## FACILITIES DIVISION PLAYS WINTER QUARTER ENROLLMENT MUSICAL CHAIRS FIGURES

At last the long-awaited move into new offices for the facilities division has taken place. Those personnel have moved into new offices constructed on the second level of the Construction Trades building.

Among those affected are director of facilities Paul Gundersen; Gene Overson; and Jean Bird, and Cindy Ewell.

A plan room is also now part of that complex, and will house all plans on all the buildings on the campuses of Utah Technical College at Salt Lake.

Maintenance foreman Rich Hickman likewise has moved into the same area.

And the campus security offices are also on the upper level of the CT building. Police chief Stan Hoffman has re-located there, and the other police officers have quarters there. Additionally, there is a counter for obtaining parking stickers, etc.

Vice-president for instruction Max Lowe and his immediate staff have moved into the area vacated by Paul Gundersen and his staff.

Telephone extensions remain as previously.

The offices formerly occupied by Gene Overson and Rich Hickman, are the site of the Purchasing department. Purchasing agent Dean Sargent, and technician June Paxton are moving to that location. A catalog area is being established there, too, so anyone can refer to commercial company lists and prices prior to ordering supplies and equipment.

Further down the road it is expected that some remodeling will take place in the fiscal area, providing a different office for controller Kent Ferrel, and a subsequent move for Mark Hamilton, deputy controller.

Assistant to the president Brent Goodfellow is in Max Lowe's previous office.

Seminars are sponsored by the Skills Center, but are held in the Rampton building auditorium at 7 p.m.

The official third week report shows a record winter quarter enrollment for Utah Tech.

The 6,854 registrations represent 544 more students this quarter than winter one year ago. While the most recent enrollment figure falls 254 short of last autumn's enrollment, it is within 15 FTE's at 4,729 of last fall quarter's record high.

Nearly 35 percent of the enrollment is female.

Veterans actually account for 665 students.

Within the state of Utah 87 percent of the students come from Salt Lake county, 5.6 percent from Davis county, and slightly less than 2 percent each from Tooele and Utah counties. All but 5 counties are represented at the college.

Nevada and Wyoming students head the out-of-state representation. And there are 31 students from foreign lands, ranging from China, to Pakistan; the Netherlands to Nigeria.

## HONORS ROLLS LIST 424!

A 4.0 grade point average was earned by 119 students in fall quarter, according to dean of students Judd Morgan. That represents 28 percent of the 424 named to the Honor Roll.

The Honor Roll is divided into two parts: the prestigious President's List, for which one has to earn a minimum 3.80 GPA to be named to it; and the Dean's List, requiring a minimum 3.50 GPA.

There were 235 students on the President's List; 189 achieving the Dean's List.

Honor students accounted for a fraction under 6 percent of the fall quarter enrollment.

## TAXES: LESSENING THE PAIN

Alex Stecker advises that a temporary special section has been created at the front desk of the library with a selection of books, IRS tapes, etc, on how to fill out your tax returns, make the most of deductions, etc. Material needs to be used in the library. Inquire at the circulating desk.

And Frankie Ford announces that students are again participating in the VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) program.

The south alcove in the lower level of the College Center has been set aside for VITA service. Beginning February 7th, it will operate with qualified student help each Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. (except President's Day) through April 13th.

This free help program assists in preparation of less complicated federal and state tax returns. There will be at least 2 students on duty at all times, with 3 available in the evening hours. No appointment is necessary.

Students preparing the returns will have passed the I.R.S.-conducted examination for this purpose.

Assistance is particularly offered all members of the campus population, plus low-income, elderly, handicapped or disadvantaged citizens.

## UTC THREESOME STUDY TOOELE SHOPLIFTING

Three DECA students have been informally helping Tooele residents become more aware of shoplifting problems.

A mini-campaign (details of which are being compiled for presentation in the mid-February state DECA contests) have largely taken the form of surveys and reports of conclusions.

Some 36 percent of 150 junior high students surveyed admitted to having shoplifted. Of those, 70 percent were boys.
