NEW INTERIOR DESIGN CLASS PLANNED

A new Interior Design class will be offered this quarter on a trial basis as a community service.

Taught by Robert Eberhard the class is planned to run from 5:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Instructors in the Architectural Drafting program will be eyeing the class closely. They want to see whether it may be an appropriate future option for their program.

As a continuing education class there will be no college certificate offered.

POLICE EVENING CLASS SCHEDULED

Beginning January 19 a 200-hour evening program will be offered in training of Police Officers Category 2. The program, offered as a service to the community, is to be taught by instructors from the Utah Police Academy. It is possible some related subjects might be presented by Utah Tech instructors.

Category 2 police officers are differentiated from first line officers (who are required to undergo formal police training at the Academy) in that they have police authority related to their area of responsibility only while on duty, or while in the presence of an offense.

Participants in the program may be security guards, correctional officers, constables and deputy constables, various types of investigators, etc. The course will be offered three nights a week for 3 to 4 hours per night.

The Police Academy will provide the individual's certification upon successful completion of the course.

No matter whether you are a beginner or an advanced skier, the College Center has a great deal for you and your family.

DEFAULTS ON STUDENT LOANS PLUNGE

There has been a dramatic decrease over the past three years of defaults on student loans.

LeNae Williams, Collection Technician, notes that the school used to have one of the highest default percentages in the State - ranging around 28% of student loans three years ago.

A year ago the percentage had been reduced to 15.49%; currently it is at about 12.45%, which brings the institution below the State's average on defaults. And Mrs. Williams is hoping that by the end of the school year the college may be down to about 10% on student defaults.
