Dr. Stephen R. Covey, associate professor of organizational behavior and business management, has accepted the invitation to speak at the Utah Tech graduation program, June 3rd at 7 p.m. in the Special Events Center of the University of Utah.

A well-known teacher and speaker, professor Covey has been affiliated with Brigham Young University since 1957, except for a three-year break when he served as president of the Irish Mission of the L.D.S. Church.

In addition to his teaching capabilities - for which he has received the Karl G. Maeser and Adult Education Teaching Awards for teaching excellence - he has served as administrative assistant to the president of B.Y.U., and as director of university relations there.

Dr. Covey has been visiting professor at the University of Utah, Belfast Technical College, and BYU College of Hawaii.

He has done organizational consulting and management training internationally with a number of companies on the Fortune 500 list; as well as working with government agencies, college presidents and their staffs, and many other specialized groups.
