Math and English Placement – Accuplacer or ACT scores are required to register for Math or English classes unless you have completed the prerequisite course with a "C" grade or higher. Test scores and/or prerequisite courses must be no more than 1 year old for Math classes and no more than 2 years old for English classes.

#### **AUDITING CLASSES**

Students may audit most SLCC classes for the purpose of the learning opportunity it provides, according to the following conditions:

- Tuition and fees will be assessed at the same rate for audited classes as those taken for credit.
- Students are not required to attend, take exams, or otherwise participate in classes they are auditing.
- Students do not receive Attempted or Earned credit hours for audited classes.
- Audited classes appear on student transcripts with an AU grade, which is not calculated in term or cumulative grade-point averages.
- Audited classes are not counted as part of student enrollment status.
- Students will not be awarded financial aid nor receive veterans benefits for audited classes.
- Audited classes will not be considered part of Satisfactory Progress for financial aid purposes.

Students should declare their intent to audit a class at the time of registration and before the DROP deadline. Exceptions may be recommended by the appropriate administrative authority. For information about Senior Citizens auditing classes, please see "Senior Citizens" section.

#### **CHALLENGING CLASSES**

Students who feel that their experience or previous knowledge would enable them to successfully challenge a course offered at SLCC may apply to take a challenge examination. Such examinations may be taken at any time during the semester at \$25 per class challenged, payable before taking the examination. Challenge examinations are not available in all classes. Students should not register for the class they plan to challenge. Classes previously taken, including those audited or failed, may not be challenged. Credits earned by challenge examinations do not contribute to enrollment status for financial aid or veterans' benefits. Upon successful completion of the examination and other specified requirements, the course will appear on the student's transcript with a "P" grade. Failed challenge exams will not be recorded on a student's transcript. Credit earned by challenge exam is not counted as in-residence credit. Contact the Assessment Center at (801) 957-4269 for further information.

#### **CLASS ATTENDANCE POLICY**

CLASSES ARE NOT AUTOMATICALLY DROPPED FOR NON-ATTENDANCE OR NON-PAYMENT. Students are expected to manage their class loads and personally drop classes they will not be attending as early in the semester as possible. **Tuition will be charged for classes not dropped, regardless of attendance status** (see Refunds and/or Adjustments to Tuition). Students hoping to add a course are also encouraged to attend that course on the first day of class.

In order to maximize registration opportunities for all students, students are **required to attend one of the first two class meetings** of all regularly scheduled classes that meet more than once per week. Students who are unable to attend one of the first two class meetings because of extenuating circumstances must inform the instructor or department office, preferably in writing, that they will be in attendance at the subsequent meetings and do not want the class dropped.

#### REGISTRATION AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

#### **CLASS ATTENDANCE POLICY Continued**

Students not in attendance who have not contacted the instructor prior to the end of the second class meeting, MAY be dropped from the course by the instructor. Students enrolled in classes that meet once per week are required to attend the <u>first</u> class meeting or risk an Administrative Drop for Non-Attendance. Students enrolled in classes of high demand and/or limited availability are particularly vulnerable to a drop for non-attendance. Students dropped will receive full credit for tuition paid. Both dropping and reinstatement are at the instructor's discretion during the first 20% of the term (see Calendar for specific calendar dates).

#### DROP/WITHDRAWAL

You are responsible for dropping or withdrawing from classes you are not attending or do not intend to complete in the current semester. You can drop/withdraw by the published deadline dates on MyPage at <a href="www.slcc.edu">www.slcc.edu</a>. If you are receiving Financial Aid or Veteran benefits please notify the appropriate office when dropping classes. Withdrawals will be shown as a "W" on the transcript and are not calculated as part of the grade-point average (GPA). There are no refunds for withdrawn classes. If you stop attending classes without dropping/withdrawing by the published deadlines, you will receive an "E" grade, which is calculated in your GPA.

#### FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Students receiving any type of financial aid must complete all classes. Failure to complete classes may result in a repayment of financial aid or a cancellation of future aid. Please check with the Financial Aid Office before dropping or withdrawing from courses. Complete information can be found in the catalog and at all Financial Aid Offices. Financial aid, which includes grants, loans, work-study, tuition waivers and some scholarships, is not available for all programs of study. Any classes taken in these areas are not eligible for financial aid, no matter what program of study a student is in.

#### **HOLDS**

Holds must be cleared from your record. (e.g. past due tuition, parking, library fines, day care, etc.) To view holds go to  $\rightarrow$  www.slcc.edu  $\rightarrow$  MyPage  $\rightarrow$  student tab.

#### ID CARDS - OneCard

Salt Lake Community College's OneCard is more than just a school identification card for students and employees. It allows you discounts and passage into campus events, computer labs, the testing centers, and the Lifetime Activities Center. You are also able to check out books and other materials from the SLCC libraries, use printers in labs, and allows students to vote for student officers. The OneCard can also function as an on campus debit card that allows students, staff, and faculty to make purchases at all College Food Service locations, all College Bookstore locations, The Quick Stop, The Lair, SC Paid Parking, Eccles Child Care Services, and Copy Centers. Students can also make tuition and parking permit payments with their OneCard. To have funds deposited into your Bruin Bucks account, visit a cashier's office, ID Center location, or information desk location.

You can get your OneCard picture taken at the Redwood ID Center (main level Information Desk 801-957-4022), the South City Campus ID Center (E148, 801-957-3407), the Jordan Campus ID Center (Information Desk, 957-2600), the Sandy Campus ID Center (B108, 957-5890), or the Miller ID Center (PSET 801-957-5444). You must be enrolled in current semester classes and present another form of picture ID to obtain an SLCC OneCard. There is no charge for the initial OneCard for students (\$10 for staff), and it is valid for as long as the student is registered or the employee is working at the college. If your OneCard is lost or stolen, it is your responsibility to notify any of the ID Centers immediately. A fee will be assessed for replacement cards. #### REGISTRATION AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

#### **ORIENTATION**

New students must complete a new student orientation to be eligible to register for courses before the open registration period. Completing a new student orientation will allow new students to register up to ten week earlier than those who do not complete an orientation. Orientation programs are designed to help students get started and take advantage of the services, facilities, and opportunities available at SLCC. Visit the Orientation website at <a href="https://www.slcc.edu/orientation">www.slcc.edu/orientation</a> for more information on orientation and early registration, as well as for dates, times, and locations of these orientation programs.

#### **PARKING**

Parking permits are required at Taylorsville Redwood Campus, South City Campus, Jordan Campus and Meadowbrook Campus. Permits may be purchased at the Taylorsville Redwood Campus Parking Services (GFSB 103), Courtesy Desk, or Cashier, South City Campus Cashier, South City Student Center Desk; Jordan Campus Cashier and Jordan Courtesy Desk. To obtain a parking permit, you will need to bring a current vehicle registration. A sticker will be given with one vehicle registration. A hangtag will be issued with two or more vehicle registrations. Parking permits must be placed on the front windshield on the lower left corner (driver's side). Stickers must be entirely attached with its own adhesive backing. Permits must be displayed properly as per instructions on the back of the permits to be valid. It is the driver's responsibility to park legally on all campuses and to display a valid parking permit. We will not replace permits that are lost or stolen; it is your responsibility to purchase a new one. To replace a damaged permit requires returning 75% of the current permit with a small fee. Meters are available at all campuses for visitors to park with meter fee paid.

#### PRIORITY TICKET

When you complete registration for a course online, but receive an error message because the course is full, you automatically will be issued a Priority Ticket. This allows you an opportunity to register for the same course the following semester during a special Priority Ticket early registration. Priority Tickets generated Spring are valid for Summer and Fall semesters. Priority Tickets generated Fall semester are valid for Spring semester. If you receive a Priority Ticket, SLCC will contact you by mail and email a few weeks before the next semester's registration period with details about your early registration options for the following semester. If the student adds the same class during the semester, the Priority Ticket will be cancelled. Obtaining a Priority Ticket for a specific course does not change prerequisite requirements for that course. Be sure to check for other open sections of the class, as you may still register for any open sections of this class during the current semester until the ADD deadline (5<sup>th</sup> business day of semester).

#### **REGISTER ONLINE**

Once you have applied for admissions and have been accepted at the College, registering for classes at Salt Lake Community College is easy to do. Login to  $MyPage \rightarrow Student Tab \rightarrow Registration Tools$ , and select your preferred option: Registration Status, Look Up Classes, Add or Drop Classes, or Change Class Options.

#### **REPEATING CLASSES**

You may repeat a course when a low grade has been received. The original grade remains on the record and the course is marked as a repeated course. The highest grade received will then be used to calculate your cumulative grade-point average. Please notify Enrollment Services when you have repeated a class.

#### **SCHEDULE CONFIRMATION**

A copy of your schedule is available on MyPage at www.slcc.edu under Student Tab → Student Detailed Schedule.

#### **SENIOR CITIZENS**

Utah residents who are age 62 and over may enroll in classes for a reduced fee under the following conditions:

- Space
- Classes will be taken on an AUDIT basis (no college credit)
- A \$10.00 registration fee per semester is required (plus books, supplies, parking, lab fees, etc.)

Senior citizens taking classes for credit or seeking a degree must pay regular tuition and fees and be subject to the same standards and regulations as other students.

#### STUDENT LOAD

Maximum student load is 20 credit hours. Students desiring more than 20 hours must obtain written approval from the Division Chair of their major subject. Enrollment for twelve or more credit hours constitutes full-time status.

#### TUITION AND FEES ARE DUE ON OR BEFORE PAYMENT DEADLINE

Approval for more than 20 credit hours must be obtained from the appropriate division chairperson. Each credit hour in excess of 21 is charged an additional tuition rate of \$96.00 per resident credit hour, \$335.00 per non-resident credit hour, and \$48.00 per apprenticeship credit hour.

## <u>\$50.00 Late Payment Fee</u> will be charged to all student accounts with unpaid Tuition and Fees.

Failure to officially drop classes will result in failing grades. Failure to attend classes does not constitute an official drop. There are no automatic drops. Instructors are not responsible for dropping classes, all students must personally drop classes listed in their computer records by the refund deadline (see Refunds And Adjustments to Tuition).

#### Disclosure of Higher Education Cost as per the provisions of House Bill 248

Full-time undergraduate resident students at SLCC paying a semester tuition and fee amount of \$1,329.75 contribute an estimated 38% to the full cost of instruction per full-time student of \$3,471.00. The remaining support for the full cost of instruction is provided by \$2,141.25 of state tax funds and \$0 of other institutional revenue sources. Based on 2008-2009 Tuition Rates.

#### APPLY FOR THE SEMESTER TUITION INSTALLMENT LOAN (STIL) ONLINE

The Semester Tuition Installment Loan (STIL) is a way to spread your tuition costs throughout the semester. STIL's are for tuition, student fees and class fees ONLY. A STIL does not reduce your financial obligation to the college, but offers an alternative to a single payment. There are four installments for fall and spring semesters, and three for the summer. The down payment installment must be paid at the time you submit your application. There is \$30 non-refundable application fee for the STIL. Payments are due the 10th of the month.

You must be 18 years of age to complete the Online STIL. If you are not 18 years of age, you must submit a printed STIL application, with a co-signers signature, in person at any of the cashier locations.

## REFUNDS AND/OR ADJUSTMENTS TO TUITION

Refunds on tuition are based on the date you officially drop classes regardless of class attendance. Any tuition and fees for classes which are cancelled by the college will be refunded.

**Non-Refundable Fees include:** Admission Fees, Semester Tuition Installment Loan (STIL) Application Fees, Shop Cards and Testing Fees.

**Financial Aid Students:** Refunds and adjustments to tuition and fees will be returned to the applicable Financial Aid/Title IV programs. If you received a Financial Aid Remainder Check, you will need to repay SLCC any over-awarded financial aid.

**REFUNDS:** Refunds for tuition paid with cash, personal checks or WebChecks are deposited per student request to the student's bank account, or mailed as a refund check to the current address on the student's account. **CREDIT CARD REFUNDS:** Refunds for tuition paid with Debit/Credit cards will be credited to the original credit card after the last day to drop classes. **DISHONORED CHECKS:** All dishonored checks are charged a \$20.00 fee and must be paid within 15 days. If not paid, additional fees are assessed. Call (801) 957-4557 for information.

**COLLECTION POLICY:** Financial debts and obligations are pursued to the fullest extent of the law. This includes, but is not limited to, HOLDS on registration, transcripts, grades, and graduation; liens against Utah Income Tax refunds; referrals to collection agencies; and litigation. Interest will accrue on all unpaid balances.

#### ALCOHOL/DRUG CAMPUS POLICY

SLCC code prohibits possession, consumption or distribution of hallucinogenic, narcotic or other illegal drugs. The code also prohibits possession, consumption or distribution of alcoholic beverages on any property owned or leased by the College and at any college activity. Campus members may be subject to prosecution by civil authorities for violation of state and federal laws. Violation of the alcohol, tobacco and other drug policies will be handled through the Dean of Students. The sanctions taken may include, but are not limited to: referral for assessment by Health and Wellness Services, appearance before the Student Standards Committee, probation or expulsion.

Open Container - It is illegal to drink any alcoholic beverage while operating, or as a passenger in, a vehicle (parked or moving), or have an open container in vehicle.	Up to 6 months imprisonment &/or \$1,000 fine. Class B misdemeanor.
Selling, furnishing or supplying alcohol to a minor - You are in violation if you provide alcohol to a minor.	Up to 1 year imprisonment &/or \$2,500 fine. Class A misdemeanor.
Intoxication - A person is in violation if he is under the influence of intoxicating liquor or other substances to the degree that the person may endanger himself or others in a public or private place and unreasonably disturb others.	Imprisonment in jail or detoxification center if necessary for protection of self or others. Class C misdemeanor.
Tobacco use or possession - It is unlawful for any person under the age of 19 to purchase or possess tobacco in any form.	Maximum \$500 fine. Class C misdemeanor.
Clean Air Act - Prohibits smoking in a public place, public meeting or any government building. (All buildings on SLCC campus)	Maximum \$500 fine. Class C misdemeanor.

#### ALCOHOL HEALTH RISKS

Possible Effects: Psychological & physical addiction, respiratory depression, depression of the immune system, increased risk of accidents, injury due to violence, heart disease, cancer, hypertension, brain damage, impotence at high dosage levels, drunk driving crashes. In addition, alcohol use increases the risk of unwanted sex, unwanted pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases and acquaintance/date rape. Mothers who drink during pregnancy may give birth to infants with Fetal Alcohol Syndrome or Fetal Alcohol Effect. These infants may have irreversible physical abnormalities and mental retardation. Research indicates that children of alcoholic parents are at greater risk than other people of becoming alcoholics.

**Withdrawal Symptoms**-Repeated alcohol use can lead to dependence. Sudden cessation is likely to produce withdrawal symptoms including: severe anxiety, tremors, hallucinations and convulsions. Alcohol withdrawal can be life threatening. Long term consumption of large quantities of alcohol, combined with poor nutrition, can also lead to permanent vital organ damage.

**Effects of Overdose-** Very high doses of alcohol can cause respiratory depression and death. If combined with other depressants of the central nervous system, much lower doses of alcohol will produce the effects just described.



## REGISTRATION TIPS FOR SLCC BIOLOGY CLASSES

Many Biology course (especially prerequisites for Health Science programs) fill to capacity early in the registration process.

When registering for these classes, remember the following Biology Department guidelines and suggestions.

## 1) Biology LABORATORY Requirements.

- Most Biology courses include a LABORATORY component.
- In all cases, the laboratory must be taken during the same semester as the lecture.
- Students who retake a course must also retake the laboratory.
- Students are required to register for laboratory and lecture at the same time.
- Students do not receive a letter grade for the laboratory section, rather, the laboratory score counts as 20 percent of the lecture grade.
- If the laboratory sections are full, students will not be able to register for the lecture.
- Be careful when changing sections as dropping out of the laboratory or lecture section may cause the registration system to also drop BOTH sections. You must add

## 2) Biology Placement and Prerequisite Requirements

- BIOL 1610 is the prerequisite to ALL higher numbered Biology courses.
- Registration for BIOL 1610 requires a prerequisite of:
   a grade of C or better in Math 0990 or equivalent CPT/ACT score
   AND a grade of C or better in RDG 0990 or equivalent CPT/ACT score.
- Students must pass BIOL 1610 with a grade of C or better BEFORE they can take higher numbered Biology classes.
- Students who earned a grade of C or better in BIOL 1170 prior to Fall Semester 2007 can register for BIOL 2060/2065, BIOL 2320/2325 and BIOL 2420/2425.
- Students who earned a grade of C or better in BIOL 1210 prior to Fall Semester 2007 can register for ALL higher numbered Biology courses
- Students presently enrolled in BIOL 1610 are allowed to register for the following term in higher numbered Biology courses, however, failure to earn the minimum grade in the prerequisite will cause the student to be dropped from the higher numbered course.
- Students wishing to meet the required prerequisite using credit transferred from an other institution must have their transfer credit officially reviewed by the Incoming Transcript Office (SC 258). Please visit

   for complete details. This process may take 4 to 6 weeks to complete.

NOTE: A grade of C in BIOL 1610 is the Biology Department's requirement.

Admission to many programs requires a higher grade in BIOL 1610. Check directly with the program you are interested in for details.

# 3) HIGH DEMAND COURSES BIOL 1610, 2060, 2320 and 2420

- In these classes, enrolled students must attend the first lab session and at least one of the first two lecture sessions or they will be dropped from BOTH.
- Faculty in these courses and the accompanying lab sections cannot manually add any students. Students are only able to add themselves as spots open.
- No wait lists will be generated. Please do not contact the biology faculty or laboratory staff before the first day of the semester.
- If you attempt to register for a course but are unable to do so because the course is full, you automatically will be issued a Priority Ticket. This Priority Ticket will allow you an opportunity to register for the same course the following semester during a special Priority Ticket early registration. In order to obtain priority registration for both a lab and a lecture, students should attempt to register for BOTH full classes.
- Priority registration DOES NOT guarantee students a seat in any lecture or lab section.
- Once a student has obtained a priority registration ticket for the next semester, they should continue to monitor the registration system for the current semester as new spaces and/or sections may open up.
- Students adding Biology classes during the first week of classes should consult with their laboratory AND lecture instructors to see if they have met the attendance requirements.
- No students may be added after the first week of classes.



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
