LOGAN VOCATIONAL WORKSHOP OPTIONS

The following information is essential knowledge for all faculty, and other employees who may be involved:

The Faculty Credentials Committee indicates that a Before-the-Fact form obtainable from the FCC is required if you are attending some workshop or similar activity other than the "Logan Workshop."

Bob Beebe notes that options are available for credit for participation in the Spring Vocational Workshop at Utah State University. While FCC approval is not required for this particular workshop, you MUST register to receive credit for an option you choose.

Certification or re-certification credit is available for the workshop. In either case you MUST register at the Logan Workshop on Monday morning in your own area.

If you desire, Utah State University credit can be arranged. The number is ITE 505 (Trade and Industrial Tech. Workshop). You can obtain either a "P/F" grade (cost: \$15.00), or a Letter grade (cost: \$32.00). If the letter grade option is selected, a paper must be written describing how the information received at the workshop will be incorporated into your individual curriculum.

ITE 505 can be used for a Bachelors degree, for certification or re-certification, or for "points" through the FCC at the college. It is not good for the M.S. or M.I.E. degrees.

For those who are participating in a workshop other than the "Logan Workshop," U.S.U. credit can be arranged through Bob Beebe for ITE 590 (Special Problems) with up to 3 credit hours for \$15.00. Such credit is good for FCC "points," certification or re-certification, or B.S., M.S. or M.I.E. Credit for curriculum development can also be arranged.

Should you want credit, remember to register for one of the options.

Profile:

JEAN K. LARSEN

'Dean Jean', as she is affectionately known, has been with the college 18 years. She has served in the Service Occupations area as a Practical Nursing instructor, director of the nursing program, department head, division head and dean.

"I have never regretted working for the college," says Jean. "It has provided me many opportunities for personal growth, professional advancement and the privilege of meeting people from all over the United States."

A native of Sugar City, Idaho, Jean Larsen arrived in Salt Lake City when she was 14 and has lived here ever since.

She graduated from East High School, but while yet at that school she became concert-mistress of the McCune Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Frank Asper. She played the violin, practicing 4 to 6 hours every day. She finally relinquished that instrument after a continuing facial sore became a potentially serious problem.

However, music is one her great loves, and Jean reflects this still as she continues as choir director of her L.D.S. ward.

Married to Gene M. Larsen from Manti, a retired welder and layout fabrication specialist, the couple have a girl and 4 boys.

Charlene worked for the college several years ago (and is now married with 4 children of her own); each of the boys has attended and graduated from Utah Technical College. Their diversification of talents is interesting: the boys have graduated in Commercial Art; Business Management; Building Construction; and Welding.

Jean got her start in nursing at St. Marks Hospital, where she participated in the Nurse Cadet Corps during World War II. Her father initially was dead-set against nursing as a career, but later in life began to appreciate the service rendered by professional nursing care on an occasion when he needed that assistance.

The Nurse Cadet Corps provided nursing credits which were also accepted by the University of Utah, and Jean subsequently completed requirements for her Bachelors degree in nursing education. More recently she has received a Master's degree in educational administration, granted by Brigham Young University.

She has worked for Shriners Hospital, St. Marks Hospital, the old Salt Lake County Hospital and Holy Cross Hospital. Starting as a staff nurse, she has also filled supervisory positions including that of Director of Nursing at Holy Cross.

One of Mrs. Larsen's many attributes is that once she leaves work she turns off the professional challenges of the day, and moves on to her role of homemaker, wife, mother and grandmother. It is a role she would like to pursue - when she no longer has to moonlight full-time!
