REGENTS' FACILITIES COMMITTEE IMPROVES UTAH TECH'S CHANCES

The facilities sub-committee of the State Board of Regents has placed the projected Business Building for Utah Tech at the head of its list of statewide campus new building priorities.

The first phase of the building is projected at \$3,717,000.00. However, this does not include parking lots and other needs.

Nevertheless the Business Building -- even when meshed in with the Stat's other building priorities from all agencies -- still may stand a good chance of being funded, unless heavy politicking rearranges once again the prioritized list.

Additionally, the Regents placed fourth in priority the need to put the downtown Skills Center building in good repair. Further details on this plan will be announced later.

NON-PROFIT CORPORATION ORGANIZED

A Utah Technical College at Salt Lake Foundation has been formally organized. It is to be operated exclusively for charitable, cultural, scientific and educational purposes. According to the new foundation's Articles of Incorporation, it is intended to maintain, develop, increase and extend the facilities and services of the College; and to solicit gifts and contributions.

It is anticipated that the Foundation will be meeting about mid-October. At that time, the board of directors, executive committee and officers will be named.

CONTRACT AWARDED FOR ELECTRIC SIGN

UTC facilities director Paul Gundersen reports that the contract has been awarded for the electronic sign which will abut Redwood Road in front of the Administration Building.

The \$54,930.00 sign is being engineered by YESCO (Young Electric Sign Co.). Paul Gundersen anticipates that the sign will be completed and operational well before fall quarter starts.

REMODELING JOBS NOW UNDER WAY

Following approval by the State Division of Facilities Construction and Management, a \$58,986.00 contract has been awarded to C.I.C. Construction to remodel the former Day Care Center into facilities for the new Dental Assisting Program.

At the same time, remodeling is under way in a house at the west end of the campus -- 2200 West -- for the new Day Care Center. It will provide for approximately 60 children.

In other areas, the Auto Trades east and central wings are being re-roofed. Up to 6 inches of insulation is being applied to some parts of that roof.

COTTONWOOD HIGH SCHOOL CLASSROOMS TO BE USED BY UTC/SL THIS FALL

Four classrooms in one wing of Cottonwood High School are being leased to Utah Tech for instructional purposes beginning this fall.

According to Dr. Max Lowe, vice-president for instruction, classes in Accounting, data processing, economics, English, management, mathematics, psychology and Sociology are planned for that campus this fall. He added, "Acquisition of this classroom space could prove very attractive to students living on the east side of town."

MIKE HOMER

"Often small decisions have a major impact on our lives," says Mike Homer, recently appointed Dean of the School of Business.

"It was a relatively small decision that influenced my interest in furthering my education," continued Mike, who is a graduate of South High. He has, over the years, taken classes at B.Y.U., Utah State, Utah Tech/SL, and University of Utah. Now holding a doctoral degree, he has come a long way from his early years as a child in the inner-city.

Known as a butterball while in high school, Mike shocked his peers when he served during summer recess with the Air National Guard, losing 65 pounds and gaining two inches in height.

After graduation, Mike worked for Huddart Floral and soon went on active duty, 4 years, with the Air Force. By the time he was due to re-enlist, he was fed up with the useless "spit-and-polish" routine and decided to re-enter civilian life.

For two years, Mike worked for Sperry Utah as an inspector of electro-mechanical products. He enrolled, hastily, at the old "Trade Tech" to learn more about electronics.

Laid off by Sperry, Mike moved to Litton Guidance Control to write inspection manuals. Once again, he found a need for more learning so he enrolled at the U and took English classes.

Promoted, at Litton, to a supervisory position, he found himself ordering people around the military way and not having much luck. That didn't sit too well with his colleagues, so Mike signed up for management classes. When he transferred from night shift to day shift for quality control, he was within six months of completing his bachelors' degree. With his wife's acquiescence, he quit Litton and earned his B.A. magna cum laude.

For three years, Mike taught math at Union Junior High School and worked toward an M.B.A. During this period he also taught part-time at Utah Tech. "The satisfaction of seeing another person grow and knowing that you have contributed to that process is one of the greatest gratifications one can have," says Mike.

Full time with the college since 1972, Mike has been a teacher and department head in the business area. He has also been involved in consulting, work that now takes a back seat as he immerses himself in his new Dean's position.

Away from the college, Mike loves to be with his wife of 24 years -- Margo --, and his four daughters, Kristy, Diana, Mindie, and Julia. He also has a grand-child that he "dearly loves too -- although I'm not," he is quick to add, "old enough to be a grandpa." Family

oriented, Mike water skis, enjoys good music, and reads too. "Science fiction is a big kick," he admits, "but I also read a lot of professional literature and all the journals and books in my area of expertise." Mike regularly writes and contributes his writing to professional journals. He is developing a business statistics textbook.

Mike Homer is excited about the opportunities that lie ahead for the School of Business. He sees a great future for the school, with exciting curricula changes to keep programs abreast with the needs of the area. "We have great faculty," he says, "and they have ideas, enthusiasm and potential which will be a marvelous benefit to the students who come to the college for business education."
