Utah Tech's representatives - who represent first, second and third place winners in the school's own VICA contest earlier this year - will compete in 5 leadership and 14 skills contests.

First place winners will be invited to compete in the national competitions in Louisville, Kentucky, from June 22-25, 1982.

#### GRADUATION SPEAKER NAMED

Justice Dallin Oaks of the Utah Supreme Court has been named the college's 1982 graduation speaker.

Dean Ann Erickson, chairperson of the graduation committee, noted that Justice Oaks has expressed keen interest in participating in the June 4 ceremony. In order to speak at the Utah Tech rites he is having to rearrange some other professional engagements, and will be returning earlier that day from Arizona in order to meet the 7:00 p.m. appointment.

Dr. Dallin Oaks was formerly president of Brigham Young University for a number of years. Previous to that he had been a law school professor at an eastern university.

In connection with the commencement program Dean Erickson also said that two prominent local citizens will be honored for their support of the school. Announcement of these names will be made shortly.

President Orville D. Carnahan will be conducting the graduation for the first time on the Utah Tech campus. He has, of course, officiated for such occasions at both Southern Utah State College, and Highline Community College.

A buffet luncheon will honor graduates earlier in the day. They will have the opportunity, too, to meet the President and Mrs. Carnahan in an informal reception at about the same time.

The commencement ceremony will take place, as in other recent years, in the center quad of the Redwood Road campus.

## LOU HULETT SAVES LIFE, RECEIVES COMMENDATION

Sergeant Lou Hulett, police officer with the UTC security department, received commendation for quick action in a college meeting on the handicapped when a participant suddenly started choking.

Employing the Heimlich maneuver, and with the aid of Student Services counselor Jeff Johnsen holding the person in position, Lou was able to dislodge the food particle.

The commendation noted that in all likelihood were it not for Lou's prompt action the victim would have died.

#### DENNIS McGARVEY

"Utah Tech is one of the most maligned, misunderstood schools I've ever known," says Dennis McGarvey, the College Center's program director. "Before I came to the college I guess I had my own impression of Utah Tech but, believe me, it's quite different now.

"The fact is the classes I take here in the evening school are every bit as good as the best I had at Ohio University."

Of course, Dennis is a graduate of Ohio U., gaining his undergraduate degree in Business Management, then taking a Masters in Sports Administration.

Born and nurtured in Athens, Ohio, Dennis remembers his home town as being hot and sticky in the summer, but a lovely place to grow up.

Following graduation from high school he joined the National Security Agency, spent a year in Monterey, California, learning Russian. "Six hours a day," he says, a trifle ruefully. "I ended up being able to speak Russian grammatically better than I could English."

A three-year stint in Berlin, Germany, for the same agency saw Dennis using that linguistic talent. But being pretty much ringed by the Russians outside that city made life tedious. "However," he recalls, "I do remember driving into East Germany with a friend one weekend, and getting stopped at a checkpoint for 30 minutes. It seemed pretty scary at the time, but the guard holding us was just waiting until his superior went off duty. Then he swapped his belt buckle and hat for some old copies of Playboy we had on the back seat!"

For recreation Dennis played basketball for a German team, an American team, even a couple of English teams. "After three years in Europe I went to Ohio University on a basketball scholarship."

While at O.U. he managed the ice rink and golf course, enrolled in the first Sports Administration program in the country. "There were approximately 300 applicants; they accepted 22." He also became assistant golf coach, and was with the O.U. team that went to the NCAA golf playoffs.

Part of the Sports Administration program included an internship with some athletic organization. Dennis did his with the L.A. Dodgers, helping to set up the Spring training in Florida.

Contacted by the Utah Jazz to join their organization in the marketing department, Dennis worked in P.R. areas, and designed and sold the program.

"Then," he says, "I got this position. It's fun. It's a challenge. The people are great."

What plans does Dennis have for his part at Utah Tech? "Well, I am constantly on the lookout for starting as many different activities as possible so we involve as much of the student body as we can.

"I guess one of my frustrations is the apparent lack of committment by students to becoming well-rounded. They can see class work and their jobs, but they aren't committed to social-recreational activities at the college. Part of it is a matter of better communication...so many of them tell me they don't get the word on activities until it is too late."

Dennis is proud of the joint intramural sports activities he's been working on with the University of Utah. "We're doing the first such joint venture of this nature in the country," he says. "In fact, I've been asked to talk about it at the next National Intramural Recreational Sports Association conference."

And the other thing that's a real turn-on is the opportunity of working on the Phys. Ed. aspects of the upcoming Associate of Science degree. "I'll be teaching golf classes this summer," Dennis remarks, "and there'll be classes in aerobic dancing and tennis, also."

Dennis McGarvey is a bonus for Utah Tech.
