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BUSINESS BUILDING GETS GO - AHEAD

Results of bid openings on the projected Business Building came too late for inclusion in the last issue of "Spotlight."

However Director of Facilities Paul Gundersen now reports that J. Ron Stacey Engineering & Construction Co., Inc., was the apparent low bidder. That bid came in at \$2,946,600, which included two alternates on top of the base price.

The first phase comprises 47,500 square feet. It is to be completed within 500 days of beginning of construction.

The architectural firm which has designed the plans is Architectural Associates, with Paul Lemoine as the principal for this project.

Gundersen comments that if feasible the college will try to grade an area north of the proposed building (which itself will sit north of the Technology Building) immediately for 200 non-asphalted parking stalls. He says availability of these stalls is critical, because excavation for the new building's foundation will remove 165 of the existing asphalted parking stalls.

U. T. C. TO OFFER VEHICLE EMISSIONS TECHNICIAN CLASS

A concentrated 24-hour program taught by Denver-based E.P.A. officials, and using Utah Tech's facilities, is in the works for the week of December 5-10.

The class will instruct up to 25 automotive teachers from Salt Lake and Davis counties (plus several from other areas). The training will allow these teachers to give a 16-hour course subsequently to mechanics/technicians for vehicle emissions certification.

Between January and April, 1984, it is expected that there will be some 500 certificated mechanics/technicians capable of the mandatory testing of 1968 and newer gasoline powered cars and trucks.

Utah Tech's certificated instructors will begin the short-term classes in January on the Redwood Road campus. Additionally, if dealerships have sufficient mechanics they want certified in this area, Utah Tech instruction may be given on-site.

To assist the college accomplish the task of giving instruction to so many mechanics, five suppliers are providing loans of emissions-testing equipment.

The Salt Lake City-County Health Department has been working in close cooperation with the college to establish both the initial teacher instructional certification, and the subsequent mechanics vehicle emissions testing certification.
