ALUMNI COUNCIL ENDORSES PHONATHON PLAN

Utah Tech alumni coordinator <u>Carol Henderson</u> has approval from the college's Alumni <u>Council</u> to undertake its first annual fundraiser.

The Phonathon will run for 12 days within the period October 17 through November 16. Some 300 volunteers will be required to operate 20 telephones being installed and plan on remaining in college through the school year.

Carol anticipates about 6,000 former students of the college being contacted. This represents a verified list of those living in-state at present.

While it is hoped enough money can be raised to make the undertaking worth while, the telephone contact alone to each former student will be positive p.r. for the institution.

Preparation for such a massive campaign takes months of behind-the-scenes work. CENTURY CLUB REACTIVATED

After a lapse of several years the recreational Century Club is being reactivated, according to <u>Craig Forman</u>, recreational coordinator. BOYD WARNICK RECEIVES STATE AWARD

Transportation Management instructor Boyd L. Warnick was honored late last month as Delta Nu Alpha's "Man of the Year." The Salt Lake City chapter of DNA - international organization for transportation management professionals - has several ties with Utah Tech. This year's president, Rick McGurk, traffic manager for the LDS Church, is a graduate of the college. First vice president is Tom Scott, ZCMI transportation manager, who teaches in the program in the evening. As does, also, Wes McKnight, who is regional vice president of DNA, and LDS Church traffic analyst.

Boyd sees logistics management as one of the great up-and-coming areas. "People are finally beginning to realize that transportation management is not simply a truck driving course. That aspect is handled very well by our colleagues at the Skills Center. The transportation management program we teach is logistics centered. Incidentally, it is the only such program offered between the mid-west and the west coast. I am of the opinion that within a few years it will be one of the larger programs in the School of Business."
