#### REPORT ON THE PROJECT HOUSES

Not everything around the College is coming up roses, according to Mark Pratt, Security chief at Utah Tech.

Of great concern are the facts that during 1980 there have been reported more than 160 thefts; 18 burglaries; 19 vandalisms; and 5 assaults.

And the chief notes that the thefts alone amount to more than \$70,000.00. When one takes into consideration additional damage from vandalism, etc, the monetary loss to the college and campus community is very considerable.

Mark indicates he has a total of only 3 men available, whereas the national ratio of police personnel per thousand population is 2.8. At Utah Tech it is less than 0.5 per thousand.

What can be done? In an effort to be creative in solving the problem, chief Pratt is recommending a reserve officers program, in which he will select men and women to work voluntarily for the security force 20 hours a month.

Prevention through high visibility of security personnel is one major facet of Mark Pratt's plan.
