WIDENING OF REDWOOD ROAD FRONTING MAIN CAMPUS STARTING SHORTLY

Contracts have been awarded for the widening of Redwood Road at 4700 South to the vicinity of Eisenhower junior high school.

This major activity will have a substantial effect upon the traffic patterns surrounding the college for up to a year.

Pre-construction meetings have been held with the Department of Transportation's District No. 2. Utah Power & Light will be moving the power poles, but whether or not it may be possible to put the cables underground is uncertain. In the event that is not practicable the poles will be relocated on part of the grassy area to the east of the UTC frontage road.

While it is thought that the brick columns at the north and south entrances to the peripheral road will remain, it is almost certain that the metal, stone and brick sign with the college's name will have to be re-located.

Construction will involve covering the canal where it presently is adjacent to Redwood Road; widening the bridge area; re-aligning the entrance of the college's peripheral road to the south-east, so that it exits onto Redwood Road opposite a subdivision road; and widening the existing two-lane Redwood Road into a 4-lane major artery. Road width will be close to 100 ft.

The contract stipulates that only one entrance from Redwood Road onto UTC/SL property will be blocked at any one time.

Representing UPEA staff were Clark Puffer, executive director; J. Francis Velarga, deputy director and legal counsel; David Patton, research director/analyst, and Paul Hickman, employee relations representative who will be representing UTC's classified staff before the State Board of Regents and the Legislature whenever necessary.

Paul Hickman will be introduced to the UTC classified staff membership at a meeting on November 12th. He will be happy to respond to questions at that time.

PARKING METERS INSTALLED ON MAIN CAMPUS

Eighty-five parking meters have been installed on the Redwood Road campus at an estimated cost of \$10,000.00.

Principal areas where the meters are located are: north and south of the Administration Building; the College Center; and a few to the south and west of the Metals Building.

Clients of the Barbering and Cosmetology departments have been particularly pleased with the meters. The machines accept nickels, dimes and quarters, with a two-hour time period being bought for 50ϕ . They remain in force throughout the day and evening hours.

Other topics will include "Institutional Responsibility and Liability," a major subject of great interest to all schools which have veterans receiving any government financial aid.

NEW MAINTENANCE BUILDING TO BE BUILT

UTC director of facilities Paul Gundersen announces that Architectural Associates has been given a contract by the State Division of Facilities Construction and Management for pre-engineering design of a metal building to house maintenance facilities at the college.

The \$26,000-plus building could be completed by March, 1982. The 1,600 square foot facility will be constructed west of the Heating Plant and north of the Laborers Training Building. It will consist of two bays.

Drawings have been approved by the state fire marshal's office. It is expected that the building will be advertised the week of November 16th, with construction likely beginning 30 days later.

CARPETING, MINOR REMODELING CONTINUES

Maintenance remains a never-ending problem, particularly as an institution grows. In the total program of keeping Utah Tech looking spruce and clean, it becomes necessary to replace carpeting on the second, third and fourth levels of the Calvin L. Rampton Technology Building.

Additionally, there will be some carpeting of business instruction areas on the second floor of the Jay L. Nelson Administration Building.

Some minor remodeling will take place in the kitchen area of the Administration Building, currently used by Commercial Art students. While the kitchen function will not be disturbed (in the event that at some future time it may be desirable to use the area for food service purposes), there will be some changes in plumbing and exhaust hoods for convenience of the commercial art function.

Installation of access doors is planned between Auto Paint and Auto Body shops in the Automotive Trades Building.

Further, the graphics computer (presently housed within the Data Processing area) will be removed to the foyer area of the Engineering Drafting & Design labs. Walls, partially glassed, will enclose the computer in an area much more functional than at its present location.

Other projects are being considered. Whether or not they get under way depends largely on receiving funding approval.
