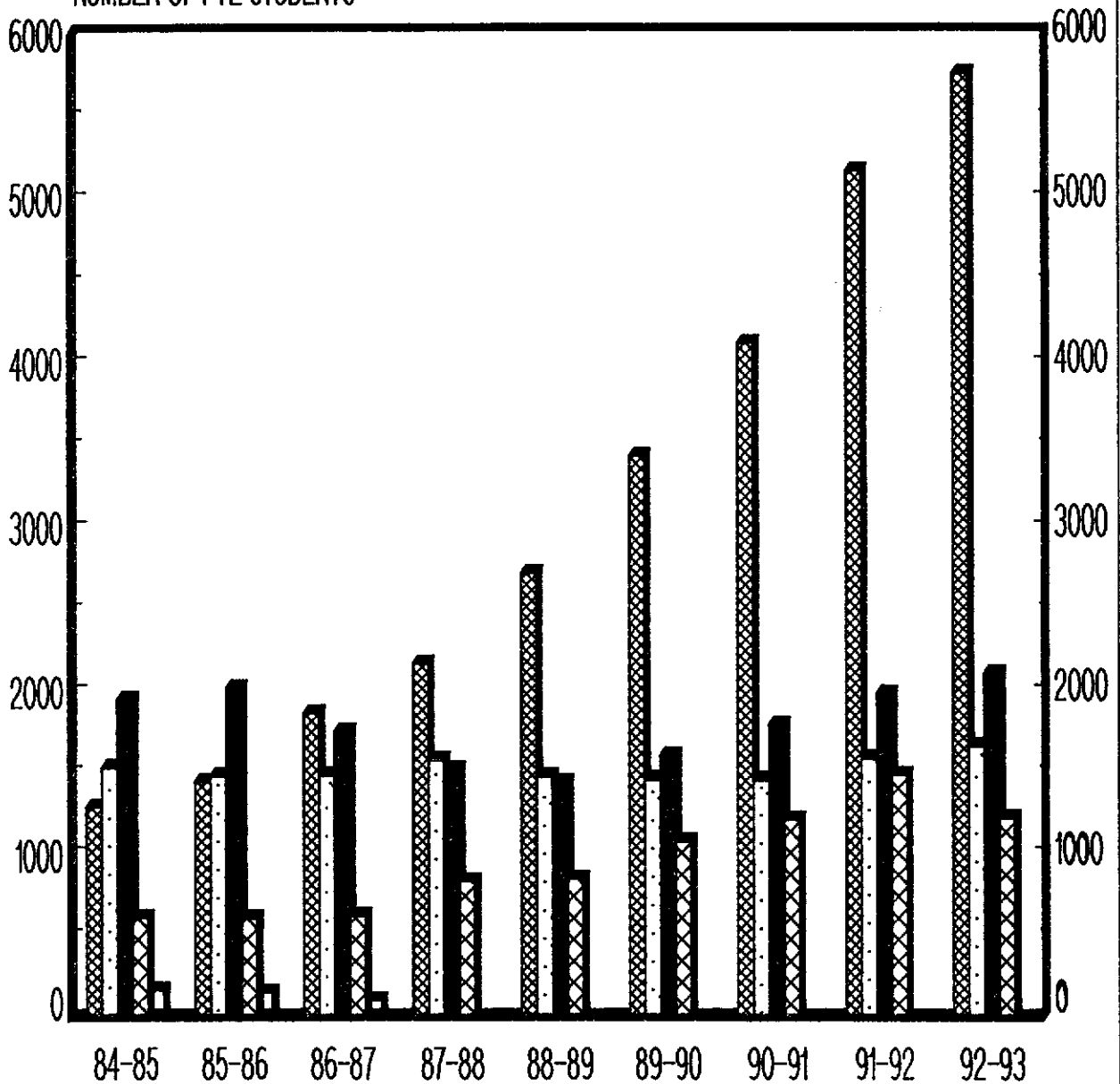

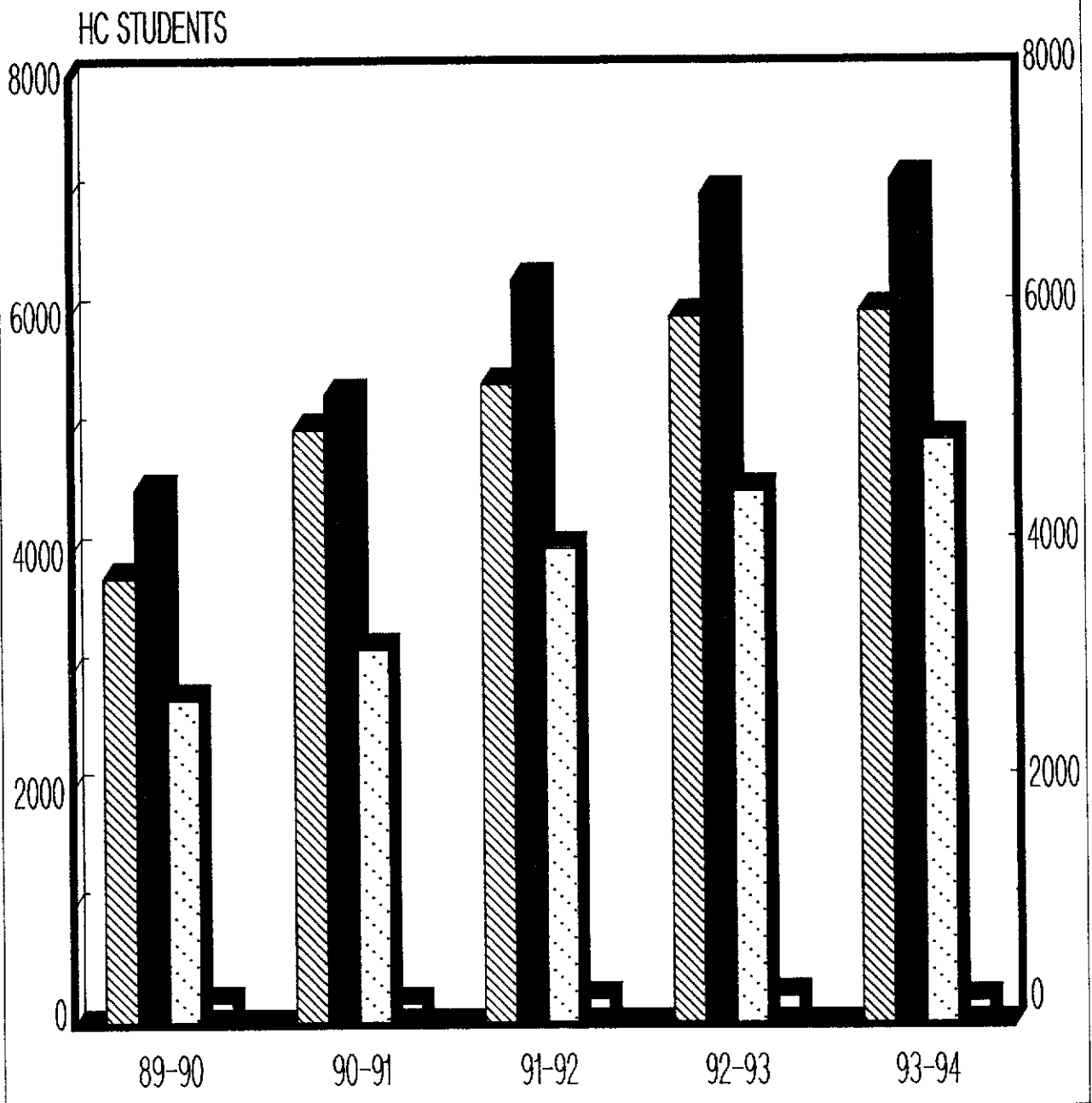

HUMANITIES & SCIENCES BUSINESS & INDUSTRY TECHNOLOGY CONTINUING & COMMED OTHER

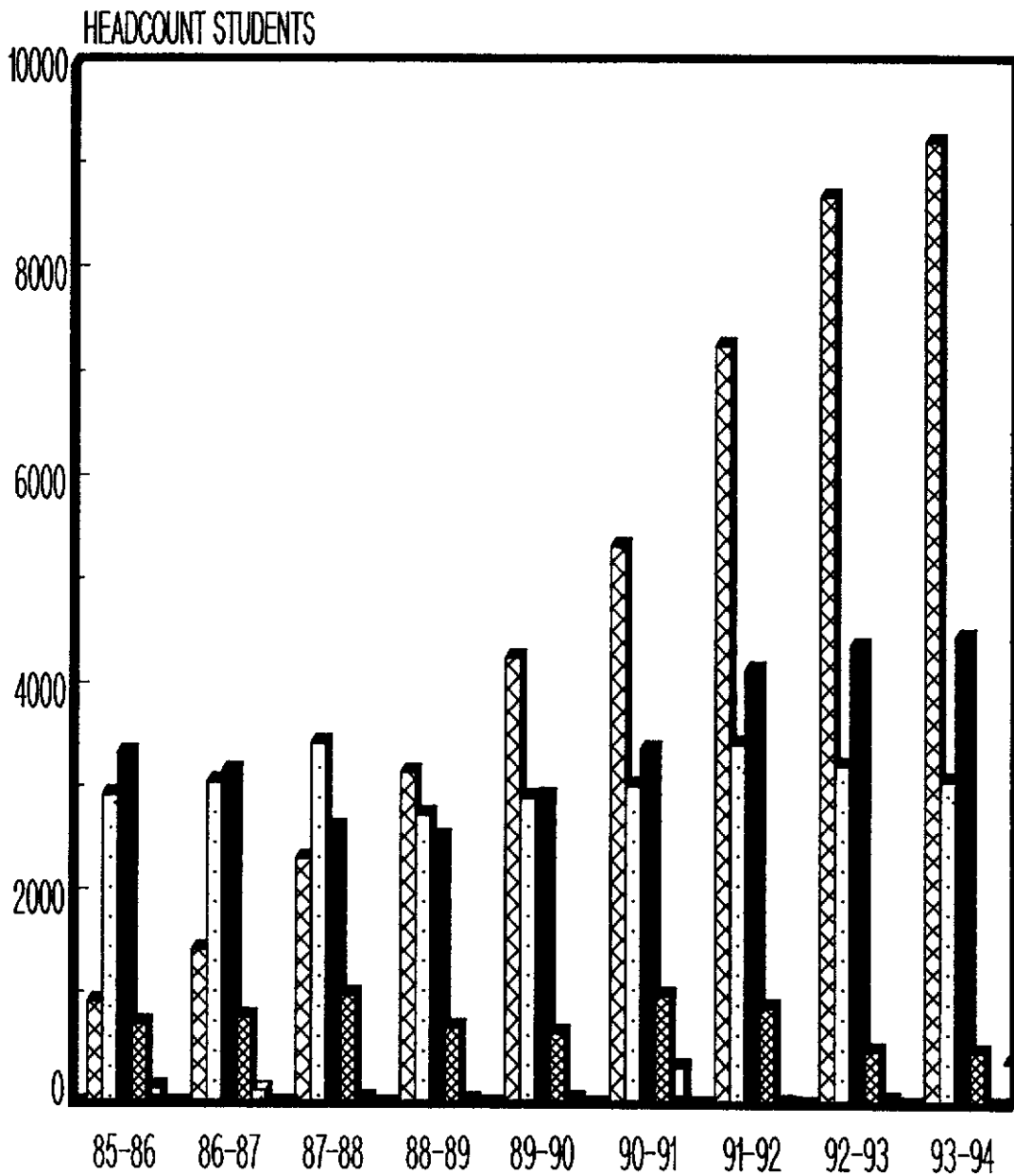

WHERE STUDENTS LIVE BY ZIP CODE ZIP CODES WITH 50 OR MORE STUDENTS

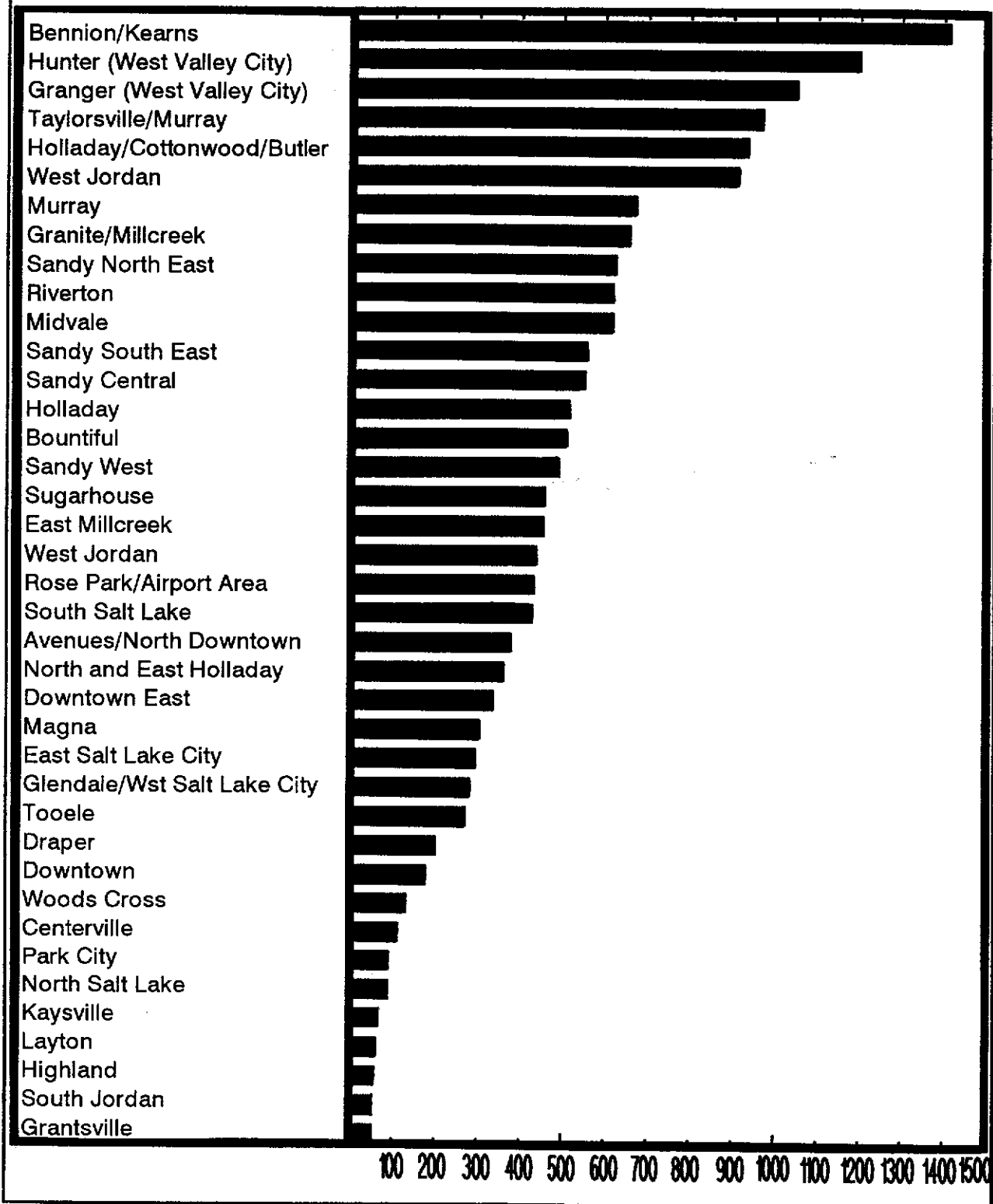

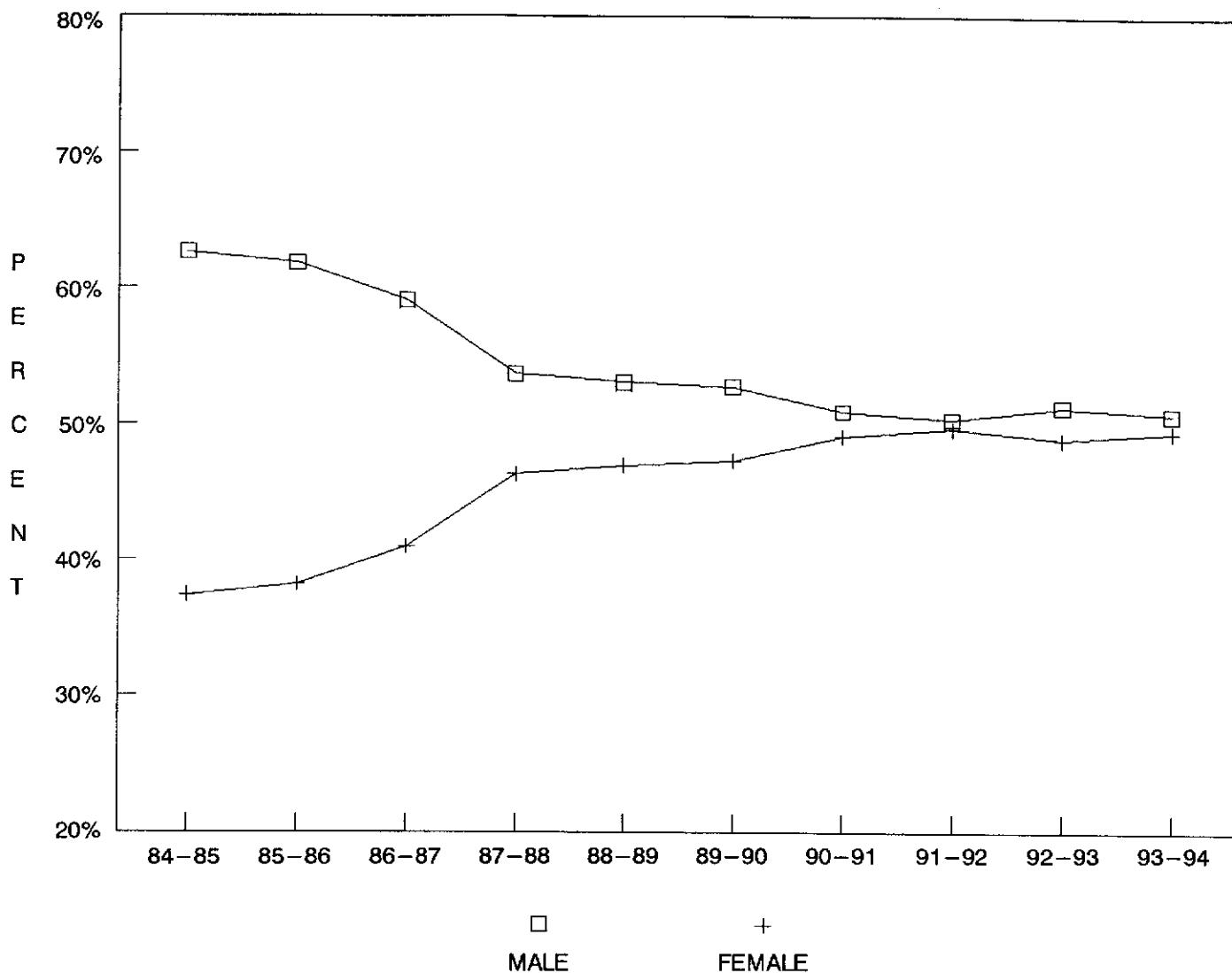

Fall Headcount**

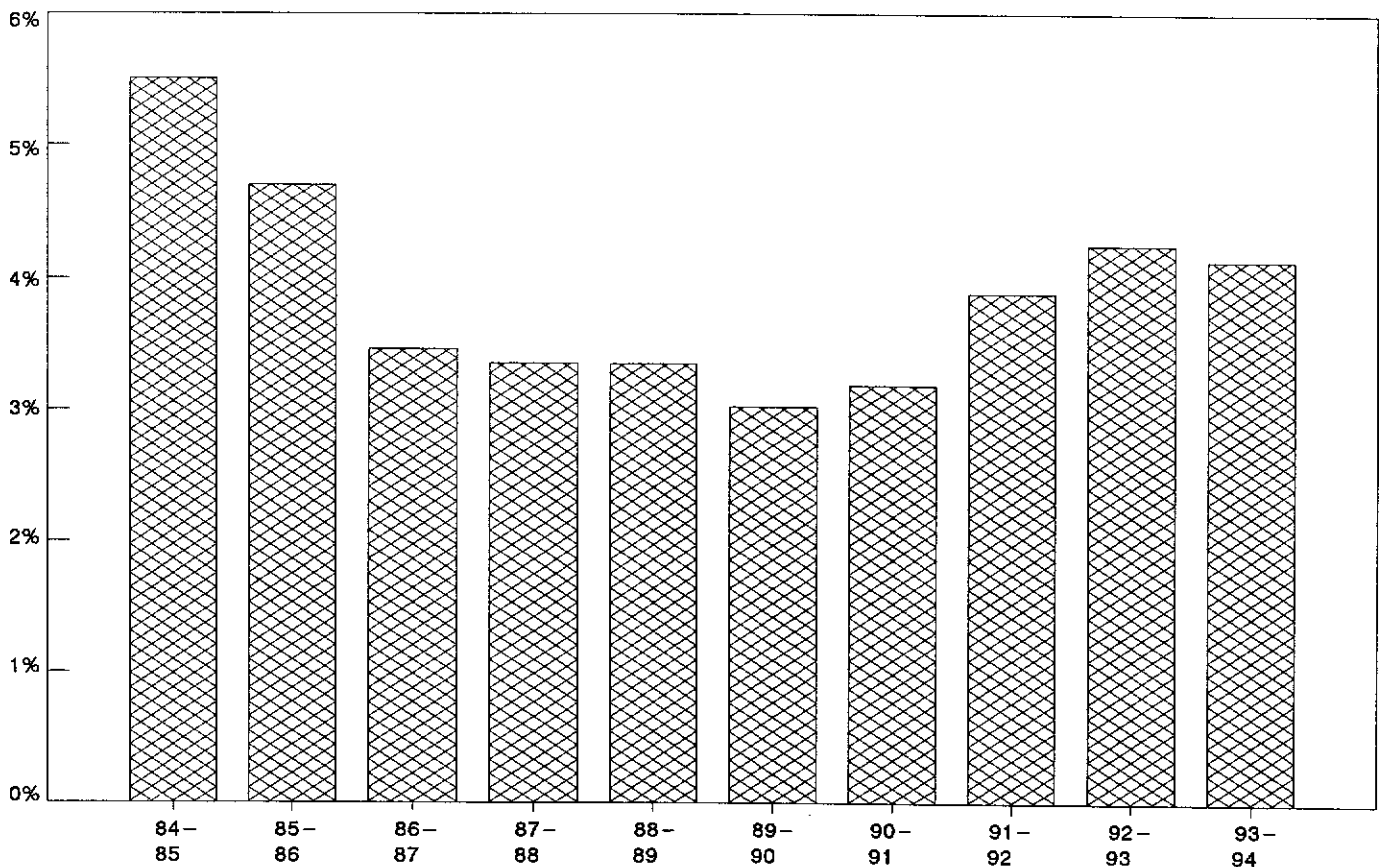

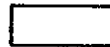

STUDENT TO FACULTY/STAFF RATIOS

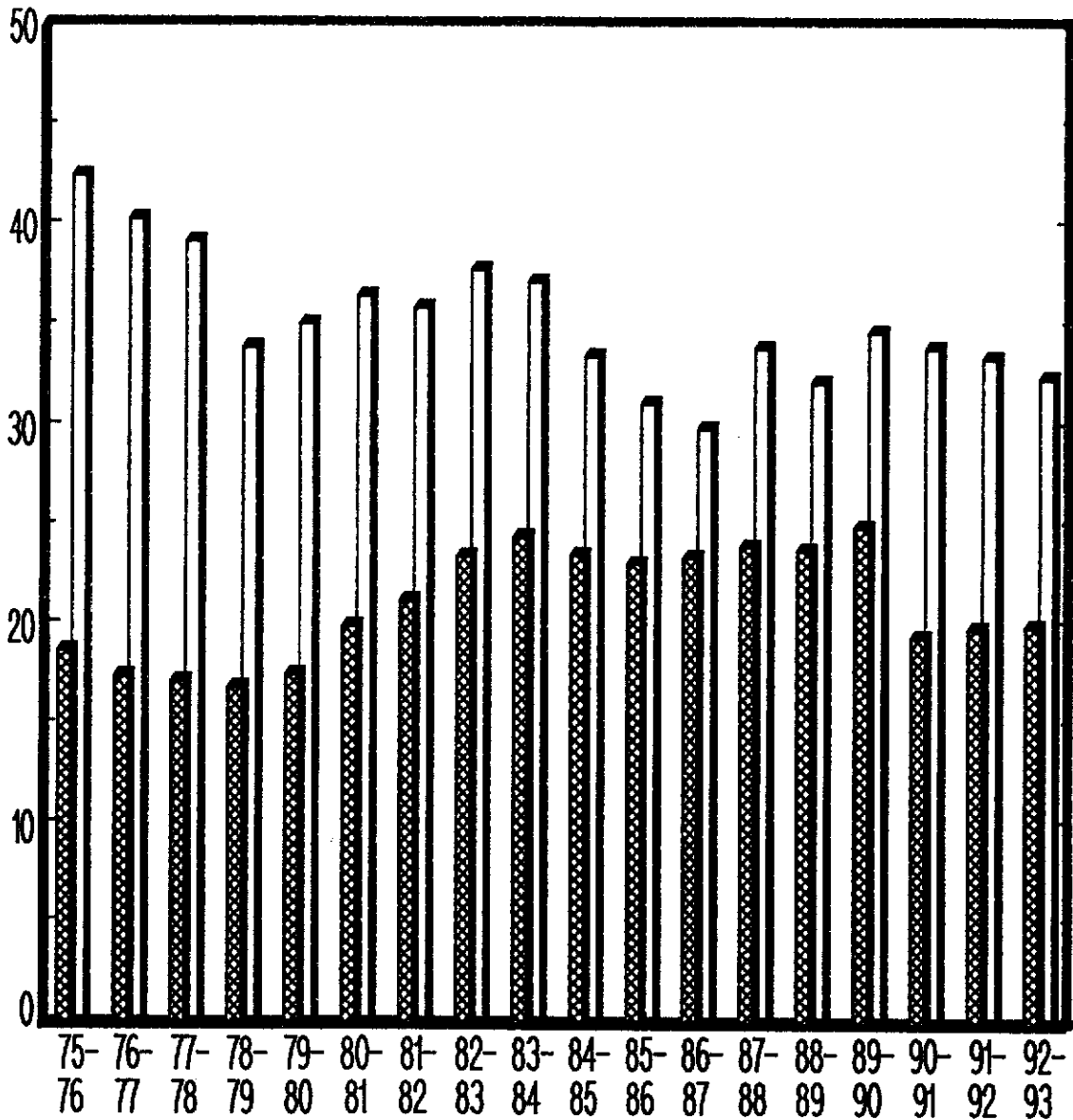

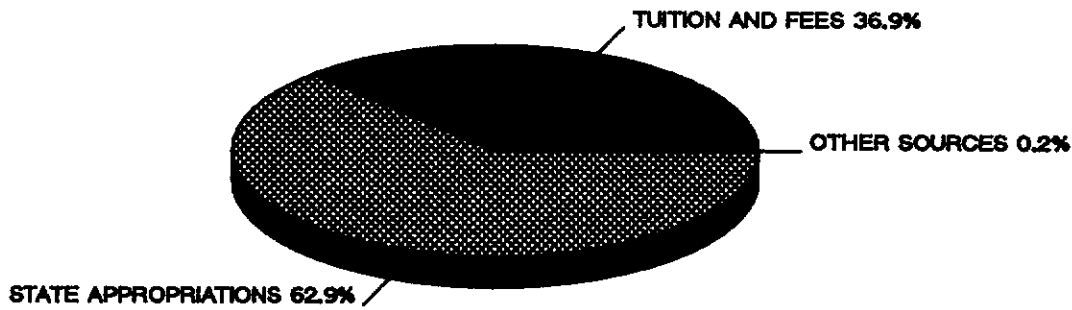

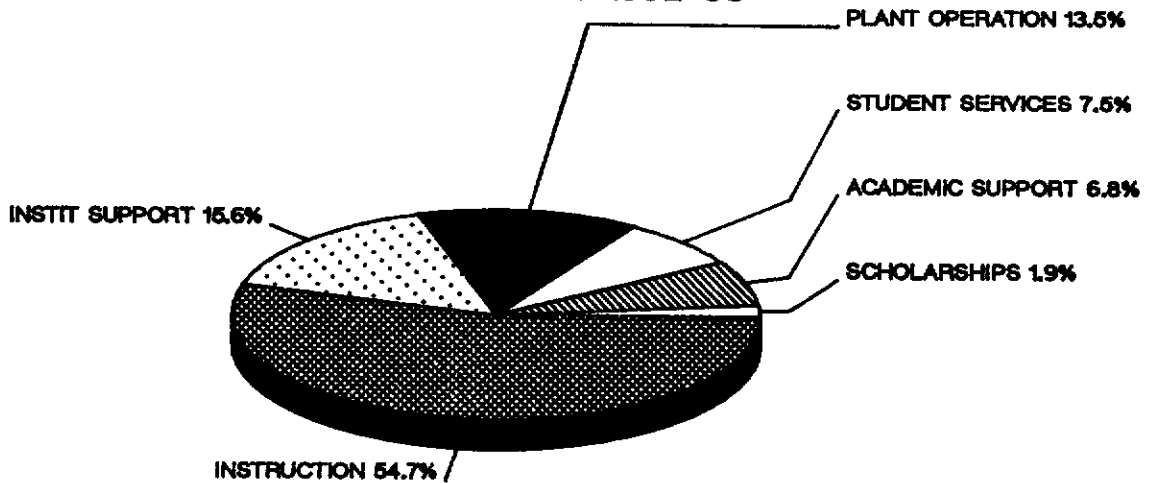

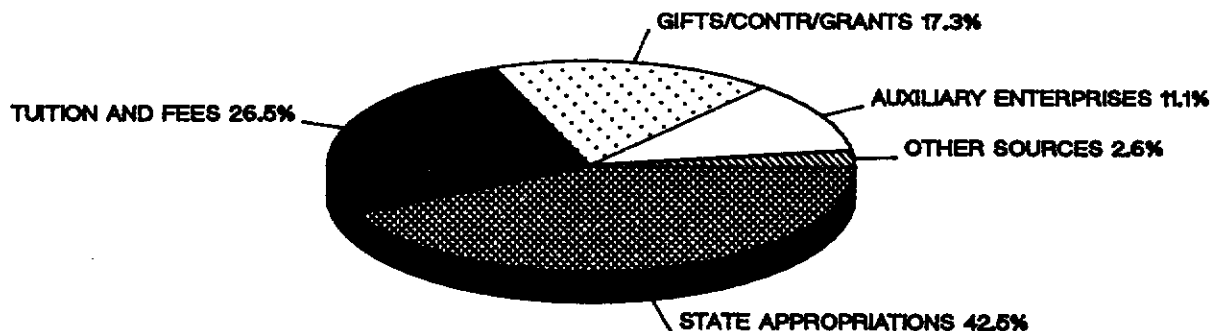

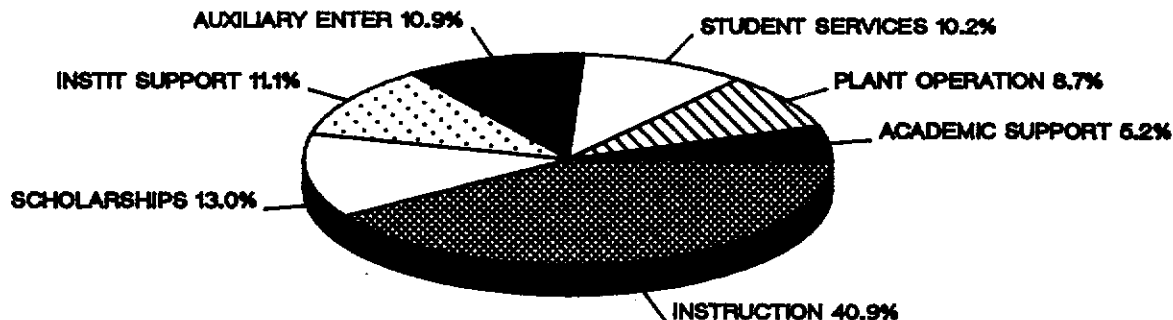

EXPENDITURES - FY 1992-93**



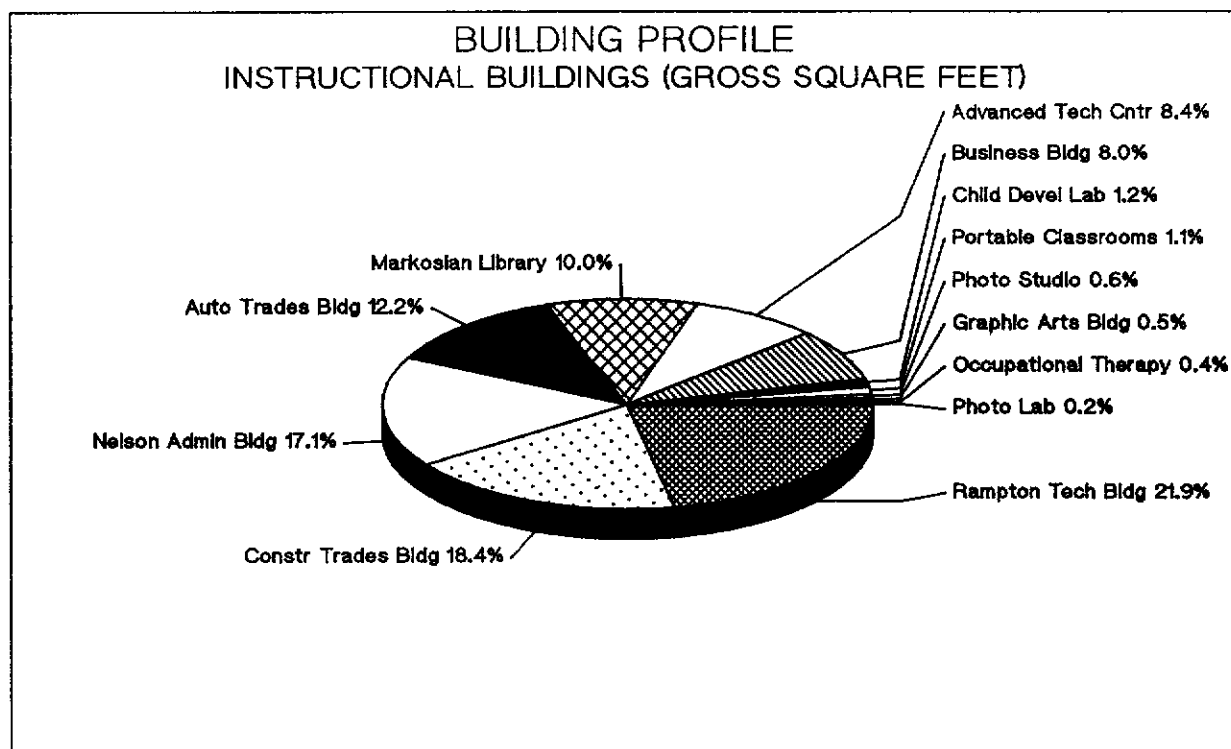

EMPLOYER INPUT**

EXPLANATION OF THE STUDENT AND EMPLOYER FOLLOW-UP SYSTEMS

On a yearly basis Salt Lake Community College conducts a student survey eliciting certain kinds of information about the College. The NON-RETURNING STUDENT FOLLOW-UP is conducted between Fall and Winter Quarter each year. This survey is sent to those students who attended SLCC during Fall Quarter but who did not return Winter Quarter. The GRADUATING STUDENT FOLLOW-UP is collected from students who graduated during the previous academic year. With the student's permission the EMPLOYER FOLLOW-UP is sent to those employers who are reported on either the Non-Returning Student Follow-Up or the Graduating Student Follow-Up survey questionnaires as employing SLCC students.

While the response rate does vary from year to year, we typically receive between 30% and 35% responses from the NON-RETURNING STUDENT FOLLOW-UP questionnaire; 75% to 80% from the GRADUATING STUDENT FOLLOW-UP; and 70% to 80% from the EMPLOYER FOLLOW-UP. Strictly speaking the results cannot be generalized; however, the responses are considered workable and are used in various ways by College faculty, staff and management.

It should be noted that the EMPLOYER FOLLOW-UP is biased, since we do not contact an employer unless given permission by a student. We have included a list of those employers who did respond and a tally of their responses.

Data from each survey instrument is entered into a software package called "**STATISTICAL PACKAGE FOR THE SOCIAL SCIENCES**" and the results are generated directly from those data. The results that are included on the next five pages present each question that was asked of each of the respondents followed by the resulting averages.
