I. BOARD BUSINESS A. Approval of Honorary Degree Recipients B. Trustee Audit Committee Report, Trustee Jim Wall 1. Action: Ethics and Compliance Reporting Policy 2 nd Reading C. Comprehensive Campaign Update & Report on Progress, VP Alison McFarlane/Nancy Michalko/Trustee Maria Farrington	<p>In the January 17, 2018 Board of Trustees meeting, an executive session was held where Trustees nominated two community members for honorary doctorates. Chair Ensign and President Huftalin met with both of them who were very appreciative. The 2018 honorary doctorate nominees are former Trustee Dr. Ashok Joshi and Dr. Pam Perlich.</p> <p>A motion to approve the honorary doctorate nominees, Ashok Joshi and Pam Perlich was made by Trustee Farrington. Trustee Miller seconded the motion. A vote was taken, and the motion carried unanimously.</p> <p>Vice Chair, Ensign thanked the honorary doctorate committee for their work.</p> <hr/> <p>Trustee Wall circulated a copy of the agenda for the February 13, 2018 Audit Committee meeting. He reported on a telephone call he had with the State Auditor’s Office Senior Audit Manager, Bertha Lui who wanted to confirm the Audit Committee has the information it needs to make informed decisions about issues it is responsible for. He felt</p>

very comfortable in saying that the committee is well informed and supported by the College and staff.

For the annual audit and financial reports, he turned the time over to Debra Glenn who reported that the College received an unmodified audit opinion, the best opinion possible. She provided the Trustees with a copy and gave highlights of the annual financial report. She said that overall, the financial health of the College is doing well. Trustee Wall asked her to provide information concerning the investment report as it relates to the College liability on the pension plan. Ms. Glenn explained the College's pension plan is with Utah Retirement Systems. Both earnings and liability risk reflect largely what the stock market is doing.

Trustee Wall reported on the independent audit the College also had performed which had no exceptions. Chair Ensign thanked both Trustee Wall and Ms. Glenn for the information and asked for a motion. **Trustee Miller moved to approve the 2017 Annual Financial Report. Trustee Farrington seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.**

VP Klaus explained that this is a second reading for the Ethics and Compliance Reporting Policy. A thorough internal review consisting of Executive Cabinet, legal and college community input has taken place. Trustee Wall added that the Audit Committee has also spent a great deal of time reviewing the policy. **Trustee Farrington moved to approve the Ethics and Compliance Reporting Policy as submitted; the motion was seconded by Trustee Wall and carried unanimously.**

VP Alison McFarlane said that Trustee Farrington's help has been invaluable in moving the campaign into the next phase. She asked if Trustee Farrington would like to report on the process and what the results thus far have been. Trustee Farrington complimented the College's rigid procurement process, which helps dictate how RFPs can be solicited, reviewed and selected. She provided information regarding the firm selected and why, and said that she is very pleased with the selection. Nancy Michalko reported on a tour of the Westpointe facility by Boeing. Kenworth Trucking Sales has made a significant pledge to name a truck bay and has challenged other trucking companies to do the same. There are a number of private foundations investing in the facility and a faculty member has pledged \$2,500 to have his and his wife's names listed in the building. She provided brochures and said a number of significant partners are being looked at that may also be able to add their names to the space. She reported that the campaign is going well and our endowment is building. In 2014, there was \$5 million in assets for the Foundation and now there is \$13.1 million so the number has increased significantly over the past five years.

VP Jeff Aird explained a recommendation the Mission Fulfillment Committee is making. He handed out a memorandum explaining the process for assessing mission fulfillment with a two-year schedule. He discussed how Trustees would be involved in helping assess the fulfillment of the College's mission. The recommendation identifies three core themes with objectives for each. The committee will meet regularly and report to the Board of Trustees where a discussion can take place. Discussion concerning expectations followed. President

	<p>Huftalin shared that she sits on the Northwest Commission as a commissioner and on the executive committee. She said that institutions are struggling across the nation around how to measure mission fulfillment and learning outcomes. With the work this committee will be doing, she feels the College is being very proactive by engaging the Trustees in a way that not many other institutions are doing. The consensus of the board was for the committee to move forward with the approach as described.</p>

Trustee Miller made a motion to approve the consent calendar as presented; the motion was seconded by Trustee Wall and carried unanimously.</p>
<p>III. PRESIDENT’S REPORT: Dr. Denece Huftalin, President A. President Huftalin 1. Information: Fashion Institute Gift</p>	<p>President Huftalin explained that the Fashion Institute Program Director Mojdeh Sakaki and her students were asked to design new SLCC branded ties and scarves to be used for gifts. She showed board members what the students and alumni created and manufactured. She invited Trustees to select one for themselves when they leave to wear and help promote SLCC. She said that there are also other items for them from the Bruin Athletic Department.</p>
<p>B. Diversity Initiatives Report – Dr. Roderic Land</p>	<p>Dr. Land provided a scope of what has taken place over the past couple of years in growing diversity at SLCC. Efforts have focused on building infrastructure and tools to aid in the advancement. He highlighted accomplishments and goals saying that SLCC is a very diverse institution reflected most in its students. Progress has been made to hire more diverse faculty and staff. He showed the <i>I am SLCC</i> video that received a regional award at the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) a marketing and public relations advancement philanthropy affinity group. Trustee Wall asked Dr. Land to talk about the climate survey he discussed in the audit committee meeting. Dr. Land said that a climate survey that is performed every other year revealed that faculty, staff and students sometimes struggle financially and that areas people sometime feel less welcome on campus center around transgender and race issues. Other areas the College needs to be aware of is women’s issues and in reporting potential problems that are encountered. He pointed out that issues that need to be addressed on campus are usually a larger issue of society in general. With new students, faculty and staff joining SLCC every year, a student body of 60,000 and roughly 4,000 employees, ongoing training is important. He also provided information to board members about the Diverse Faculty Fellowship.</p>

Electronics Engineering Technology 	<p>Provost Sanders explained the two curriculum action items. First is the Advanced Medical Assisting Associate of Applied Science Degree. The School of Health Sciences looked at the program to refine it from currently offering a certificate of completion to the degree. They looked at market demand and accreditation when deciding to make the change. He also explained the CAO peer review comment. Trustee Newell moved to approve the change. Trustee Miller seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.</p> <p>Second, Provost Sanders explained the Electronics Engineering Technology Associate of Applied Science proposal. He said the proposal is for modifications to an existing program in response to new initiatives, to develop technology, articulation pathways and for partnering for concurrent enrollment. Trustee Miller made a motion to approve the program changes as explained by Dr. Sanders. Trustee Datta seconded the motion. A vote was taken and carried unanimously.</p> <p>Last, Provost Sanders said that the Culinary Arts Program recently received approval for programmatic accreditation from the American Culinary Federation Education Foundation Accrediting Commission – one of the few programs in the entire region that have the accreditation. He introduced Dr. Dennis Bromley, Dean of the School of Business. Dr. Bromley described programs and competitions that the school is engaged in and introduced Jeffrey Coker, the Associate Dean over the program. Associate Dean Coker gave some background information and highlights of the program. He introduced students Stacy and Oliver Peronnet who shared with the board reasons that brought them to SLCC, positive aspects of the culinary arts program and what their plans for the future are. They gave everyone samples of their macaroons.</p> <p>Chair Ensign thanked everyone for sharing.</p>

President Huftalin praised Trustee Rincon and thanked her for her and the student body executive council for going to the Capitol and talking to the committee.</p>

What is being changed and why? Our previous AS had similar tracks as our AA degree, and was conceived as a general degree to prepare students for various points of transfer. We see an opportunity for a much more closely aligned and articulated degree path with the University of Utah's Department of Writing and Rhetoric Studies (WRS), and have worked closely with them to develop two 2000-level courses that will transfer directly and count toward the program. Courses from our existing Writing Certificate of Completion provide ample elective courses to prepare students to transfer at the achievement of the associate's degree. By refocusing the AS degree as a Writing Studies degree, we provide a clearer pathway to a transfer degree.

What is the impact of this program proposal on SLCC programs? None

What is the financial impact of this program proposal to SLCC, School, Division, and Department? We currently have the faculty to teach all the courses in this degree. No new equipment or personnel are needed. Program Description: The English Department offers courses that explore reading and writing as reciprocal in nature and involved in literate, disciplinary practice. Courses range from introductory to more advanced explorations of the role of language in society, in genre and academic studies, as well as in our own personal and professional experiences. We emphasize teaching students to take responsibility for how they communicate in a variety of contexts (from academic, to imaginative, to work-related) and for how language may be used to achieve results. Courses teach intellectual inquiry, expose students to diverse reading and writing tasks, and address how power may be won or lost through the medium of words. A departmental emphasis is also available for students seeking an A.A. in English, or an A.S. in Writing Studies. Various courses of study are available for students to choose: Generalist, Creative Writing, Literature, Writing Studies, English Language Studies, or Cultural Studies. (Previous rationale for program: The Writing Certificate of Completion addresses the growing need for college graduates who can research and communicate information at a high level of competence in business, industry, and future fields of study, specifically written work. The Writing Certificate bridges content from other disciplines as it applies to students' professional and/or academic interests and offers experiential learning opportunities beyond the classroom.)

Career Opportunities: Writing is a key component in nearly every career and highly valued in the workplace. In fact, there has been a societal shift in the status of writing toward an awareness of how writing affects the ways that people develop their literacy and understand its value. Writing is now generally within the top three skills employers look for in prospective employees. The A.S. in Writing Studies will position students to enhance their employment opportunities; transfer and completion of a B.S. will only further this enhancement.

The A.S. in Writing Studies prepares students for transfer to 4-year programs in the same field. Increasingly, 4-year programs in our system have discrete programs in Writing Studies, sometimes even in separate departments from English Studies. The A.S. in Writing Studies has at its core two 2000-level courses developed in collaboration with The Department of Writing and Rhetoric Studies (WRS) at the University of Utah, one of our 4-year transfer partners. Students can choose, as electives, from a number of writing-focused courses.

The English Department has offered an A.S., with a track in Writing Studies, for some time. We also developed a Writing Certificate of Completion with a writing-centered curriculum. The current revision of this program came about through a collaborative effort between the University of Utah's Writing and Rhetoric Studies department, which is one of our main transfer partners. They saw our Writing Certificate students as good candidates, and well-prepared, for their programs. Together, we sought to create stronger bridges for students between SLCC's program offerings and their degree program (the .B.A./B.S. in Writing and Rhetoric Studies). This led to the co-development of the two 2000-level courses, and the rewriting of the A.S. degree, aligned for transfer with a slimmer core. We already see students transferring successfully to this program, and anticipate even more students doing so when the program is fully in place. Furthermore, this degree will provide for students additional coursework in writing that will enhance their development in this critical area beyond the existing six-hour composition requirement.

From the University of Utah WRS site: Students who transfer to a four-year program in Writing Studies will find themselves with many choices of career, particularly if they double major (the U's program is well-suited for double majoring with programs in the humanities, social sciences, sciences, and business. This will prepare them well for employment in a large number of fields, such as engineering, life and physical sciences, business, health sciences, as well as education. Graduates with a baccalaureate in Writing Studies will find themselves prepared for employment in publishing, editing, advertising, public

relations, politics, and public service. Graduates in Writing Studies will be well prepared for further study in such graduate fields as law and political science.

Student Demand

While our partnership with the Department of Writing and Rhetoric Studies at the U of U has existed for just two years, of the 54 transfer students majoring in that department, one-third (36) are from SLCC. This is an indication that student demand is immediate and that the prospects for future demand are positive.

The Department of Writing and Rhetoric Studies (WRS) at the University of Utah now offers a B.S. degree. The intent behind the A.S. in Writing Studies is to create a well defined and well aligned pathway for students seeking to major or minor in writing studies that will guarantee them junior status upon transfer. This pathway includes a one-to-one articulation for ENGL 2040 (Introduction to Writing Studies), and ENGL 2310 (Digital Writing) with the same two courses offered in the WRS department at the University of Utah.

Collaboration with and Impact on Other USHE Institutions

Through an ongoing collaborative process, as well as the full support of the WRS department chair and the Dean of Humanities, the SLCC English department and the WRS department at the University of Utah have established a strong partnership/pathway. This relationship is designed to accelerate the time to graduation for students at both institutions. Clear evidence of the agreements between the two departments are the articulation of ENGL 2040 and 2310, but also a Summer Bridge Program established in 2016 for SLCC students. For students about to transfer to the University of Utah, this program offers them two upper division writing courses that have been co-developed by both departments. Moreover, due to an endowment, there is no cost to students for taking these courses. By developing an A.S. in Writing Studies, all of the necessary elements of the partnership will have been formally established. We will not be offering this program out of our service area.

As with all SLCC degrees, students must maintain an SLCC cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher to graduate with an A.S. in Writing Studies.

Furthermore, this degree is well-attuned to a pathway organizational structure, as it will provide an enhance role for the English department in the teaching of writing. Ever since the implementation of the Writing Certificate of Completion, curriculum and faculty development have taken place in order to prepare for an A.S. in Writing Studies. In addition, Staff support, through advising, are well position to support the degree (see below).

Many full-time faculty members are in place to deliver instruction in this program. We are currently hiring four faculty (replacements for retirees) who will add to the corps of qualified faculty.

The English Department, through the College, supports faculty professional development through conference attendance, through grant-supported development of instructional resources (the OER Initiative), and through holding forums for part-time faculty. Additionally, English Department faculty are productive scholars, who write and publish in the field.

Staff

Existing staff are in place to support the proposed program. The English Department is supervised by an Associate Dean and supported by a full-time administrative assistant. 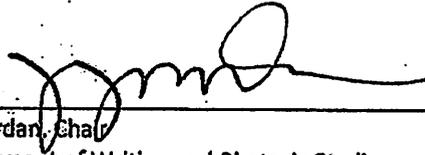

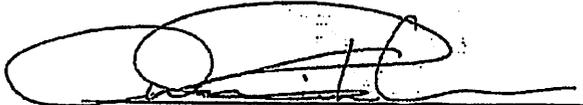

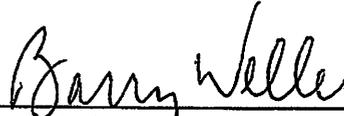

Regent policy, *R220, Delegation of Responsibilities to the President and Board of Trustees*, requires that the Board of Trustees reviews and approves tuition and general student fee adjustment recommendations, prior to being submitted to the Board of Regents for final consideration. The Board of Regents will meet on March 30, 2018 at Dixie State University to take final action on all tuition and fee increases for 2018-19.

FY 2019 Proposed Tuition Increase

The College hosted its Annual Tuition Review meeting with students on February 28, 2018. At this meeting students were advised of the proposed tuition increase ranges for both first-tier and second-tier tuition. Currently it is anticipated that the State Board of Regents' proposed 2018-19 first-tier tuition increase might range from 0% to 4%. The College is proposing a 0% to 2% second-tier tuition increase depending on the outcome of the legislative session. Together, the proposed tuition increases for next year is anticipated to be in the range of 0-5% or \$0 to \$82.98 per semester for a full-time resident undergraduate student. Additional information will be provided at the Trustees' meeting including student feedback from the Annual Tuition Review meeting.

Trustee Action: The Trustees are asked to review and approve a second-tier tuition increase in the range of 0% to 2% depending on the legislative funding outcomes for FY 2019. Trustees will receive a follow up report regarding the final second-tier tuition increase percentage during its next scheduled meeting.

Proposed Student Fee Increase

Regent Policy, *R510 Tuition and Fees*, requires that all general student fees be reviewed and approved by the Board of Regents, normally in conjunction with the annual determination of tuition rates. General student fees typically include fees related to Student Life & Leadership, athletics, transportation, health and wellness programs, technology fees, and approved student union building bond fees.

Also required by Regents policy, the College has an established Student Fee Board whose purpose is to provide students with input into decisions regarding the determination and allocation of student fees. The Student Fee Board's final recommendation was to increase student fees a total of \$6.25 or 2.7% for students enrolled for 10 credit hours or more per semester. The fee changes are as follows:

- ❖ Increase the Athletics Fee by \$2.00
- ❖ Increase the Center for Health & Counseling Fee by \$3.00
- ❖ Increase the Child Care & Family Services Fee by \$2.00
- ❖ Increase the Community Service Fee by \$0.25
- ❖ Increase the Transportation Fee by \$1.50
- ❖ Decrease the Student Center Operations Fee by -\$0.50
- ❖ Decrease the Student Activities Fee by -\$0.50
- ❖ Decrease ID Card/One Card Fee by -\$0.25
- ❖ Decrease the Arts and Cultural Event Fee by -\$0.25
- ❖ Decrease the Sustainability/Recycling Fee by -\$0.75
- ❖ Decrease the Publications/Media Fee by -\$0.25

- ❖ Total Change: \$6.25

Dear Members of the Salt Lake Community College Board of Trustees,

In compliance with Regent Policy, I am writing to express my support for Salt Lake Community College's proposed 2.7% student fee increase for 2018-2019. Currently, the fee is \$230.75 per semester. Keeping in mind the needs of the student body and the purpose of student fees, we are recommending an increase of 2.7%; this is an additional \$6.25 in student fees per semester, for a new total of \$237.00.

As it is the case every year, students at Salt Lake Community College play a key role in our student fee allocation process. As part of the Student Fee Board myself, we understand this increase is above the first-tier tuition rate increase; however, there is an urgent need for each of these fees to be raised this coming academic year.

This fee increase accommodates to students' needs, as well as providing the financial support needed for the continued operations of different departments across Salt Lake Community College. I can say with confidence that our students support these increases to better the services and opportunities provided for students. Following the Board of Trustees approval of the proposal, it is my hope that these fee changes will be approved by the Board of Regents.
